SEPARATION OF CHURCH & STATE

(AND HOW IT IMPACTS ISSUE 1)

Note: the following is an abbreviated version of the homily I gave last Sunday. Since so many who heard it, or heard about it, have asked me for a written copy, I have decided to dedicate my pastor letter space in this week's bulletin to do that.

A few weeks ago, a rather angry woman accosted me after Mass on a Sunday because I had spoken about Issue 1 during part of my homily. "Separation of Church and State!!" she yelled as she waved her finger at me.

So I'd like to start my reflection there: separation of church and state. This is one of those phrases we hear all the time, yet the phrase never appears in our United States Constitution. Nor does it appear in the Bill of Rights. The First Amendment does indeed address the relationship between church and state, but using very, very different words:

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

The first part of that sentence forbids our country from having one official "state religion," so that a variety of religions might flourish. But it's the second part that is really significant. Congress shall not prohibit the free exercise of religion. In other words, the amendment is not there to somehow "protect" the government from the influence of religious people and/or religious principles. (Indeed, our Founding Fathers would have considered such an idea utterly absurd.) It is meant to do the complete opposite: to protect religion and religious expression from being hemmed in or restricted in any way by the government!

Now, it is true the Church does not endorse specific candidates for office. That is not allowed, and if the church did so, it would risk losing its tax exempt status. However, when it comes to specific issues, the Church can endorse (or fight against) a specific bill/issue/etc. This is perfectly legal and does not in any way threaten our tax-exempt status.

The constitutional amendment being proposed as Issue 1 is aiming to enshrine abortion—up until the moment of birth, for any reason—as a constitutional right. The direct and willed killing of an innocent human life is an objective moral evil. As believers, individually and collectively as the Church, we not only *can* take a side on that issue, but also must—thus the signs in our church lawn, information in our bulletins, and all the other ways we are advocating against the passage of this horrifically radical proposed amendment.

In our second reading today from Phil 1:20ff, St. Paul speaks about how he is torn between remaining here on earth (and the "fruitful labor" that comes from being here) and being with God in heaven. He says this because he knows full well that the earth is not our true home—heaven is. While we are here on the earth, we are but travelers, pilgrims, sojourners. And yet, we also know that we have a calling to not only get ourselves to heaven, but also help as many other people as possible get there as well.

This is a big part of our true motivation as Catholics for political involvement. We should not vote for laws that personally benefit us in a

selfish way, but vote for laws that will help to shape our country, government, and culture in such a way that these things help people get to heaven, rather than being obstacles making it more difficult for them to get to heaven. If Issue 1 passes in November, we are going to wake up the next day in a state that will be significantly more antagonistic to promoting a way of life that helps lead people to heaven. We must do all we can to prevent that . . . for our sake, for the sake of all our brothers and sisters in the human family who live here with us, and for the sake of future generations.

To fight against Issue 1 is an act of love. So between now and November, all of us are called, in some way, to "fruitful labor" in the Lord's vineyard on behalf of life, parental rights, and family.

Fun Fact: Originally, candy corn was called chick feed when it was first created.




GO, BULLDOGS!

I've never been an extra credit person. In high school, especially, just trying to keep up with the "minimum" requirements was enough to occupy me. Between going to school, homework, extracurriculars,

sports, and a little time leftover to just be a teenager (listen to music and hang out with friends), the thought of voluntarily doing even more homework was anathema. I admired my classmates who seemed to breeze through the basic classwork with ample time leftover to pad their already high grades in the class with some extra credit, but I had better things to do . . . like watching TV or chatting on AOL instant messenger (hello, 2003!).

In my busy high school days, religion and God were often categorized in the "extra credit" category. Sure, if I had some extra time on my hands and nothing better to do, maybe I'd check out what the youth group was up to or say a quick Hail Mary before a test I didn't adequately prepare for. More often than not, I found that I felt I simply didn't have the time or inclination to do some "extra credit" for God. By the time I was in college, I didn't have any time for him at all.

Years later when I came back to the Church, my perspective had changed. If Jesus is who he said he is, then he couldn't be a tacked on side hobby in my life—he had to be at the center of everything. Through my reversion, I devoured every book about Catholicism that I could get my hands on. I learned everything I could and actually started having a real personal prayer life. Finally, I worked up the courage to go to confession for the first time in nearly a decade and was welcomed back into the Church with open arms. By the grace of God, I had developed a personal relationship with Jesus and was living out my faith by going to Mass and receiving the sacraments. But I wanted more! Needless to say, this was a shock to my "just complete the basic requirements" system. Just like my attitude toward school, I had always viewed Catholicism through the lens of "pay, pray, and obey." Having a real friendship with Jesus broadened my horizons to see that there was more to being Catholic.

