

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



THE WORD OF GOD

In the Gospel reading for Mass today, Jesus reads a passage from the prophet Isaiah and then declares to all who heard him, "Today, this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." His declaration is a clear teaching to all of us that "the word of God is

living and active" (Heb 4:12), a Word that continually speaks to every person who will listen.

Years ago, my relationship with sacred Scripture came alive when I read the following lines from the Vatican II document on divine revelation: "In the sacred books, the Father who is in heaven meets his children with great love and speaks with them; and the force and power in the Word of God is so great that it stands as the support and energy of the Church, the strength of faith for her sons, the food of the soul, the pure and everlasting source of spiritual life" (DV 21). These lines taught me the relational nature of Scripture, the Father speaking with me as his child, communicating his love, teaching me his truth, and offering me the grace to respond with love and obedience. The Word of God is a continual source of nourishment for my soul and wisdom for daily living.

The Third Sunday of Ordinary Time (today) has been designated as the Sunday of the Word of God, which is to be observed annually. The purpose is to remind us of the "value of Sacred Scripture for the Christian life, as well as the relationship between the word of God and the liturgy" (Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, December 2020). As we know, the proclamation of the Word of God is integral to the celebration of every Mass. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) states, "When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his word, proclaims the Gospel" (29). We are invited to receive the Word as a gift from God and a source of communication between God and us. The following three paragraphs are from a resource, provided by the USCCB, on <u>hearing the Word of God</u>:

The words of Sacred Scripture are unlike any other texts we will ever hear, for they not only give us information, they are the vehicle God uses to reveal himself to us, the means by which we come to know the depth of God's love for us, and the responsibilities entailed by being Christ's followers, members of his Body. What is more, this Word of God proclaimed in the liturgy possesses a special sacramental power to bring about in us what it proclaims. The Word of God proclaimed at Mass is "efficacious" that is, it not only tells us of God and God's will for us, it also helps us to put that will of God into practice in our own lives. How, then, do we respond to this wonderful gift of God's Word? We respond in word and song, in posture and gesture, in silent meditation and, most important of all, by listening attentively to that Word as it is proclaimed.

Perhaps the best way to understand the readings at Mass and our response to them is offered by Saint John Paul II in his Instruction <u>Dies Domini</u>. He encourages "those who take part in the Eucharist—priest, ministers and faithful... to prepare the Sunday liturgy, reflecting beforehand upon the word of God which will be proclaimed" and adds that if we do not, "it is difficult for the liturgical proclamation of the word of God alone to produce the fruit we might expect" (no. 40). In this way we will till the soil, preparing our souls to receive the seeds to be planted by the Word of God so that seed may bear fruit.

The Word of God, then calls for our listening and our response in silent reflection, as well as in word and song. Most important of all, the Word of God, which is living and active, calls each of us individually and all of us together for a response that moves beyond the liturgy itself and affects our daily lives, leading us to engage fully in the task of making Christ known to the world by all that we do and say.

I have written before about the practice of *lectio divina*, a method of praying with sacred Scripture every day. I continue to encourage everyone in the parish to incorporate this method into a daily prayer life. As a supplement, we have other gatherings on our parish campus for Bible study and reflection with others so that we can hear the Word of God in communion with our brothers and sisters. May the Holy Spirit lead each and all of us into a profound relationship with our heavenly Father.

Next weekend at the 12:00 p.m. Mass, we will honor Brad Bursa and Catherine Fishlock with a blessing of thanksgiving for their years of service within the parish. As we learned from their letters to the parish, each has decided to dedicate more time to their vocation within his/her family. So, we are not saying "farewell" to them and to their families. Both will remain active members of the parish and participate in the parish programming as their schedules allow. Let us love one another and pray for each other,

(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: A LESSON IN GLASS BY BRAD BURSA

The deep black panels loom over my head. In the faint candlelight, I can make out nothing but the jagged, crooked cames.

Figures unintelligible, lying in wait. Their story goes untold, until the dawn breaks and light cracks the horizon and contemplates the glass. The beams penetrate the pieces, one after another, illuminating a tapestry of colors once heated, cooled, hardened by time and now softened by light. In the sunlight, each panel reveals a story, while bespeaking its own praise of the light necessary for its beauty to appear.

There is a lesson inscribed in every sacred stained glass window—a catechesis visually echoing that Word that lies at the origin of every life, every event, every memory. And each window, whether illustrating the life of Christ or the life of a saint, casts a vision for our own lives, welcoming us to consider what our lives could be like if God's love touched the whole of them. Beyond the image revealed by the light, there is a lesson in the stained glass itself—the medium is also part of the message.

There's a way in which our lives are like these mysterious windows. Fragments, jagged pieces of the self, some hard and others soft, some strong and some weak. It often seems that life is nothing but parts never whole—things separated, fractured, disintegrated, with no hope of coming together. At some time, maybe sometimes, a pervasive darkness renders our lives unintelligible even unto ourselves. Sin does this—whether sins we've committed or those committed against us. It breaks us and leaves us alone, in the dark isolation—a foretaste of hell. This is the genius of stained glass. It even has the capacity to capture the depth of darkness that is real and to reflect, in its pitch-blackness, the depths of our own darkness to us.

