## PUBLIC WORSHIP AT ST. GERTRUDE CHURCH IN TIME OF PANDEMIC

Updated November 1, 2020

The Archbishop dispenses the faithful from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass. Please do not come if you feel sick. Those who are vulnerable may consider coming to a less crowded weekday Mass.

#### HEALTH AND SAFETY MEASURES

- Keep a prudent distance inside the church. Ushers will help ensure safe seating on Sundays.
- We ask that the faithful wear cloth masks for the sake of the common good. People with breathing difficulties and young children should not wear masks.
- Only friars, sisters, novices, lay ministers and a limited number of staff members will be in the sanctuary and sacristy.
- Volunteers will help wipe down high-touch surfaces between Sunday Masses.

#### HOLY COMMUNION

- You are not obliged to receive Holy Communion at every Mass you attend. Consider making a spiritual communion, or receiving at a weekday Mass.
- The faithful who choose to receive Holy Communion will come up to the altar rail, where one or two priests will distribute the sacred host. Keep space in line, and only remove your mask at the rail.
- You may receive in the hand or on the tongue, kneeling or standing. Note: the rail is a high-contact surface.

## FINDING PEACE IN THE LOWLINESS OF BETHLEHEM

Last week's first reading, from the Prophet Isaiah, offers a powerful image that captures the essence of this season of Advent — a season of anticipation. Isaiah cries out, "Oh, that you would rend the heavens and come down." The verb "to rend" connotes a certain violence or the use of force in order to tear or to cut down. It is an apt word to describe exactly what we would expect God to do if he actually did "come down." From God, we would expect a certain show of force, a display of power, and an undeniable presence.

In this Sunday's Gospel, John the Baptist, that great forerunner of Jesus appears on the scene with his voice crying out and inviting us to prepare our hearts. Like that great exhortation from the Book of Joel that we read on Ash Wednesday, "rend your hearts, not your garments," John invites us to open our hearts that we might receive the God who is about to tear open the heavens to meet us. This week, John says, "One mightier than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals." Joseph Ratzinger notes that John embraces a certain Old Testament style, describing Jesus as one who would "place the axe to the roots of humanity, as a judge full of holy wrath and divine power."

I find Isaiah's prayer quite fitting for our times when we're attracted to earthly, or human solutions to our many troubles. I also appreciate John the Baptist sounding the alarm about the arrival of the Mighty One.



Yet, I am also struck by the cover image from last week's bulletin. Fritz von Uhde painted "Transition to Bethlehem" in 1890, the year he was appointed Professor at the Academy of Fine Arts in Munich. He was known for painting images of peasants and for modernizing religious works. This painting depicts

Joseph and Mary, who is quite pregnant. They travel light, with Mary holding a basket of their provisions for the day and Joseph carrying a small satchel and his carpenter's saw. Mary leans on Joseph, who supports her on the difficult journey. They head into town, a Bethlehem depicted as a contemporary European town, on a road marked with tracks from horse and wagon walking to Bethlehem. It appears to be cold and damp. This modern rendition of Joseph and Mary's difficult journey helps us to grasp the poverty of their situation and, perhaps, we can feel our own poverty as well.

Uhde's painting also reminds us that when God heeds Isaiah's entreaty and actually does rend the heavens and come down, He did not do so with a display of force or a show of power as we might expect from God almighty. Instead, God arrives on the scene in utter lowliness. Similarly, "John had known that He would be greater than he," Ratzinger points out, "but he had not known the new kind of His greatness: It consists in humility, in love, in the cross, in the value of obscurity, in the silence which Jesus, as the one who is even greater, is lifted up as the greatest in the world. In the end, the truly great does not lie in the size of the physical dimensions but in what is no longer measurable through them....The real and the highest values occur in this world precisely under the sign of lowliness, obscurity, silence.... In Bethlehem, God, who had chosen the small, forgotten people of Israel as His people, finally made the sign of littleness the decisive sign of His presence in this world."

God is mighty indeed, though His might does not appear as the "worldly wise" would have it.