Before I knew it, I was a money counter, a lector at Mass, helping clean the candelabras in the sacristy, and much more. Those things I once considered "extra credit," like participating in ministries and being involved in the parish community, ended up being essential to my life as a Catholic. I couldn't have a real relationship with the Lord and not do those things. Not only did I find I had time to do these things, but I genuinely enjoyed them because it flowed from my love of God. Even more than that, being involved in ministries actually helped nurture and grow my faith.

Here at St. Gertrude Parish, we are blessed with a wide variety of dozens of ministries (with new ones popping up regularly!). 

ASK AN EXPERT—THREE THINGS TO TELL YOUR PRO-CHOICE FRIENDS & TWO OBJECTIONS

Q: How do I talk to my pro-choice friends about the dangers of the proposed amendment on the November ballot?

A: When Ohioans hear the November ballot includes an initiative to protect "reproductive rights," the majority of them will be in support of it. However, once they understand what the amendment really says and that it will instill a right to abortion with virtually no restrictions up until birth, the vast majority will *not* support it. We don't have to convince others to support life from conception in order to defeat this initiative; we only have to explain the truth of the language.

While there are many dangers of this amendment, I want to boil it down to three simple points you can share with your pro-choice family and friends—or anyone.

- 1. The amendment will take away parental notification laws. The amendment specifically uses the words "any individual" with no reference to age. This language is deliberate, to ensure that any laws requiring parental notification can be soon struck down as unconstitutional for restricting the rights of anyone, of any age, to access abortion.
- 2. This amendment will take away typical safety laws. By specifically indicating that no law can place a "burden" on access to abortion (and not even the more traditional "undue burden"), typical safety standards will soon be eliminated. Examples of things legally considered a "burden" to abortion access include requirements such as an in-person visit and ultrasound to determine location of pregnancy before receiving a chemical abortion, ambulatory privileges for abortionists to care for a woman in an emergency, or requiring an actual licensed physician to perform the abortion. Using "burden" in Ohio's constitution threatens any safety laws for women.
- 3. Although the amendment specifically says abortion may be prohibited after viability, it adds that it may not be prohibited if "necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health." Health has already been defined in law related to abortion to include "emotional, psychological, familial, and the woman's age." We aren't talking only about danger to the woman's physical health; we are talking about virtually any reason, up until birth.

Now, say your pro-choice family and friends engage *you* in a discussion about the amendment. These are two of the most common objections you will hear—and how you can respond.

I have heard of doctors who have complained they were afraid to do treatment on women with ectopic pregnancy or miscarriage because they thought it could be against the law.

This is nothing more than fear-mongering. Care for ectopic pregnancy has always been legal and protected regardless of restrictions put on abortion. All abortion-restricting laws are fully aware of defining abortion to not include care for miscarriage or ectopic pregnancy. The Ohio Revised Code (2919.11) defines abortion as "the purposeful termination of a human pregnancy . . . with an intention other than to produce a live birth or to remove a dead fetus or embryo." Clearly, miscarriage care does not fall under that definition. Even the Heartbeat Bill in Ohio, which was in place for a short time and is currently not in effect, specifically defines the exception of ectopic pregnancy in ORC 2919.191 saying that the law's restrictions "apply only to intrauterine pregnancies, i.e., only when implantation is in the uterus, not in the fallopian tubes, as occurs in an ectopic or tubal pregnancy." No doctor would be confused about that language.

What if the mother's life is at stake?

First of all, what everyone needs to know is that when the mother's life is at stake during a pregnancy, the safest thing to do for both mother and child is **always** to deliver the baby alive to take care of the mother and do what it necessary to save the life of the child, or provide comfort care if the baby is too premature. It is **never** safer for the mother to have someone dismember the child first, and then forcibly remove it, which is what an abortion at that stage would do. Nonetheless, as far as the law is concerned, all abortion-restricting laws in Ohio have an exception for both "to prevent the death of the pregnant woman or to avoid a serious risk of the substantial and irreversible impairment of a major bodily function" (ORC 2919.16).

If we let people know what the language actually says, they will be on our side, and we can defeat this initiative!