And, in so many ways, our humanity does lie in darkness, until the light from the Son's daybreak encounters one fragment of our lives before another. As we avail ourselves to this Light, which we do not create for ourselves but which encounters us as Other, suddenly the many pieces of our lives—some forgotten, some memorable, and others painful—come together and form a meaningful whole. As the light of Christ peers into our lives, warming the cold, hard fragments, as we allow Christ's light to penetrate every part of our lives, everything starts to make sense. Basking in the light of Christ, we start to see that every part was somehow necessary to create the beautiful whole. God brings our lives together.

This is what the reality of stained glass itself inspires, teaches. Our lives are like these church windows we love, because our lives are to be portals through which the world peers in order to gain access to the light of Christ. If we cooperate with that Light, our lives should make it possible for others to "see" God, so to speak, to see the one who lit up our lives and who brought the disparate pieces of it together in a lifelong panorama.

In other words, we are called to be saints—real human beings like those who magnificently appear in stained glass during those morning hours. By "saint" here, I mean something like St. Paul's reference to the Christians of the early Church. For Paul, the word did not denote only those canonized, or even canonizable Christians. Instead, as Ratzinger points out, the word does not refer to "a headlong leap into heroism that makes someone a saint," or "adventurous achievements of virtue."¹ Instead, the word refers to Christ's own sanctifying initiative and action that sanctifies the Church and her members, those "saints" who "with Jesus receive a ray of his brightness" and

who are "called to use their experience of the risen Lord to become a point of reference for others that could bring them into contact with Jesus' vision of the living God."² The saints are witnesses, they are reference points or living windows that allow the light of Christ, the living God, to reach others.

This, it seems to me, is the invitation that lies ever before us and of which the dawning of each day reminds us:



Will we allow the light of Christ to shine on the whole of our lives even those less likeable parts? Will we allow the *Logos*, the Word made flesh, to illuminate and bring the fragments—which so often appear to be meaningless—of our lives together? Will we invite this gentle Light to carefully and tenderly overcome the creeping darkness of sin and the fright of fear?

In the stillness of a church in the morning, I imagine the windows crying out to the sun, begging for its light to transform them yet again. May we, daily, do the same, and may the Lord of Light, the one who defeats darkness, illuminate the whole of our lives—transforming them into windows through which others gain access to the only One capable of making sense of us such that others can make some sense of him.

ASK A PRIEST— THE LEONINE PRAYERS AFTER MASS

FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO Q: I understand that, prior to Vatican II, Catholics everywhere prayed the St. Michael Prayer, along with other prayers, following Mass. Is this why the custom was revived at St. Gertrude?

A: The St. Michael Prayer has had a big "comeback" over the last decade throughout the Catholic world, and notably so at St. Gertrude Church. Its popular recitation after Mass calls to mind the reasons that inspired two popes over a century apart to ask the entire Church to recite it, albeit with a different implementation.


First, if you've ever attended the Tridentine Mass, then you've likely experienced the way in which all Catholics used to incorporate the St. Michael Prayer into frequent practice. On the frequent occasions when Mass was not sung (i.e. low Mass), the Prayer to St. Michael was recited at the end of a series of prayers called the Leonine Prayers. Immediately following Mass, the priest led this litany from the foot of the altar: Hail Mary (x3), Hail Holy Queen, versicle and response, collect prayer, St. Michael Prayer, and "Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us" (x3). These prayers were required of the entire Church from 1884 until 1964 at the order of Pope Leo XIII and the decrees of the Second Vatican Council. Historically speaking, the Church had been feeling immense pressures from secularist governments in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The Leonine Prayers, as evident from the included collect prayer, were instituted to beg God "for the conversion of sinners and for the liberty and exaltation of our holy mother the Church."

Second, in October 2018, in the wake of the turmoil following the clerical abuse scandals, Pope Francis invited the faithful throughout the world to pray the daily rosary, the ancient Marian Sub Tuum prayer, and the St. Michael Prayer for the protection of the Church against demonic oppression. He also explained the importance of prayer and fasting as a way for all to respond with compassion for victims of abuse: "When we experience the desolation caused by these ecclesial wounds, we will do well, with Mary, 'to insist more upon prayer,' seeking to grow all the more in love and fidelity to the Church. She, the first of the disciples, teaches all of us as disciples how we are to halt before the sufferings of the innocent, without excuses or cowardice. To look to Mary is to discover the model of a true follower of Christ."¹ Many Catholics, both as individuals and as dioceses, were inspired to say these prayers following the holy sacrifice of the Mass.

Our practice of reciting the St. Michael Prayer after Mass at St. Gertrude is part of a much larger movement of the Holy Spirit in the Church. It involves admitting how much we need God's mercy and protection individually and as a Church. The saints are able to help us by their prayers to God. We know that the Church has enemies visible and invisible, outside and inside her walls. But our hope is in Jesus Christ our Savior who has won the victory over sin and Satan. In light of this hope, we do well to enlist the help of the Blessed Mother and the good angels like St. Michael as we strive for the grace to be faithful to Christ. Like the Catholics of the nineteenth century, having benefited from participation at the Mass in union with the saints in heaven, we implore God's mercy for the entire Church and world.
