

ORDINARY TIME

This past Tuesday, I did something I had not done for well over a month: processed into the sanctuary to celebrate Mass while wearing a green vestment. With our celebration of the feast of the Baptism of the Lord the day before, the liturgical season of Christmas (and the normative white vestments of the season)

officially came to an end. That means we have now officially begun the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, which is where we will remain until Ash Wednesday comes around in mid-February.

Ordinary Time. It doesn't sound terribly exciting, does it? It doesn't have the sense of expectation of Advent or the joy of the Christmas season, nor does it carry with it the penitential feel of Lent or the utter glory of the Easter season. If anything, it seems to be defined by what it's not, rather than what it is.

And yet the "ordinariness" of this time, much like the ordinariness of our lives, is incredibly important. I can't help but think about the lives of the saints. Sure, there are examples of saints who did incredibly unusual and heroic things, saints who worked miraculous healings or raised people from the dead, saints like the martyrs who held fast to the faith even under torture and death. But those sorts of stories are the exception, not the rule. Most saints became saints not because of one moment of extreme heroism, but because of their fidelity to God's will day after day, month after month, year after year.

Like them, the reality is that for most of us, for most of our lives, holiness is to be found not in the extraordinary and heroic, but in the ordinary patterns of our lives. As the "little way" of St. Thérèse teaches us, the path to holiness is found in doing the little things—the ordinary things—with great love.

So it seems to me that this liturgical season of Ordinary Time is the perfect time for us to come to appreciate anew the ordinary aspects of our lives. And to realize that the ordinary, the normal, the everyday patterns of life are precisely where we have the opportunity to truly grow in holiness and virtue . . . if only we seize the chance. I invite you to ponder and reflect upon what an "ordinary" day looks like for you at this moment of your life. What, in your typical day, might you be able to do with greater love? What, in your typical day, might you be able to do with greater patience? With greater humility? With greater attentiveness? With greater generosity?

If you can come up with answers to those questions \dots and even more, put those answers into practice during the days and weeks ahead \dots you will soon come to see, in your own life, that it is in the ordinary days of our lives where truly extraordinary growth in holiness can be achieved.

Q&A WITH MS. MADDIE WOEBKENBERG (ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT)

St. Gertrude Bulletin: Why did you choose to work at St. Gertrude School?

Ms. Woebkenberg: St. Gertrude has been a part of my life since day one, and coming back in a new capacity feels like coming home. I was interested in finding a new job and didn't know where to start when a family friend and current SGS parent recommended me for my current position. I interviewed with Sister Maria Christi, who was my former principal, and she took a chance on me. As I've grown in my position and gotten more comfortable, I have realized how happy I am to be here. Every day, I am reminded in

SGB: What do you love most about working at St. Gertrude School? **Ms. Woebkenberg:** The thing I love most about working at SGS is the people! I love seeing the kids come in every day eager to learn, the parents who stop by to see me while they're here to volunteer, working with the rest of the office staff, and the relationships I have formed with the teachers.

SGB: What is unique about St. Gertrude School?

a different way of my time here as a student.

Ms. Woebkenberg: The biggest differentiator between SGS and other schools is the Dominican presence. Nowhere else will you have the opportunity to be taught and prepared for sacraments by Dominican sisters. Another difference is the sense of community that surrounds you the second you enter the doors at SGS. From the moment I started working at St. Gertrude, I was welcomed with open arms. The community is so strong; there are families that have

been attending school here for generations! My graduation marked 67 continuous years of a Schubler/Woebkenberg family member attending SGS. More and more often, I see names of students I attended school with signing up for tours for their children to become students here.

SGB: How did a St. Gertrude School education positively impact your life?

Ms. Woebkenberg: My St. Gertrude School education gave me the foundation to succeed at both St. Ursula Academy and the University of Dayton. I was not only set up for success in the classroom, but also taught how to make and maintain lifelong friendships in my time at SGS. I learned the importance of morals and virtue that I still carry with me today.

SGB: What is one of your favorite memories from your time as a student at St. Gertrude School?

Ms. Woebkenberg: I have so many memories that I look back on fondly! I often think about playing sports with my classmates, being selected to crown Mary for my eighth grade May Crowning, our class retreats at Camp Joy and Camp Kern, drinking Vita Pups (slushies) at lunch, our second grade newspaper, and so many others. One of my favorites would have to be in junior high when I was called out of class to stand on a pedestal as a height visual for the St. Gertrude statue in front of the school. I now tell anyone who cares to listen that the statue was modeled after me (in height alone, but I still count it!).

SGB: Why should a parent consider a St. Gertrude School education? **Ms. Woebkenberg:** At St. Gertrude, you get a faith-guided, solid, grade school education in a caring, loving, religious community. You leave SGS more than adequately prepared for high school and the challenges that young people are exposed to.



EVANGELIZATION AND FAITH FORMATION



ORDINAL LIVING

Okay, everyone, at this point in January, we've moved from "celebration mode" to "ordinary life." We're back to school, work, and extracurriculars, and it's already the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time! (Where did the First Sunday go between Epiphany

and today is a question that still baffles me.) Maybe you're already back up to speed, but for me, this shift back to "ordinary life" feels . . . constraining. But, as I pray about it, getting back to the ordinary is actually freeing.

