CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD



THE LORD IS MY SHEPHERD

IN FORMATION, CURRENT CGS VOLUNTEER, AND ST. GERTRUDE SCHOOL MOM

A couple of weeks ago at bedtime, I was reading a rhyming children's book

about the human body with my five-year-old son. When we got to the colorful pages about the heart and the circulatory system, he said in a slightly disgusted but mostly concerned tone that Jesus bled on the cross. Thinking I could simply explain that we bleed from wounds, that it didn't just happen randomly and not to be afraid, I reached over, grabbed the crucifix from his cluttered dresser, held it in front of us and, pointing to the hands and feet of Christ, asked, "Where did Jesus bleed?"

"Jerusalem," he answered.

I chuckled but have since reflected and wondered in amazement what Michael—and actually, each child—absorbs from time well-spent in the atrium for the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd.

Imagine having a space prepared for you where time is not meant for rushing or efficiency but for quietness, work, prayer, and the ability to reflect on the most critical and profound concepts available to your mind and soul.

The atrium at St. Gertrude Church offers this for children. I heard about Catechesis of the Good Shepherd from many who volunteered in the atrium, and I had seen my children's darling work coming home. (Like the one that hung on our fridge for so long: a delicate page with a shepherd carrying a little lamb on his shoulders with the words, "The Lode is my shepherd," traced in pencil by my daughter.)

During quiet time in this Montessori-style setting and approach, children explore, sing, pray, work at a child-sized model altar, and work with a wooden Good Shepherd and his sheep. They also work with a small globe and three-dimensional maps of the Land of Israel and Jerusalem. All of these articles help the children absorb the life of Christ and the life of the Church. Children make collages, arrange flowers, trace images and Scripture, and work prayerfully, reflectively, and in good time—as children are naturally in tune with God's time. Children and two or three adult catechists and volunteers will gather at a small and simple prayer table with a lit candle. "Do you want to hear what God is saying to us today?" An adult might ask at the prayer table. "Yes," the children (usually) answer, because they know God loves them and speaks to them. They know he hears their voices.

It's a twist on that often-recited Scripture verse, simplified for the children's ears. I heard it back in June during training for Level One of Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, and it began to slowly sink in deeper. Did I forget somehow that the Lord counts my hairs? Did I doubt that he truly guides me and leads me to good places, that all I must do is follow him? Hearing the message of this Good Shepherd—listening in that still and peaceful room—felt to me something like the sound of hearing my name called out clearly by my closest friend while in a foreign land.

When I am in the atrium, I am amazed to observe beautiful children at work and in prayer and to hear their pure young voices praise and thank God directly from their own hearts, delighting in and being delighted in by their Creator.

Children respond to this environment and experience because it is what we are all truly made for: to know God, to love God, and to serve him with the gifts and treasures he gives so generously. Children work and pray in the atrium, moved by the Holy Spirit, while reflecting on the life of Jesus and the life of the Church.

Earlier this year, I began to feel a gentle nudging—there was no guilt, no overshadowing sense of obligation, but an open invitation. And then the clear and direct voice of a close friend who knows and loves both the

Good Shepherd and me called me to say, "Get the training!" It did seem like time was the last thing I had to give with a busy family at home, but when God asks something of us, he doesn't leave it to chance. I signed up for the training and watched



how the Lord cleared a path in both my heart and my calendar. Soon after the training began, it was very clear that this gift, this treasure, was for me, too; I was receiving far more than I could ever give. The Good Shepherd would clear a path for me to share some time in the atrium, as well. Being in the atrium is both a gift and an honor, as I observe and assist the children, watch and try to remember how to be small again myself, but remain open hearted to listen and allow the space and time for God to work in my own daily life, my heart, my calendar, and the plans he lays out for me. The Lord is my shepherd. I have everything I need.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

A faith formation experience for children

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) is a Montessori-influenced faith formation experience for children age three through grade three that introduces young ones to Jesus the Good Shepherd and nurtures a deep, personal relationship with him through prayer, Scripture, reflection, and hands-on work (activities).

BECOME CATHOLIC



St. Gertrude Bulletin talked with parishioners Ryan and Corey Longtin about their recent experiences in our Become Catholic (RCIA) program.

I had never been inside a Catholic church). When we walked in, I felt true peace for the first time. I became emotional. Then during Mass when we saw the priest hold up the Eucharist, we knew this is where we belonged. We had such a strong desire to be able to receive Communion. We knew, in that moment, that Jesus was truly present! And in order to be able to fully have his grace within the sacraments,

we would need to go through the Become Catholic program.

SGB: What did you enjoy most about the program?

Ryan and Corey: We most enjoyed being able to understand the Catholic faith on a much deeper level, asking any question with no judgment, and making lifelong friendships.

SGB: How has becoming Catholic changed your lives?



AN HOUR IN SILENCE?