Along this same line, this week we celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception (December 8). Here we recall the work of God's grace in preserving Mary from the stain of original sin at the time of her conception. For Mary, a poor and humble girl from humble Nazareth, God has done a great thing. We also celebrate the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas (December 12). Here, we recall Mary's appearance to a poor and humble Juan Diego on Tepeyac Hill outside of Mexico City. Eventually, Juan Diego's tilma would bear a miraculous image of Our Lady — a sign that convinced the bishop to build a church on Tepeyac Hill and one which has been a source of consolation for millions of people.

Several weeks ago, in my column on November 22, I said I want peace for my parishioners this Christmas. These first weeks of Advent give us some clues as to how we might find that peace. We are to beg God, with Isaiah, to "rend the heavens and come down." But, we must also heed the calls of John and Joel, to rend our hearts and to thus prepare the way of the Lord. In taking this path, we ready ourselves to receive the peace of God, a peace the world cannot give (cf. Jn. 14:27) and one that does not come through a show of divine force that stamps out all unrest and injustice. Instead, we access this peace in the presence of a God who hides Himself unexpectedly in the lowliness of Bethlehem. If we are "poor in spirit" (Mt. 5:3) and willing to seek Him in the Bethlehem of our own lives, we will find the peace we are looking for.

Each month, the St. Gertrude Bulletin will feature an interview with a member of the Evangelization Team at the church. This month, we're highlighting Kristen Eggers, Assistant to the Director of the Evangelization Office.

## St. Gertrude Bulletin: What is your current role at St. Gertrude?

Kristen: I am the Assistant to the Director

of the Evangelization Office. My roles and responsibilities have quite the range. As I am in the middle of writing this, I ordered 7 boxes of cookies from Amazon, proofread a lesson plan for Family Faith, finalized the set-up schedule for Advent Wreath Making, and sent emails to 50+ people.

# SGB: What do you enjoy most about the ministry you are part of at St. Gertrude Church?

Kristen: I really enjoy how I can unite my love of spreadsheets with my love of people. Administration is one of my Spiritual Gifts (1 Cor 12:28). For example, I love all the behind-the-scenes work and planning that goes into a large parish event. With my skills, I get



to create an environment where people come together and encounter one another and the Lord.

### SGB: Did you always want to work for the church?

Kristen: When I started college, I didn't even go to Mass. When I declared my major as Dietetics at North Dakota State University, working for the Church wasn't even on my radar. Even after I joined a Bible study my junior year, I had every intention of working in the health field.

## SGB: Can you tell us a bit about your childhood?

Kristen: I grew up on a hobby farm in South Dakota. We had horses, an in-ground swimming pool, and 40 acres to explore, right in our backyard. I was painfully shy as a kid, so I happily spent my days at home with my siblings swimming, riding horses, and playing outside (in the sunshine or in the glorious snow!). I was quite the homebody, until I learned about gymnastics. Once I joined the local gymnastics center, I was a gym-rat for the next 10 years, balancing on the beam and bouncing on the floor almost every day of the week but Sundays.

## SGB: What brought you to Cincinnati?

Kristen: In 2011, my sister was growing her business that she just started, as well as growing her family. At the time, she had two boys under two years old, so I came to Cincinnati to be a full-time aunt, nannying my nephews. I had planned to stay in Cincinnati for only a year, but it has been 10 years and now my sister has 4 kids! While I don't nanny them full-time, I love living here and seeing



them all the time. It is a blessing to be so close to family...just last month I was able to attend my nephew's Confirmation in the Cathedral Basilica downtown as his sponsor.

## SGB: We've heard you were once a missionary. Is this true?

Kristen: After I graduated from NDSU, I served as a missionary with FOCUS (Fellowship of Catholic University Students) for 3 years. I was at the University of Wisconsin-Madison for one year and 2 years at Benedictine College in Kansas. One of the craziest things we did was fill a 2,000 gallon metal water trough with thousands of water balloons, which were used for a campus wide water fight at 6:00 a.m.! I learned so much, including how to have creative fun, and I am still benefiting from all the graces and experience I gained during my time with FOCUS. While I am no longer a paid full-time missionary with FOCUS, I will always be a full-time missionary. My mission is the same now as it was then: To know Christ Jesus and to fulfill the Great Commission by first living and then communicating the fullness of life within the family of God, the Church.



