# Special Intention for Holy Hour Wednesday, January 10 | 7:30 p.m.

Join us to pray for all those who came to St. Gertrude Parish for Mass this Christmas season who are distant from the Church or no longer actively practicing. We pray that they might be inspired by the joy of the nativity of Jesus to return to their true home.

There will be a prayer intentions book available in which you can write the names of loved ones, friends, and people you know whom you would like us to specifically pray for their return to the Church. The evening will also include preaching from one of the friars, and confessions will be heard as usual.







### A VENERABLE EPIPHANY TRADITION: CHALKING THE DOORS

Blessing houses at the beginning of the year, on or near the celebration of Epiphany, is a long tradition in the Church, going back to the middle ages. Over time, this developed into a particular ritual in which blessed chalk

was used to mark the lintel above the front door (and, in some cases, above every door in the house).

Once again, we will have baskets of blessed chalk at the entrances to the church during this weekend's Masses. We invite every household to take one piece of blessed chalk home to bless their houses, although there is no need to take a new piece of chalk if you still have your blessed chalk from last year. There are a number of variations on the formula that a family can use for the occasion; the one below is short and simple, suitable even for families with small children (and thus small attention spans!). Longer, more elaborate forms of the blessing, which may include readings from Scripture, can easily be found online.

The blessing can begin with all present making the Sign of the Cross. The one leading the prayers then says:

The Word became flesh and made his dwelling place among us. It is Christ who enlightens our hearts and homes with his love. May all who enter this home find Christ's light and love.

The leader then says:

The three Wise Men, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God's Son who became man 2,024 years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

The lintel of the front door (either outside or inside) is then marked with:

20 + C + M + B + 24



The blessing concludes with everyone present praying the following prayer together:

Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love. May we be blessed with health, gentleness, and kindness of heart. Fill us with the light of Christ, that we may grow in grace and in the love and knowledge of you. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Side Note: There are two meanings to the three letters used in the inscription, which are interspersed between the numerals of the current calendar year. They refer first to the names of the three Wise Men (whom we celebrate visiting the Christ Child on the feast of the Epiphany): Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They also are an abbreviation for the Latin phrase *Christus mansionem benedicat*— "May Christ bless [this] home."

### NEVER ALONE—CATHOLIC MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

About 20 years ago, a man invited me to go to a Catholic men's conference down at the Colosseum. I didn't want to go, but my wife strongly encouraged me to attend. I couldn't believe what I experienced there. Thousands of

men praying, singing, excited about their faith. Talking about . . . Jesus. I'm like, *What the heck is this? I thought these guys were Catholic?* 

I ended up receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time since my Confirmation.

I was invited to attend a Catholic Men's Fellowship meeting at my parish at 7:30 on Saturday morning. I didn't want to go, but my wife strongly encouraged me to attend.

Again, I was blown away by what I experienced. Here were men. Real men. Veterans, guys with successful marriages and careers. Men who had raised their children. Men who were strong in their faith. I was 32 at the time, had a wife and two young daughters, and was absolutely clueless. I had no idea how to fulfill the responsibilities of my life and was not 100 percent sure that I even wanted to. Of course, there was no way I was going to tell anybody that. These men, however, were actually talking about their weaknesses, their challenges, their failures . . . in public. I didn't say a word.

Two weeks later, I went back. Encouragement from my wife was not needed.

Fast-forward 20-plus years, and I've been to probably 90 percent

of those Saturday morning Catholic Men's Fellowship meetings and have a leadership role in the group.

I was poorly catechized growing up (or maybe I just wasn't paying attention). While the Men's Fellowship is not a Bible study, Scripture plays a role in each meeting and **the topics served to increase my desire to learn more about the faith. After many years of study and discussion, I continue to be amazed at the depth and beauty of our Catholic faith.** 

Each meeting has a different topic. The topics help me to learn how my faith can be active in all the roles of my life: husband, father, son, friend, and in my job. None of us are expected to be a scholar. "The sharing is the teaching" is one of the principles of the Catholic Men's Fellowship. I have learned so much from both the successes and the failures of the men in the group.

These men have been there for me through difficulties in my career, my wife's successful battle against cancer, and the challenge of parenting three teenagers.

Faith now has a central position in my life and manifests itself in ways that I didn't even know were possible 20 years ago.

I honestly don't know where I would be right now without the friendship, witness, and accountability provided by my brothers in the Catholic Men's Fellowship group.

Trying to live a life of faith can be enormously challenging. I don't think I could do it alone. Thankfully, I have not had to.

### LEARN, LIVE, AND LOVE YOUR FAITH

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### ASK A PRIEST—THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

Q: What is the origin and meaning of the Sign of the Cross?

**A:** The holiest of signs is the Sign of the Cross. As Catholics, we make it so often that perhaps we take it for granted. It is a profound and powerful act that invokes the Trinity, Jesus' crucifixion, and the promise of salvation.

The Sign goes back to the Church's earliest days, likely to apostolic times. It quickly spread as a practice to accompany prayer everywhere there were followers of Christ—whether in the Middle East, North Africa, Asia or Europe. At a time when most were illiterate, Christians embraced the Sign of the Cross readily. It required no particular possessions, knowledge or skill–only faith.

The practice of the Sign began with marking one's forehead and, later, making a small sign on the lips and the forehead (as is done during Mass before the Gospel is read). Eventually, it became a larger gesture that was more visible.

#### THE SIGN'S MEANING

The Sign communicates belief in the Trinity, not just the words spoken but also the form of the action. The Sign begins at the forehead by invoking the Father, the first person of the Trinity, then moves to the chest, to show how the Son came down from the Father and took flesh in the Blessed Virgin Mary's womb. Finally, a sign made between the shoulders shows how the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father and the Son.

The Sign represents salvation through Jesus. On the cross, Christ conquered sin and death and redeemed humanity. As the spiritual

writer Romano Guardian wrote, "By the cross, He sanctifies man to the last shred and fiber of his being." We make the Sign as we begin any prayer to remind ourselves to whom we are praying. And we similarly conclude prayer in the same way, invoking God to remain with us, to be our strength and protection.

#### THE SIGN AS SACRAMENTAL

The Sign of the Cross is a "sacramental"—like holy water or the rosary. Sacramentals are sacred signs that resemble the sacraments and prepare us for the sacraments. The Sign of the Cross has a special connection to baptism, the sacrament by which we are claimed for Christ. At baptism, the Sign is made by the sacrament's minister and (in most cases) parents and godparents.

In the first centuries, the Sign was described as a ritual action and a weapon in spiritual battle. The writings of

Hippolytus of Rome in the third century advise Christians: "If you are tempted to sin, seal your foreheads reverently with the Sign of the Passion. It will render the devil powerless, provided that you do it with faith, not to be seen by men, but by presenting it with skill like a shield."

Later, it became a way to call down God's blessing on people, places and things (like food). By signing them with the cross, they are claimed for Christ, and evil is commanded to depart.

#### A PUBLIC WITNESS

Making the Sign of the Cross is an opportunity to witness to the Christian faith publicly. While performing the action quickly or discreetly may be tempting, especially in public, we are reminded that this is one of the clearest and oldest indicators of belief in Christ. As a visible sign of faith, it is intended to remind us of and communicate to others Christ's victory over sin and death and His promise of eternal life.

He holds a doctoral degree from the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., and is editor of the scholarly quarterly U.S. Catholic Historian.