Skip this paragraph if you've heard this before: "ordinary" comes from the Latin *ordo*, meaning "order" or "rule." Ordinary life is lived according to an order, a set of priorities, sometimes called a "rule of life." The time that we wake up, eat, work, worship, sleep, work out, pray, and play all comes back to our priorities. Sometimes those priorities are good, like providing for our families, serving, time in prayer, and friendships. Sometimes those priorities are disordered, often good in themselves, but perhaps out of order. We have a "nature," a stable and God-given identity or purpose inside of us. We're made to be in right relationship with God, other people, Creation, and even with ourselves. Some rules of life set us free to live that way. Others keep us from a full life. In the Mass readings for this Sunday, we actually hear three sets of diagnostic questions to ask ourselves about our *ordo* for ordinary life.

First, we hear about Samuel sleeping in the temple. Often, when someone is asleep in the presence of God in the Bible, it's a sign of spiritual lethargy, numbness, or lack of awareness of his presence. Personally, if my mom caught me sleeping in Mass, she would not be happy. So here's diagnostic question one: Where do you feel like you're numb or half-awake in your life? Maybe it's in relation to family or someone in your life. Maybe it just feels like there's a blank space in your life. Maybe it's in prayer or at Mass. If you can name where you feel that lack of awareness, talk to God about it. Talk to a friend. Talk to a priest. Try the prayer of Samuel: "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." That numbness or sleepiness can be a sign of something God wants to do in your life.

Second, we hear that the body is for the Lord. This passage always reminds me of a friend who worked in HVAC service. Once he had to hand-lift a 400-pound unit with two other men. His colleagues looked at him with eyebrows raised. One said, "This body is built for speed" (i.e. not to lift heavy things), and the other said, "This body is meant to lie down." They got a good laugh out of that, but maybe those comments raise diagnostic question two: What are you willing to be physically uncomfortable for? What are you willing to give up food or sleep or entertainment for? What won't you do that for? And where do Mass, prayer, or acts of service land in that spectrum? What we allow to affect our bodies will tell us a great deal about our rule of life.

Finally, we hear Jesus ask his disciples, "What are you looking for?" They respond by asking where he's staying. Jesus' questions are always good to ask ourselves, so here's diagnostic question three: What are you really looking for? In your work, friendships, entertainment, eating habits—what do you really want? And when you pursue that, does it take you closer to where Jesus is? Does it open up the pages of Scripture or lead you to the sacraments? Does it help you love the people in front of you?

To end, I have two invitations for reading and prayer this Ordinary Time. Take five minutes to read Matthew 5, especially verses 1-12, where Jesus lays out an *ordo* that sets us free. And read Galatians 5:19-23, in which St. Paul writes about "the fruit of the Spirit," sure signs that we are following Jesus' rule of life: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control."


This Ordinary Time, keep in mind St. Paul's words: "For freedom Christ set us free; so stand firm and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery" (Galatians 5:1). Don't let "ordinary life" get you down. Ask these questions and let Jesus' *ordo* set you free.



Q: I've heard that Ohio taxpayers

who make a donation to a certified Ohio Scholarship Granting Organization are eligible for a dollar-for-dollar tax credit. What is an SGO, and how does it impact St. Gertrude School?

A: You are correct! An Ohio taxpayer's donation to a certified Ohio Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) is eligible for a dollar-for-dollar tax credit* up to \$750 per taxpayer, per tax year. (There is a maximum credit of \$1,500 for married couples who are filing jointly when each spouse makes his/her own gift of \$750.00.) Notice that this is a tax *credit*, not simply a tax *deduction*. For many taxpayers, a credit is more valuable!

A Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization that receives contributions from donors and grants educational scholarships to eligible students in Ohio. The Archdiocese of Cincinnati Foundation for Catholic Education (CEF) has been certified by Ohio as an SGO and provides an easy way for you to make a donation that will benefit St. Gertrude School families. That means that you make a donation to a cause you believe in, and it doesn't cost you an extra dime!

Making a donation is simple! Justvisit <u>CatholicBestChoice</u>. <u>org/SGO/</u>, select St. Gertrude School in the "School" field, and make your online gift.

If you want your tax credit to be applied to the 2023 tax year, you need to make your gift before April 15, 2024 (Ohio's unextended tax filing deadline).

Shortly after your gift has been received and processed, CEF will mail a letter to you that can serve as documentation for the Ohio tax credit when you prepare your Ohio income tax return. (You will also receive an email receipt after you make your online gift. Be sure to check your spam/junk folder if you don't see the email in your inbox.) In addition, CEF will notify St. Gertrude School of your gift.

You benefit from the tax credit, and St. Gertrude School can provide more tuition assistance to families! It's a win-win! You make a donation to a cause you believe in, and it doesn't cost you an extra dime!

We don't know how long the state will continue this program, so let's make the best of this opportunity

by promoting it to friends and family!

How It Works

Ohio taxpayers who donate to a Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) are able to claim a dollar-for-dollar, non-refundable tax credit on their state income tax return for up to \$750 per donor (up to \$1,500 for joint filers).

The Archdiocese of Cincinnati Catholic Education Foundation (CEF) is a certified SGO, and St. Gertrude School is a participating school. That means that when you donate to the CEF and select St. Gertrude School as your school, your gift will directly benefit current and future SGS families in need.