## FROM THE DIARY OF ST. MARIA FAUSTINA KOWALSKA







## 8, 2020

Although this year's Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is not a holy day of obligation (due to the pandemic), we are still making available a vigil Mass on Dec. 7 @ 7:30pm and a sung Mass on Dec. 8 @ 7:30pm. These Masses for the Solemnity are in addition to the regularly scheduled 7am, 8am, and 11:30am Masses on Dec. 8.



## Ask a Priest – Why so much during Advent from the Prophet Isaiah?

This week Fr. John Mark decides to "ask a priest" about the Church's use of the Bible during Advent.



Fr. John Mark: I have noticed that the Book of Isaiah is used at Mass almost every day during the first and second weeks of Advent. Why is Isaiah so significant to the Church this time of year? Are there any "keys" to Isaiah that would help us better understand the readings?

**Fr. Joseph**: For the Church, the Book of Isaiah contains the clearest prophecies regarding

Jesus Christ, especially in relation to His saving Passion. For example, the Suffering Servant passages of Isaiah (Is 52:13–55:12) are referred to 48 times in the New Testament! However, to understand the significance of Isaiah for Advent, we must understand something basic about Isaiah's theology: early in this book, the prophet makes a mockery of human strength in comparison with divine power. He proclaims that God can make a virgin bear a child (Is 7:14):

...the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold a young woman shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel. He shall eat curds and honey when he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good...

and that He can save His people through that child (Is 9:5-6):

For there is a child born for us, a son given to us and dominion is laid on his shoulders. This is the name they give him: Wonder-Counsellor, Mighty — God, Eternal-Father, Prince-of-Peace. Wide is his dominion in a peace that has no end, for the throne of David and for his royal power, which he establishes and makes secure in justice and integrity. From this time onwards and forever. The jealous love of the Lord Sabaoth will do this.

This is in stark contrast to the "common wisdom" of men like King Ahaz who presume that those who are not strong are completely defenseless (cf. Is 7).

The Greek Old Testament specifies the "young woman" to be a "virgin," a translation adopted by St. Luke (Lk 1:27-34) and long-treasured by the Church. The sign of a virgin bearing a child is the first way that Isaiah mocks the common wisdom of mankind; such a birth seems to oppose nature itself. What it really shows is that while the laws of our nature subject us to their power, God remains the master of nature and subjects everything to His power. Further, the name Immanuel ("God with us") must be understood in its original context: for Israel to understand "God-with-us" is a name meant for war. "God with us" was a reminder that God was not "with" every other nation. Pronouncing "Immanuel" meant to vest oneself with the power of God. But Immanuel appeared in the expected form of a child (Is 11:6-9):

The wolf shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid, and the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and the little child shall lead them... The suckling child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put his hand on the adder's den. They shall not hurt or destroy in all my holy mountain...

This is a very beautiful passage. To understand it, one must read Genesis 1-2. There, we find harmony among all God's creatures. Furthermore, man has authority over all the rest of creation: Adam both led and was served by the rest of creation. The Church understands the mission of Jesus Christ as salvation from the original sin and a return to the harmony that existed at the first creation. With the coming of this unexpected Messiah, God's original project can once again be realized.

The key to reading the passages from Isaiah in the Church's Advent liturgy is to understand that they are fulfilled in Jesus Christ. Concepts like justice, judgement, and peace are each fulfilled in Him. Justice for Isaiah is to receive what is duly expected. Jesus teaches us to render our love to God and neighbor, which leads to complete justice. Peace for Isaiah is not just the absence of war, but of hatred in the human heart. Jesus teaches us to live with this kind of peace. Judgement for Isaiah is to point out what is wrong with the current situation. With His coming, Jesus comes to reverse what sinful mankind considers normal and to return us to the original state of harmony with God and neighbor.
