## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



## SOME PARISH FACILITIES UPDATES SPRING 2024 EDITION

As Catholics, it has been quite a busy past few weeks for us in the Church. I think you will all agree that the Holy Week and Easter liturgies were especially beautiful this year, and attendance at the various Masses and other

liturgies was through the roof. It was such a joy to see how so many people gave of their time and effort to make these liturgies as special as they were. It was also a joy to see the enormous numbers of people who immersed themselves in these mysteries of our faith over the past two weeks.

Now that Easter Sunday is behind us, it seems to be a good time for a whole slew of parish updates . . . as it is going to be a VERY busy spring and summer around St. Gertrude!

#### FACILITIES PROJECTS

There will be a number of very needed construction projects happening on the parish grounds this summer as we work to improve our buildings to best serve our mission. One of the most noticeable will be significant renovations to the Parish Center gymnasium. We recently learned that the floor, basketball hoops, and safety padding around the gym do not meet the current safety requirements as specified by the various governing bodies that oversee our youth athletics. As such, we will be replacing all of those items in the gym this summer. We have signed the contracts for this work, and we estimate it will begin mid-July. A portion of the cost of this work will be covered by the parish, with the remaining portion to be raised through fundraising efforts of the Athletic Boosters.

We are also moving along in the process of renovating the Parish Center bathrooms and possibly the kitchen, using the money raised from the Centennial Gala for this purpose. At this point, we have a good grasp of the scope of work we would like done to those spaces and are working to obtain bids for those projects from local contractors.

Late summer will also see the replacement of the main chiller that provides air conditioning to the entire school building. Our current unit is the original from when the school was first built, and in recent years, the amount of downtime for repairs has increased in frequency and cost to the point that continuing to sink money into repairing an outdated piece of equipment no longer makes good financial sense. In addition, there will be some work done to repair/reseal the parking lot, which I am sure everyone has noticed is beginning to crumble in many places and can't be allowed further degradation without being addressed.

Finally, I have a major update regarding the **sound system**. The committee that I assembled to review the proposals has studied them and had the opportunity to interview and question the sound engineers from the various companies. The committee and I have come to a unanimous decision about which company we are confident will do the best job. We are finalizing and tweaking some of the technical aspects of the proposed scope of work and expect to be in a position to have the contract signed in the next few weeks. Much of the high-end equipment being installed will need to be shipped from various places in Europe, so it is too early to say exactly when the work will happen, but we are estimating late summer for when the system installation will happen.

Believe it or not, that is not even the full list of projects on our summer radar, but those are the ones that are far enough along in the planning process that I am happy to share with the parish community. As we work very hard this summer to improve various buildings of our parish complex, I would encourage everyone to keep in mind that the most important work of building we can ever do is the spiritual work of building up our community of faith. "And, like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house . . . to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 2:5).

### ASK A PRIEST—DOMINICAN RITE MASS, PART 1

FATHER LUKE VANBERKUM, O.P.

Q: I hear we have these special Dominican Rite Masses once in a while. What is that all about?

**A:** Let's start by thinking about tradition. One of my family's traditions while growing up was on Christmas morning. We could not open any

presents until we had done a procession around the house with the baby Jesus and then placed him in the manger. We did this every year. We never wrote it down—in fact, wouldn't it seem somewhat odd to write down family traditions? Instead, we enacted it—we *lived* it—and that is how it was passed down. In a similar way, the Dominican Rite is a tradition that has to be enacted to be passed down.

The Dominican Rite is an older form of the Mass. There is only one sacrifice on the cross that saves us from our sins and that our Lord memorialized in an unbloody manner by giving us the Eucharistic sacrifice. Crucial point: there is only one Mass. However, there are different *forms* of the Mass. At St. Gertrude, we are very used to the *Novus Ordo Missae*, or the Mass according to the Roman Rite promulgated in 1969. But, there are many different rites. There is the very old Ambrosian Rite and the Mozarabic Rite. There are also Eastern Catholic rites, such as the Maronite Rite (as at St. Anthony of Padua here in Cincinnati). The Dominican Rite goes back to the thirteenth century, when the Master of the Order of Preachers (the Dominicans) wanted a rite in which all the friars could be unified in worship.

