# **PUBLIC WORSHIP AT ST. GERTRUDE CHURCH** IN TIME OF PANDEMIC

Updated November 1, 2020

The Archbishop dispenses the faithful from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass. Please do not come if you feel sick. Those who are vulnerable may consider coming to a less crowded weekday Mass.

### HEALTH AND SAFETY MEASURES

• Keep a prudent distance inside the church. Ushers will help ensure safe seating on Sundays.

• We ask that the faithful wear cloth masks for the sake of the common good. People with breathing difficulties and young children should not wear masks.

• Only friars, sisters, novices, lay ministers and a limited number of staff members will be in the sanctuary and sacristy.

• Volunteers will help wipe down high-touch surfaces between Sunday Masses.

### HOLY COMMUNION

• You are not obliged to receive Holy Communion at every Mass you attend. Consider making a spiritual communion, or receiving at a weekday Mass.

• The faithful who choose to receive Holy Communion will come up to the altar rail, where one or two priests will distribute the sacred host. Keep space in line, and only remove your mask at the rail.

• You may receive in the hand or on the tongue, kneeling or standing. Note: the rail is a high-contact surface.

# CELEBRATING THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY

We continue our celebration of Christmas with today's feast of the Epiphany. While most of the world has moved beyond Christmas and put everything away, we continue our joyful reflection on the love

that God has for us through the sending of His Son. We are invited to approach the Lord Jesus and encounter – like the Magi – the God who comes to save us and fill our lives with hope and joy. The Magi offered gifts to the child and St. Odilo of Cluny has this insight about the gifts: "To offer gold is to proclaim Christ's kingship, to offer incense is to adore his Godhead, and to offer myrrh is to acknowledge his mortality." The offering of these gifts demonstrates that the Magi have come to believe in the divinity of the newborn child who has humbled Himself to share in our humanity. We, too, have the opportunity to renew and deepen our faith in the Incarnation through regular prayer and meditation on the mysteries we have experienced.

In fact, the praying of the *Angelus* is a continuing devotion that draws our attention to the Incarnation and Birth of Christ. I provide here some information on the *Angelus* prayer, the text of the devotion, and the encouragement to incorporate this prayer into your daily prayer life.

The *Angelus* is a prayer practice rich in doctrine and devotion. This practice commemorates the mystery of the Incarnation by reciting certain versicles and responses with three Hail Marys and a special concluding prayer. It is recited morning, noon and evening. The church bells ring – three tolls for each of the invocations and then it peals for one minute. When the bell is heard, people are invited to stop their work and pray.

There is a renowned painting by Jean-Francois Millet entitled *The Angelus*. It depicts a man and a woman standing in a field. They are farmers. He holds his cap reverently as he stands with bowed head, and she in a white cap and long blue apron over her dress clasps her hands as a prayerful look sets her face. They pause in prayer near the end of the work day. At the woman's feet is a basket of potatoes, and at her far side rests a wheelbarrow full of empty sacks. At the side of the man is a pitchfork spiked

upright in the ground. The breaking clouds are blushed with light as birds flit in the twilight. The viewer can almost hear the bells ringing in the spire of the church in the distant right of the painting.



The text of the prayer is as follows:

The Angel of the Lord declared to Mary: And she conceived by the Holy Spirit.

### Hail Mary . . .

Behold the handmaid of the Lord: Be it done unto me according to Thy word.

### Hail Mary . . .

And the Word was made Flesh: And dwelt among us.

### Hail Mary . . .

Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God: That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

#### Let us pray:

Pour forth, we beseech You, O Lord, Your grace into our hearts, that we, to whom the Incarnation of Christ Your Son was made known by the message of an Angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His Resurrection, through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.


# FROM THE DIARY OF ST. MARIA FAUSTINA KOWALSKA

# Saint Gertrude Bulletin: What is your current role at St. Gertrude?

# ASK A PRIEST - THE MEANING OF EPIPHANY BY FR. JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P.

**Question:** Someone told me Epiphany includes Jesus' Baptism and the Miracle at the Wedding Feast at Cana, but

I thought Epiphany was about the arrival of the three kings in Bethlehem. Can you offer some explanation?

**Fr. John Mark:** "Epiphany" comes from a Greek word meaning "manifestation" or "appearance." This is not totally unrelated to the more figurative way we tend to use the word today: "She had an epiphany while traveling abroad that changed her outlook on life." As it relates to the Catholic Faith and our celebration of Christmas, "Epiphany" means Jesus' "revelation" or "manifestation" to the world. This first happened during His infancy in Bethlehem but would continue into His adult life.

Notice how the liturgy will suddenly "pivot" at the end of the Christmas season: next weekend, we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. The Church is teaching us that Jesus did not come only to lay peacefully in a manger in Bethlehem, but He came on a mission from His Father: to be the Savior of all mankind. The Catechism explains the significance of the coming of the three Magi (sometimes depicted as kings) to Bethlehem from today's Gospel:

"In the magi, representatives of the neighboring pagan religions, the Gospel sees the first-fruits of the nations, who welcome the good news of salvation through the Incarnation. The magi's coming to Jerusalem in order to pay homage to the king of the Jews shows how they seek in Israel, in the messianic light of the star of David, the one who will be king of the nations." (CCC 528)

The mysterious men following the star (cf. Mt 2:1-12) prefigure all, Jews and Gentiles alike, who in the future would come to worship Jesus, the Incarnate Son of God. The importance of Christmas for all of us would be lessened if the Nativity accounts did not contain some hints to Jesus' preaching, saving death and resurrection, and the foundation of His Catholic (i.e. "universal") Church. Jesus' Baptism and the miracle He worked at Cana (see Mk 1 and Jn 2) were the first steps that He took in His adult life toward accomplishing His mission. Although the visit of the Magi, the Baptism of Jesus, and the wedding feast at Cana did not necessarily take place on the same historical day, they have a thematic connection: the Son of God came to be the Savior, and His mission would be open and available to every human being far and wide, whether they anticipated His coming or not. Thanks to this truth, Epiphany became a widespread and especially solemn feast day from the early centuries of the Church. The following antiphon from Vespers (Evening Prayer) of Epiphany sums up everything we celebrate today and throughout the coming week:

"Three mysteries mark this holy day: today the star leads the Magi to the infant Christ; today water is changed to wine for the wedding feast; today Christ wills to be baptized by John in the river Jordan to bring us salvation."
