INVITE HIM

The Gospel reading today recalls the miracle of Jesus at the wedding feast of Cana. What interests me in this passage is that "Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding." Presumably, the bride and bridegroom extended the invitation, which,

unforeseen by them, would bring them an abundant blessing. Their wedding and reception were a special and yet very human event. And God is present in his humanity in the person of Jesus precisely because they invited him to be there.

In this event, I see a lesson for our daily lives. God waits for us to invite him to be a part of our lives in all its facets. Do we invite him to join us in these moments? Do we ask him to bless the food of our tables when we are out to eat at a restaurant? Do we invite him to be the unseen guest at a summertime family reunion and take a moment to thank God for the gift of family and the blessings received? Do we invite him to be present at meetings and seek his wisdom and guidance? The list goes on.

We are coming out of the Christmas season wherein we celebrated the birth of the Word made flesh, who made his dwelling among us. He became human like us in all things but sin. So, wouldn't he "fit right in" with all the daily and significant moments of our lives? Wouldn't he take pleasure in the beauty of art or music? Wouldn't he share our delight at the child who hits his first home run? Wouldn't he join us in congratulating the child who takes first place at her piano recital? Wouldn't he share in our sorrows and heartaches in sickness and death? I say yes to each of these questions.

In the Book of Revelation, God says, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with me" (3:20). God respects our freedom. He waits for us to invite him into our lives, always ready to respond with his presence and grace. The encounter with God for which the human heart longs happens through our receptivity. I encourage you to look for ways to invite the Lord into all the facets of your life and to teach others to do so as well. These will become concrete and practical moments to experience the presence of God in our lives and in our world. And the blessings may be abundant.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity begins this Tuesday on January 18 and concludes on January 25, the feast of the conversion of St. Paul the Apostle. The theme of this year's week of prayer is, "We Saw the Star in the East, and We Came to Worship Him." The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity began in January 1908 through the initiative of two American Episcopalians, Father Paul James Wattson and Sister Lurana White, co-founders of the Franciscan Friars and Sisters of the Atonement. They were totally committed to the reunion of the Anglican Communion with the Roman Catholic Church. As such, they started a prayer movement that explicitly prayed for the return of non-Catholic Christians to the Holy See. When Father Paul and Sister Lurana became Roman Catholics, Pope Pius X gave his blessing to the Church Unity Octave, and in 1916, Pope Benedict XV extended its observance to the universal church. This recognition by papal authority gave the Octave its impetus throughout the Roman Catholic Church.

The topic of Christian unity was addressed at the Second Vatican Council in the Decree on Ecumenism. The Decree told Roman Catholics in clear and unambiguous terms: "In certain special circumstances, such as in prayer services for unity and during ecumenical gatherings, it is allowable, indeed desirable, that Catholics should join in prayer with their separated brethren. Such prayers in common are certainly a very effective means of petitioning for the grace of unity, and they are a genuine expression of the ties which even now bind Catholics to their separated brethren."

So today, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity belongs to all Christians who are sincerely interested in the fulfillment of Christ's prayer at the Last Supper "that all may be one" (cf. John 17:21). It is sponsored by the Commission on Faith and Order of the World Council of Churches and the Pontifical Council for Christian Unity. On a national basis, materials for the celebration of the Week of Prayer are the work of Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute in collaboration with the Commission on Faith and Order of the National Council of Churches and the Roman Catholic Bishops' Commission for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs. Let us pray to the Lord—alone and with other Christians—that the Holy Spirit will heal all that divides the members of the Body of Christ and bring fulfillment to the prayer of Jesus "that all may be one."



MEET THE TEAM: ABBIE KOHLER

Every so often, the St. Gertrude Bulletin features an interview with a member of our evangelization team. This month, we're highlighting Abbie Kohler, who joined us on January 9 as the interim coordinator of Family Faith.

St. Gertrude Bulletin: Tell us about yourself.

Abbie: I was born and raised in Minnesota, so basically the North Pole! (Kidding!) I am the youngest of four kids, and my parents, who still call Minnesota home, have been married for over 50 years. "My" part of Minnesota is known for its flatlands, where you can see for *miles* on a clear day—so I have fallen in love with the hills of Cincinnati. I've called the Southwest corner of Ohio home since 2017, and St. Gertrude is the first parish I joined. I am now in my fourth year as a Core Team Member for St. Gertrude's High School Youth Ministry. Since moving to the Wyoming area, I have attended St. James of the Valley while still serving at St. Gertrude.

(I know, that sounds so nerdy!) I believe when the Lord invites me to teach something, it's because he wants to teach *me* more. And I've found that although the teachings of our Church don't change, we change. So every time we encounter the faith, it may reach us differently than before. I've already seen that true as I've joined the January Family Faith classes. I approach adoration differently now, with a deeper understanding of how Jesus makes it possible for us to behold the face of God. I'm excited for more of that! I've also met some fantastic families already, and I look forward to meeting the rest in the weeks and months to come as we venture deeper into our faith together.

SGB: What has you excited about the future of the Church?