The Dominican Rite is a tradition of the Order of Preachers, and therefore it should be enacted in order to be passed on. Now, unlike what I just said above, there is a written component to the tradition. There are written rules (called rubrics) that tell the priest and servers what to do. You will notice that their movements are prescribed for them. Just reading those rubrics, however, would not be enough to preserve the tradition. Just practicing would not be enough. We are meant to enter into the Mass, to participate in the Mass, and therefore the Mass has to take place. We have to worship. When we worship the Father through the Son and in the Holy Spirit, then we are living the tradition and passing it on. This is what we do as a community and what you do with your family every Sunday at Mass, no matter the rite.

What we see is that we do not continue the tradition of the Dominican Rite for the sake of tradition. We do not continue the tradition of the Dominican Rite for the sake of beauty (we have a very beautiful *Novus Ordo* liturgy already!). We continue the Dominican Rite because, through it, we worship God in the way that so many of my saintly brothers and sisters in the Dominican Order—St. Raymond of Peñafort, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Catherine of Siena, Blessed Imelda (all of whom we are honoring this year at our Dominican Rite Masses)—worshiped God.

You will notice that the Dominican Rite places a different emphasis on how that worship of God takes place. What at first may seem the most unfamiliar—the priest does not face the congregation and the Mass is entirely in Latin—is not actually what is distinctive about the Dominican Rite. In the *Novus Ordo* (what we are most familiar with), the priest is allowed to face away from the people (check out St. Cecilia's in Oakley) and can say the Mass entirely in Latin (as he might say it in Spanish). The priest, no matter the rite, is ordained to unite God and the people, to lift up the sacrifice to him on the people's behalf. That is why the sanctuary is elevated. That is why the priest sometimes stands between the people and the altar. That is why the priest can stand facing the same direction as the people—toward God, leading the people, like Moses, to the Promised Land through the Eucharistic sacrifice of the cross that has opened heaven for us.

What is distinctive about the Dominican Rite are certain elements that emphasize this role of the priest. Here are two examples. First, the priest begins the Mass with the prayers at the foot of the altar. Here he asks pardon for his own sins and the sins of the people to be prepared to approach the holiness of God. He follows this with another prayer when he goes up to the altar. The priest has to recognize the enormity of what he has been ordained to do. The people share in this moment by kneeling and listening to the Kyrie—Lord, have mercy!— sung by the choir. Second, you will notice that the priest begins the Eucharistic Prayer quietly while the Sanctus is being sung. The priest has been ordained to approach God through the Eucharistic sacrifice-that is his role in the Body of Christ-to join heaven and earth on the altar in the Eucharist. The quiet of the Eucharistic Prayer emphasizes this priestly role. The choir assists the people and the priest in preparing to behold this miracle by singing "Holy, Holy, Holy." This is the song of the angels: heaven is being opened, where we go together.

Here is why I love, and am grateful, that at St. Gertrude we can offer both the Dominican Rite and the *Novus Ordo*. The way the Dominican Rite emphasizes the role of the priest helps to solidify in me the priestly identity of standing before God through the Eucharistic sacrifice. The way the *Novus Ordo* emphasizes the role of the priest helps to solidify in me the priestly identity of bringing the prayers and sacrifices of God's beloved people to him through the Eucharistic sacrifice. Neither element is missing in the other, but each rite emphasizes the role of the priest differently. Living both rites helps bring out the goodness of each and helps us worship God.

The musical setting of the Ordinary will be the seventeenth century Benedictine nun Chiara Margarita Cozzolani's *Mass for Four Voices* (1642). A relic of St. Catherine of Siena will be available for veneration after Mass.
