HEALTH AND SAFETY MEASURES

• Keep a prudent distance inside the church. Ushers will help ensure safe seating on Sundays.

• We ask that the faithful wear cloth masks for the sake of the common good. People with breathing difficulties and young children should not wear masks.

• Only friars, sisters, novices, lay ministers and a limited number of staff members will be in the sanctuary and sacristy.

• Volunteers will help wipe down high-touch surfaces between Sunday Masses.

HOLY COMMUNION

• You are not obliged to receive Holy Communion at every Mass you attend. Consider making a spiritual communion, or receiving at a weekday Mass.

• The faithful who choose to receive Holy Communion will come up to the altar rail, where one or two priests will distribute the sacred host. Keep space in line, and only remove your mask at the rail.

• You may receive in the hand or on the tongue, kneeling or standing. Note: the rail is a high-contact surface.

We are invited to experience the grace of His love and power that delivers us from sin and brings us into the kingdom of His marvelous light. In turn, we are to radiate the light of Christ into the world around us.

To help us journey through the season of Advent, we have mailed an Advent and Christmas CD from *Ignite Your*



Parish to each registered family. This gift for your family contains talks by Fr. Dave Pivonka of The Wild Goose Ministries for each of the Sundays of Advent, along with devotional music by The Vigil Project. *Ignite Your Parish* has also created an online devotional companion booklet accessible via digital download that can take us deeper into the meaning of Advent and Christmas. This booklet can be used by families, and individuals to break open the message each week and to enter more deeply into this beautiful season. I invite you to visit <u>stgertrude.org/advent2020</u> to watch a video we produced with *Ignite Your Parish* and to learn more about how to utilize the digital resources this Advent.

Advent is an important season for any parish, and this is particularly true given all we have experienced in 2020. Advent invites our parish community to "reset," to turn to the Lord, that we might ever more faithfully live out our Christian lives.



Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI once wrote, "The parish is a beacon that radiates the light of the faith and thus responds to the deepest and truest desires of the human heart, giving meaning and hope to the lives of individuals and families." This insight gives clarity to the identity and mission of the parish, an insight that has

been embraced by Archbishop Schnurr and other leaders in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati.

I want to introduce the parish to an initiative of the Archdiocese entitled "Beacons of Light." Below are pertinent excerpts from a recent publication provided to priests in the Archdiocese:

Beacons of Light is a pastoral planning process through which the parishes of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati will come together in new ways, forming communities of faith that are united as members of Christ's Body, the Church. The beacon shines in the midst of darkness and points the way toward a bright future filled with hope. Over the next few years, Beacons of Light will result in stronger parishes that will form us to live and proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ in our homes, workplaces and schools, local towns and cities and in the world. Through Beacons of Light, parish groupings will be identified and parish leaders will come together to discern the shape of parish life for their grouping. People will be invited to share their hopes and dreams for the future as their parishes are drawn together as a community of faith.

Beacons of Light will be a unique experience of pastoral planning for the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. There are two essential elements of the process, which will take place simultaneously and will lead us to move from maintenance to mission, from surviving to thriving. Strategic Planning: involves data gathering, analysis, and the identification of the best possible parish groupings throughout the Archdiocese. Pastoral Planning: includes meetings and processes through which parish leaders will discern the shape of parish life for their grouping and create a pastoral plan for the future.

Work in this process has begun as staff members provide requested data. The parish priests have participated in a deanery meeting and an all-afternoon virtual convocation that introduced and outlined the process. More information will be forthcoming to the parish as I receive it. This process is an opportunity for us to examine the vitality of our parish and explore ways of expanding our mission of welcoming new members to our community; and forming and sending disciples of Jesus out to our local community to radiate the love, mercy, and light of Christ. This process needs prayerful support and participation. Pray for a new Pentecost in our parish and in our Archdiocese. Only with the Holy Spirit's power can we live as a dynamic parish in the context of our times.



HOLY TEACHING

ASK A PRIEST -HOW TO PRAY BETTER THIS ADVENT



BY FR. JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P. Q. In these trying times, Mary asks us to pray and repent. The Church has many traditions, prayers, and devotions to help us pray and repent. I (and many others) do not know what these are. Do you have any guidance or references to help resurrect these prayerful devotions?

A. We Catholics tend to overlook or at least undervalue the "helps" to knowing and loving God that the Church places at our fingertips. Maybe it's because we need to take a fresh look at things, hearing God's Word anew and seeing it fulfilled in the Church's daily life.

As Advent begins, it is good to rediscover the "treasure chest" that is the Sacred Liturgy, the Church's official public worship. The Liturgy of the Hours, the Eucharistic Sacrifice of



the Mass, and the devotional life that flows from these take on a stark, anticipatory, and deeply beautiful character. The readings and prayers speak of our thirst for God, our need for the Savior, and our wonderment in meeting Christ. An excerpt from the fourth section of the Catechism (On Prayer) provides a starting point in this respect:

"In the sacramental liturgy of the Church, the mission of Christ and of the Holy Spirit proclaims, makes present, and communicates the mystery of salvation, which is continued in the heart that prays. The spiritual writers compare the heart to an altar. Prayer internalizes and assimilates the liturgy during and after its celebration. Even when it is lived out 'in secret,' prayer is always the prayer *of the Church*; it is communion with the Holy Trinity."

The short answer to your question seems to be to let your heart be joined to the Church through her official prayer life, especially through participating fully and consciously in the Mass. Of course, this can be done with varying levels of success, so a couple practical suggestions should be helpful. I will refer to the image of the "altar of the heart" mentioned by the Catechism: 1. Let your heart be "chiseled" throughout Advent to be a place where prayer can be offered to God. This happens in fulfillment of our Baptism, when we were each given a share in Christ's priesthood such that we can offer pleasing prayers in Jesus' Spirit to the Father. Only sin can dull this sacramental power. If we have become de-sensitized to the dignity and demands of Baptism, we should listen attentively to the proclamation of St. John the Baptist this Advent, "A voice crying out in the desert places...."² Listening especially to the Mass readings and making use of sacred signs and customs like Holy Water, the Rosary, Advent Wreaths, candles, etc. can help us better receive the Word of God *and act on it*.

2. Let your heart be cleansed and anointed through the Sacrament of Reconciliation and, after that, through the Penitential Prayers of the Mass. Like those who first heard Jesus, repentance from sin is the first step to embracing his life-giving Gospel. The Church's Liturgy helps us to recall and confess our infidelities toward God and neighbor in many ways: "May God who enlightens every heart help you to know your sins and trust in His mercy."³

3. Let your heart become the resting place of Jesus by devoutly receiving Holy Communion. Let this moment be the apex of your Christmas celebration, and remember to give thanks and pray for those who have not yet received Jesus into their hearts. So many long to receive at Christmas the joy, peace, and merciful love that Jesus uniquely brings into the world. Model your prayer after Mary, who "treasured these things in her heart."⁴

With hearts renewed as living "altars" of God, this Advent we might repeat a prayer such as this one in order to anticipate the best Gift of Christmas and be ready to share Him with others:

Grant us, Lord, as we honor with joyful devotion the Nativity of Your Son, that we may come to know with fullness of faith the hidden depths of this mystery and to love them ever more and more. Through Christ our Lord.⁵
