FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



OVERCOMING THE DARKNESS

For the last couple of weeks, one of the friars in the priory has been informing the rest of us about the length of nighttime in our region. The longest night (or the shortest day) came just before Christmas. Since that night, the days are becoming

longer and the nights shorter. Around the days of the winter solstice, the change in the length of light or darkness varies with just a few seconds. We don't even notice it. As time progresses toward spring and summer, the variable reaches into minutes of difference each day until we reach the summer solstice and the longest day of the year.

The gradual and incremental transition of light overcoming the darkness is a metaphor for the Christian life. Jesus is born as savior and redeemer for us, a light that overcomes the darkness of ignorance, sin, and death. As proclaimed in today's reading from the prophet Isaiah, "Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds over the people; but upon you the Lord shines, and over you appears his glory." But the transition of living in the light of the Lord doesn't happen all at once. The initial light of faith given to us on the day of our baptism is meant to increase in intensity throughout our lives. The change happens slowly. Perhaps we don't even notice it. However, with time and fidelity to prayer, the sacraments, and the works of mercy, faith grows in us. St. John the Beloved offers this teaching: "God is light, and in him there is no darkness at all. . . . If we walk in the light as he is in the light, then we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of his Son Jesus cleanses us from all sin." (1 John 1:5, 7). When we walk with Christ on the path of discipleship, we begin to see the effects and fruitfulness of God's grace working in us.

The wise men from the East followed a star—a light in the darkness of the heavens until they came to Bethlehem. There, they encountered the true light, the divine light, the perfect light who was born into the world. How is the Lord calling you to follow the light of faith in the midst of darkness? In a world filled with troubles, trials, challenges, frustrations, sickness, evil, and death, are you still following the star—living by faith? Are you trusting that the light of faith will lead you to the person of grace, blessing, and peace?

The child born for us—the child revealed to us—is God, who enters our world and offers his presence and grace at every moment and in every circumstance of our lives. He doesn't propose to make our lives easy (his own life wouldn't be easy). Perhaps that is why some reject him. The response we are invited to make is that of the Magi. We are to prostrate ourselves and to do him homage. We are invited to acknowledge him as God and to put our faith and trust in him. How can we do this?

Eucharistic adoration is a wonderful and practical way of growing in our relationship with the Lord and deepening our faith in him. The incarnational presence of Jesus remains with us in the Blessed Sacrament. It is the Word made flesh and dwelling among us. Those who regularly make a holy hour in the adoration chapel will testify that they have experienced the increase of light in their lives. They will tell you that the commitment to seek him in the midst of a busy life brings grace and peace.

The adoration chapel reopens this week following the Christmas break. We are continuing to hope and strive to return to perpetual adoration. As an incremental step, we are asking for volunteers to register for the overnight hours on Wednesday and Saturday. We need a minimum of two people for each hour because the Blessed Sacrament can never be left unattended. There are also some daytime hours that need additional volunteers. Please consider making a personal commitment to encounter the Lord and to growing in faith, hope, and love in his presence.

In this new year, let us renew our commitment to love one another and pray for each other.



ASK A PRIEST— CELEBRATING EPIPHANY, I.E. "LITTLE CHRISTMAS" FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P.

Q: Some Catholic cultures have a big celebration on January 6, the feast of Epiphany. Wouldn't it be great if we could take up this tradition here in Cincinnati?

A: The desire to celebrate Christmas as a full-blown season is very Catholic. (This is why the greeting "Happy Holidays" doesn't have to be taken as a denial of Christmas). Taking the lead from its Jewish roots, the Church for a long time has marked the most significant holy days with an extended, week-long celebration. Just like Easter, Christmas Day starts an octave of feast days, which then further extends into a "Christmas season." Epiphany (aka "Twelfth Night") is the culminating celebration of this season.


At one time, January 6 was the day when some Christians celebrated Jesus' birth. Even after December 25 became Christmas, January 6 held a special place in Christmastime celebrations.¹ For Catholics, it is the day called Epiphany, marking Christ's manifestation before the Magi from the East (see Mt 2:1-12). In countries like the United States where Epiphany is not a holy day of obligation, it is moved from January 6 to a Sunday nearby. This feast day really deserves the title "Little Christmas" because it marks the homage paid to the Christ Child by the first group of Gentiles. It foretells the wonderful spread of Christianity to all the nations and our own part in worshipping the incarnate Son of God.

In some cultures, Christmas remains a family-oriented celebration, while Epiphany is the more public festival. Besides giving us more time to celebrate, this custom holds a special lesson: first, we must each go for ourselves to discover the Child who lies in the manger; only after this encounter, as faith-filled Christians, will we be impelled to share the news of the Savior whom we have met. Every Catholic can play his or her part in one way or another to advance the news of Christmas from private encounter to public "Epiphany" or "manifestation" of Jesus to mankind.

How can we celebrate Epiphany and so better recognize the full scope of Christmastime? We can start by being intentional about the way we participate in Mass on the feast of Epiphany. (*Am I still in a Christmas mindset? Do I continue to ask God for the grace to adore his incarnate Son and to make him better known to others?*) After this, there are a hundred ways to keep the celebration of Christmas going during the weeks following December 25. (Keep your Christmas lights strung! Don't hesitate to send some late Christmas cards or visit someone bringing Christmas cheer!) No doubt, we can learn from our Catholic forebears who maintained many customs between December 25 and January 6 to keep the revelation of the Christ Child before their eyes.