Abbie: That we *have* a future! And we can entrust it to the one who knows all things: God. The unchanging. The one who was, and is, and is to come. I (maybe you, too) have gotten comfortable with things changing in the last few years. I've had to. And to know that, though ever-evolving, our Church is rooted in someone who is steadfastly preparing a place for us in Heaven; to know that we *have* a future—that has me excited! Also, when many people are looking inward and outward to understand who we are as individuals and as a society, I am excited that many are finding truth in the Church. And I'm grateful we have a place and the person of Christ to come to and to find those answers.

SGB: What do you love to do in your free time?

Abbie: I love the Lord, good coffee, good people, and going on adventures! (I welcome all suggestions of places to explore—near and far!) I also received several great nonfiction books as Christmas gifts, so add reading to that list. 



ASK A PRIEST: THE ST. MICHAEL HYMNAL FATHER JORDAN KELLY, O.P.

St. Gertrude Bulletin recently visited with Father Jordan Kelly, O.P., director of liturgy, to discuss the impact that The St. Michael Hymnal will have on the liturgical life of our parish.

St. Gertrude Bulletin: Father Jordan, how did you first come to know about The St. Michael Hymnal?

Father Jordan: I have been a church musician since I was 10 years old. Throughout my time in music ministry, I have become aware of the many hymnals that Roman Catholic parishes can use. Shortly before my ordination in the late 1990s, I was the assistant director of music, choirmaster, and organist at the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis in St. Louis, Missouri. One of my responsibilities was to review new hymnals that could be used at the cathedral basilica or throughout the Archdiocese of St. Louis. The St. Michael Hymnal, Second Edition, was among the hymnals I reviewed.

In 2004, I gave a retreat for the Liturgical Institute at Mundelein Seminary in Mundelein, Illinois. (This retreat was specifically for church musicians.) Two of the retreatants were Linda Schaffer and Kevin O'Connor (now Father Michael O'Connor, O.P.), the editors of The St. Michael Hymnal Series. Throughout the retreat and afterwards, it became very clear to me that The St. Michael Hymnal would help the Church recover great parts of our musical patrimony and lead us to ever more faithfully "sing the Mass," the heart and soul of the liturgical renewal and the *raison d' etre* for the Roman Missal, Third Edition.

SGB: What are particular gifts that you think The St. Michael Hymnal will bring to St. Gertrude or to any parish?

Father Jordan: Several key points come to my mind. First, The St. Michael Hymnal presents itself in a way that tells you it is able to bear the weight of the mysteries it represents. In other words, The St. Michael Hymnal possesses an elegant simplicity that is worthy to be part of the worship of God. Its blue leather cover, clear printing on quality paper, and a liturgical lexicon make The St. Michael Hymnal eloquent! God and the liturgy only deserve our best; nothing expedient, minimal, or slovenly. Plastic covers, newspaper print, and colloquial language are not worthy of the worship of him who saves us from sin and rescues us from death.

Secondly, the musical corpus presented with The St. Michael Hymnal, Fifth Edition, is among the finest musical indexes offered to us today. The rich texts, coupled with thoughtful, lyrical tunes, offer us profound opportunities for prayer. For example, consider the poetry of John Greenleaf Whittier and the lush melody of Charles Parry found at #497, *Dear Lord and Father of Mankind . . . Lectio divina* for days. Consider, too, Father Ricky Manalo's, CSP, treatment of St. Thomas Aquinas' Pange Lingua, found at #709. (I am biased: I was Father Ricky's teacher!)


Thirdly, the thoughtful liturgical construction of The St. Michael Hymnal, Fifth Edition, both allows us and invites us to *sing the Mass!*¹ We experience this most directly through the Entrance and Communion Antiphons found in the "Missal" part of The St. Michael Hymnal, Fifth Edition, based upon the *Graduale Simplex*² while remaining faithful to the primacy of Gregorian Chant and the rich texts given to us in this musical form. The *Graduale Simplex* develops the faithful's familiarity with texts and tunes through seasonal repetition of both. We experienced this during Advent. Look at numbers 330 and 331. Two Communion Antiphons, the former for the first part of Advent (the coming of Christ in majesty), and the latter for the second part of Advent (recalling the mystery and wonder of the Incarnation). There will be many examples like this throughout the year.

SGB: Wow! Sounds like we really have a very special hymnal. So, why are there still worship programs?

Father Jordan: We do have an awesome hymnal! And, we will become more and more familiar with every page of it in the years and months to come. Unfortunately, no hymnal is complete, and there is music that we use, and will use, that is not in The St. Michael Hymnal. Programs will continue—in part for pedagogical reasons, in part for dignity, ease, and scope of experience. They are prepared and given in love. Please receive them the same way.

- This phrase "to sing the Mass" is so important because here we come into contact with the reality of the dialog given to us in the liturgy. Human language is incapable of expressing the depth of soul when communicating with God, but the song of the heart—this is the Divine exchange! This theology and insight is the particular gift of the *Liturgical Theology of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI*.
- ² Graduale Simplex (Simple Gradual) is a gradual in Latin and in Gregorian published by the Vatican in 1967 following the Second Vatican Council, so that the use of Gregorian chant can adapt to smaller parishes and more easily facilitate the song of the people of God.