It is difficult to admit one's ignorance, but as a 30-year convert to Catholicism, I did not understand Eucharistic adoration until St. Gertrude opened the Mother of Mercy Adoration Chapel. To be candid, I spent my first years as a Catholic without an understanding of the True Presence of

Christ in the Eucharist. Often, lifelong Catholics assume others understand when speaking Catholic language. In many ways, converts are like aliens in a new land when entering the Church.

The first time I was confronted about our belief in the True Presence was on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land 10 years ago. The leader of the pilgrimage,

Presbyterian pastor,

commented to me, "I can't believe you Catholics think Jesus is in that piece of bread." I did not know how to respond. When I returned home, I decided that if I was going to be a Catholic, it was imperative for me to understand the teachings that I did not absorb in RCIA. Father Bill Marks, a diocesan priest in Indiana, is my spiritual director. His wisdom and guidance and my frequent attendance at Mass, studying the Catechism, Catholic literature, and media has clarified so many Catholic teachings and doctrines over the years. My son and his wife brought my husband and me to St. Gertrude, and the Dominicans' pursuit of teaching opened my heart to the truth of Catholicism.

When St. Gertrude was blessed with the opening of the adoration chapel, our Lord led me to become a Eucharistic guardian. When I first entered the adoration chapel, I knew it was consecrated ground that held a peace like no other.

One aspect of faith that I have struggled with is sitting in silence with our Lord. The thought of being silent and still for an hour seemed impossible. Now, often an hour of adoration is not enough. I personally relate to the Gospel story of Martha and Mary, sitting at the feet of Jesus and listening to him.

I know that adoration is one of the most important practices in my faith journey. Joining the team of Eucharistic guardians is my anchor every week. I now have time to be in the chapel two days a week. My commitment to being a guardian in the chapel is not always easy, because I need to see that my week is organized around my scheduled adoration times.

There are so many ways to be a part of this ministry. You can share with a partner, like I do with my husband. Also, being on the substitute list and filling in is of service. I have found that being a guardian has given me so much more than I could have imagined. Helping to sustain the availability to adore and be with Christ who is always waiting for us, seven days a week, is paramount in my religious quest.

The lasting effect of silence with our Lord is more important than ever in our noisy, complicated world. When our grandchildren returned from Catholic Youth Summer Camp, I asked our 15-year-old grandson and 13-year-old granddaughter what their favorite activity was at camp. They both said their time in Adoration. Adoration is for everyone including our young people.

Our adoration chapel needs committed guardians. Prior to COVID, there seemed to be more parishioners who were willing to guard Jesus for an hour a week. It is such a privilege to watch over Jesus in the


> Eucharist. I am a witness to the reality that when entering the chapel, there is a knowing that there is only the Lord and myself. I give thanks for those who share in this important ministry. Together, we can grow in faith, hope, and love helping to sustain St. Gertrude Church and the Catholic Church

through Eucharistic adoration.

ASK A PRIEST— HOW TO MAKE THE CHRISTMAS SPIRIT LAST

Q: With all the intense buildup to Christmas Day, December 25 seems to pass so quickly! What are some ways to make the Christmas spirit last?

A: "On the twelfth day of Christmas my true love gave to me . . ." As you probably know well, the 12 days of Christmas begin on Christmas Day. Here are some ways to keep the Christmas season going so that the wonder of this day can truly trickle into the other days of the year.

- 1. Celebrate the 12 days of Christmas. Don't take down the decorations yet! As the fun carol suggests, there can be more celebration and gift-giving in the days to come. God has more gifts to give us, too: come to Mass for some of the days of the Octave of Christmas, including January 1, the Solemnity of the Mother of God. What other kinds of "gifts" can you give loved ones, as well as strangers, during these days? Take a hint from the Church's liturgical calendar, especially trying to do something special on Twelfth Night or Epiphany.¹
- 2. **Visit the Creche each day**. Keep a Nativity scene somewhere prominent and peaceful in your home so that you can stop by in a free moment and say a quick prayer. If you're passing the church, visit the outdoor Nativity or stop inside for a moment of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. Sing quietly, "O Come, All Ye Faithful," or repeat one of the Church's many prayers for adoration of the God-made-man, our Savior Jesus Christ.
- 3. **Read or listen to something Christmas-relevant.** Have you ever read Charles Dickens' masterful *A Christmas Carol*? Or how about listening to Handel's exuberant *Messiah*? There is also the spiritual treasure of reading the infancy narratives from the holy Gospel (Mt 1-2; Lk 1-2), or meditating on the First Letter of St. John or a theological/spiritual book about these accounts.²

Finally, remember the Good News: for a Christian, every day is a little "Christmas," that is, a day when the Savior comes in humble appearance to meet us. Jesus would have us recognize his presence in the breaking of the Bread and in service to the least and in the peace of our hearts, if we would welcome him there.




