HEALTH AND SAFETY MEASURES

Keep a prudent distance inside the church. Ushers will help ensure safe seating on Sundays.

A SEASON OF RENEWAL, A TIME TO BE REBUILT

Throughout the Easter season, the Church invites us to reflect upon the Acts of the Apostles. These writings present us with events and developments in the early Church following the Resurrection of Jesus. Acts presents us with facts that illuminate

the conversion of people to faith in Jesus through the repentance of their sins, and the new life they come to experience in the grace of the Holy Spirit. Each person's encounter with the Risen Lord is life-changing. We hear and learn from these writings that God gave marvelous growth to the Church through the preaching of the Apostles, the miracles worked through them, and through the daily activities and witness of the Christian community. They were a visible and tangible expression of the presence and love of God.

The Holy Spirit continues to work in the Church today, bringing people to repentance and faith in Jesus, and transforming their lives through His indwelling in their souls. In a practical way, God's work continues in the most local way through the parish church. The local parish is the "community of believers" united in heart and mind. The local parish is the place of encounter with Jesus for those inquiring, a place of human and spiritual growth for those choosing the path of discipleship, and a place of mercy for everyone who strives to work out their own salvation.

Acts records for us that, after the preaching of Peter on the day of Pentecost, 3,000 people were added to their number that day. These "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42). That description sounds like parish life. What is not recorded are the logistical and practical ramifications of such gatherings. What did they do for food, water, shelter, restrooms!, cry room, meeting rooms, etc.??? Surely there had to be a mix of seniors, parents, and children. How did all those different personalities get along with one another? Yes, the members of the early Church had received the gift of the Holy Spirit, but it is the responsibility of all those Spirit-filled people to learn and live charity among them. In my imagination, it was all far from "perfect," but they were striving for perfection.

Because a parish is a human community, there will always be difficulties and challenges, just as there were in the early Church. The Holy Spirit works through these moments to help everyone grow in grace, virtue, and holiness. In virtue of Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist, the divine life of God and the gift of charity is given to each of us. To us is given the responsibility of learning and practicing charity with one another. Ours is a large, dynamic, and diverse parish with seniors, singles, parents, and children. Each has a personality and particular life circumstances. Some people have physical challenges, others have mental illness or emotional burdens, and all of us are sinners. God calls us all together to love Him and one another. As

St. Paul says, "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ....As we have the opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of the faith" (Gal 6:2,10).

As the parish strives to rebuild its life following the pandemic, we will be renewing our mission to be a place of encounter with Jesus. Within our parish boundaries, there are souls who have not yet received the Gospel message of love, forgiveness, and new life



in Christ. These people need to see the witness of love among us. There are parishioners who have been absent for a while because of the pandemic. They, too, need a loving, patient, and understanding welcome. The "regulars" lastly, have a reasonable expectation to experience the love and mercy of Jesus through all their brothers and sisters in Christ who have received the same gift of the Holy Spirit.

Will the efforts of rebuilding be perfect? Probably not. But I do know that the Holy Spirit can work marvels in our lives as we receive His gifts and put them at the service of one another. The Holy Spirit can help each of us to grow in virtue and holiness through all those irritations and circumstances that will do marvels for us if only we do not despise them. The Holy Spirit will restore, renew, and revive our parish life as we allow the fire of His love to purify and sanctify our hearts.

Let us love one another and pray for each other,



ASK A PRIEST - DEATH TO SIN, LIFE WITH GOD

BY FR. JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P. Q: What does it mean that Jesus conquered sin on the cross? What sin did He conquer? If we all still have

conquered sin on the cross? What sin did He conquer? If we all still have original sin and we all still continue to


sin, then what sin did He conquer?

Q: Since Jesus came to earth as a man to "reset" the human race, please explain why we would pay attention to modern theories of evolution?

A: These questions relate to the Church's doctrines on Original Sin and Redemption/ Sanctification. I will not pretend that these topics haven't fueled endless theological discussions both inside and outside the communion of the Catholic Church. Nevertheless, some basic doctrinal truths can help set us in the right direction so that we avoid speaking or living in ignorance of the Church's salutary teaching. This week, we'll mostly tackle the first question.

At the Easter Vigil, we heard about the irreversible effects of Christ's salvific death and triumphant Resurrection: "As to his death, he died to sin once and for all; as to his life, he lives for God. Consequently, you, too, must think of yourselves as being dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus." (Romans 6:11) Adam and Eve freely rebelled from God's original plan for the human race. By sinning, they prevented their descendants from enjoying the harmony of a completely intact and holy human nature — a life of perfect understanding and respect with one's Creator, one's neighbor, and within oneself. What we casually call

"human nature" nowadays is really an *injured* nature, a general status transmitted congenitally and referred to with the blanket term of **original sin**. It is not a personal choice of ours (Adam and Eve took care of the decision-making here!) but a spiritual, psychological, and even physical disorder we inherit; it is the disruption of the harmonious state of **original justice** in which humanity was created (See CCC 400).



Thankfully, God does not like to see children punished for the bad choices of their parents, so He immediately effected a plan to save us from this state of rebellion and alienation. Jesus Christ, Son of God and son of Mary, was uniquely qualified both to stand in for sinful humanity *and* atone for our collective and personal sins. He met the most threatening punishment for sin – death – and robbed it of its power eternally to separate us from God and neighbor. He paid the price of our guilt and had credit left over! This is the teaching of Christian **redemption**: because of God's love for us, Jesus freely gave His life as a ransom so that we would no longer have to face the spiritual consequences of sin (See CCC 622).

The Church really believes and lives as if death had "lost its sting." (See 1 Cor 15:55) This is because, although we still suffer death and a host of other disturbing "infections" on all levels, **Baptism** profoundly connects us to God's redemptive plan in Jesus. Like Jesus, baptized Christians may still face sickness and temptation and death while we live in the world. But thanks to the reconciliation He accomplished and His super-abundant grace flowing into our minds and hearts through Baptism and the other Sacraments, we experience a healing "at the roots:" the baptized no longer carry the guilt of original sin or its worst punishment, eternal separation from God. Yes, other "temporal" effects of original sin are still experienced and will be experienced until all things are restored in Christ at the end of time. But Jesus' death and Resurrection have taken away the lasting "bite" of these afflictions, which is sin.

All this helps provide an answer to the second question, which inquires about the "newness" of redeemed humanity. It is important to distinguish the principles of our renewal in **grace** (i.e. friendship with God) from the principles at work within our **human nature**. It is truly wonderful that God has sent His Son who not only enables the "reset" of our friendship with God, but through the gift of His Spirit, makes us God's adopted sons and daughters. This unfolding event may "outshine" the story of our physical, psychological, and social development as human beings, but does not make our history irrelevant. In the Resurrection, when all things are made new, we will still have truly human souls and bodies, albeit ones that shine with the image of Jesus' glory. And we can give thanks to God for everything in the present life that testifies to His wisdom and loving care.
