

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



SPRING FACILITIES UPDATES, PART II SOME SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

A few weeks ago, I shared about some of the projects happening around the parish this summer. I ended that letter by saying that what I had shared was only a partial list of this

summer's projects. Today I would like to share the rest, including a few big changes that will impact both our school and our parish staff.

To begin in the school, many have already heard that we had such a large waiting list for kindergarten that we will be adding a third kindergarten classroom next year. This third kindergarten classroom will be located in the space that is currently the school chapel. That space was originally built to be a classroom and not a chapel, and so it will return to its original purpose.

The new location for the school chapel is the space currently occupied by the parish Office of Evangelization & Faith Formation staff. It is the perfect location for the chapel . . . right in the heart of the school, at a corner that every student (and teacher) will pass by every single day. Its very location will emphasize the deep spiritual reality that Jesus lies at the center of everything we do at St. Gertrude School. The interior walls in that space are not original but were added when it was first turned into offices; those will be knocked down to create a large, rectangular space that will be the ideal size for the chapel.

Over in the Parish Center, the current Little Flower Library will become the new home for the Office of Evangelization & Faith Formation for the upcoming year. The books and bookshelves from the library will migrate over to the St. Joseph Room, which will serve as the library on Sunday mornings while remaining a general meeting space for other parish groups, ministries, and events at other times during the week.

The reason for all these changes can be summarized using three beautiful words: WE ARE GROWING! Demand for enrollment at our school is growing, the number of families joining our parish is growing, the number of parish groups and ministries requesting space for meetings and events is growing. *Everything is growing*. This is a fantastic "problem" to have! This growth has made us realize that, collectively as a parish, we have simply outgrown our available facilities. During this upcoming year, as part of our strategic planning implementation, we are going to be doing a very comprehensive study of our facilities space and our needs as a parish moving forward. Hopefully this will result in coming up with a plan to most efficiently utilize the space we currently have over the next few years, while also identifying our realistic needs for space five, ten, twenty years down the road in order to best fulfill our mission.

Work on most of the projects mentioned in this letter will commence later this month.

Finally, the entryway (lobby) at the front of the school building, the area just outside the doors to the parish and school offices, will be getting a significant "facelift" to make the space more beautiful and welcoming. This will be happening in early June. While that work is in process, there will be no access through those doors to the parish office. Once we have the exact dates for that work, we will announce them in the bulletin and provide information on how parishioners can reach the office while the work is happening.

So many good things! It is going to be quite the summer, and the results of all these projects will be a wonderfully transformed St. Gertrude. Between now and then, let me say in advance: please pardon our dust!

ASK A PRIEST—SIGN OF THE CROSS AND CRUCIFIXES

Q: When did Christians first start tracing the Sign of the Cross on themselves? What is the history of images of the cross? When did the corpus start getting removed from images of the cross?

A: From the earliest days of the Church, Christians have had a special devotion to the cross, tracing it on themselves and later depicting it in art when it was safe to do so. Some argue that it is the seal or sign referred to in the Book Revelation 7:2-3, "Then I saw another angel ascend from the rising of the sun, with the seal of the living God, and he called with a loud voice to the four angels who had been given power to harm earth and sea, saying, 'Do not harm the earth or the sea or the trees, till we have sealed the servants of our God upon their foreheads." In a couple places in his letters, St. Paul also speaks of the seal and the marks of Jesus, which could be a reference to the Sign of the Cross.

In a beautiful little book from Word on Fire called *The Sign of the Cross: Recovering the Power of the Ancient Prayer*, Bert Ghezzi tells us that St. Basil the Great wrote in the 300s AD that "the Apostles 'taught us to mark with the sign of the cross those who put their hope in the Lord'—that is, those who presented themselves for Baptism."¹ Ghezzi also relates that the ancient Christian writer Origen shows us that, by his day (c. 185–c. 253 AD), tracing the Sign of the Cross on oneself had become pervasive in the Christian world, as he wrote, "The shape of the letter tau presented a resemblance to the figure of the cross and that this represented a prophecy of the sign that Christians make on their foreheads. For all the faithful make this sign when they undertake any activity, especially prayer or reading Holy Scripture."²

This writing of Origen reveals an interesting point: there have been different ways of representing the cross and tracing it on ourselves throughout Church history. The Greek letter tau, written as a **T**, is the first letter of the Greek word *Theos* which means "God." Some crosses the Romans used in their punishments were in this shape, so sometimes, in the early church, this was the Sign of the Cross that was used because it had the added reminder that Jesus was God. Originally, the cross was mainly just traced on the forehead and in a small and discreet gesture. It was in later centuries that the larger sign we use today, tracing it from the head to the torso and across the shoulders, started to become more popular. This was in response to the Monophysite heresy which denied that Jesus had a human nature. This was also a time when Christians would hold two fingers or thumb and forefinger together when making the Sign of the Cross to represent the two natures of Christ, divine and human.³

Because early Christians were persecuted, they did not publicly display images of the cross in art or architecture. But they did do it in secret, especially in the catacombs. The Catholic Encyclopedia tells us that to further reduce chances of being discovered, they also originally would frequently depict the cross in a disguised way. The anchor and the trident are examples of this in the catacombs.⁴

Initially, depictions were almost always of just the cross without the body of Jesus (that is the crucifix). Because of the ignominy in the Roman world of being crucified, Christians were reticent to depict the body of Christ on the cross, though occasionally it did happen.⁵ The Catholic Encyclopedia relates that examples have been found of a lamb lying at the foot of an anchor and of a dolphin wrapped around a trident as symbols of the crucifixion. Perhaps even more surprisingly it says: "In the Catacomb of St. Callistus a sarcophagus, dating from the third century, was found, the front of which shows Ulysses tied to the mast while he listens to the song of the Sirens; near him are his companions, who with ears filled with wax, cannot hear the alluring song. All this is symbolical of the Cross, and of the Crucified, who has closed against the seductions of evil the ears of the faithful during their voyage over the treacherous sea of life in the ship which will bring them to the harbour of salvation."⁶

The legalization of Christianity by Constantine and the discovery of the True Cross by Constantine's mother, St. Helena, in 326 AD was the beginning of the public depiction of the cross and more gradually of the Crucifixion in Christian art and architecture. Churches began to be built in cruciform shape. Over the years, crucifixion scenes became more realistic and fully developed, including the thieves on either side of Christ and the holy women and St. John at the foot of the cross. There continues to be, to this day, variations in the way that Christians make the Sign of the Cross, the prayer they say with it, and the ways they depict it in art. But, in all instances, it is meant to remind us of the grace and power Christ affords us whenever we recall the moment when he redeemed the world.
