# CHRISTIANITY WITHOUT SAINT LUKE

Earlier this week, the Church celebrated the feast of St. Luke, who authored one of the four Gospels as well as the Acts of the Apostles. Those two books together make up over 25 percent of the New Testament! While it is impossible to ever say one New Testament author is "more important" than another, consider this:

Without Luke's Gospel, we would know nothing of the Archangel Gabriel's annunciation to Mary. There would be no knowledge of Mary's visitation to Elizabeth. We would know nothing of the presentation of Jesus in the temple, nor would we be familiar with the finding of the child Jesus in the temple. Without Luke's writings, we would know nothing about the ascension of Jesus nor have any knowledge of Pentecost. (*Can you imagine what Christianity would be like with no written record of Pentecost?*?)

So, right there are six mysteries of the rosary that would not exist today if it weren't for St. Luke. Of course, there probably wouldn't even be any such thing as the rosary, because without knowledge of the words the archangel spoke to Mary at the Annunciation ("Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you"), *there would be no Hail Mary*. Think about that for a moment: one of the first prayers any of us learn, and continue to pray our entire lives, simply would not exist.

Regarding the basic story of Jesus, one might think that, even without St. Luke's Gospel, having the three Gospels would be enough. Right? Well . . .

We would be bereft of so many of the parables of Jesus; at least 16 appear in none of the other three Gospels. And some of the ones only to be found in Luke are among the most beloved ones. Without St. Luke, we would never have heard the parable of the prodigal son, or the lost sheep that Jesus leaves the 99 to go find. Imagine how much harder it would be to understand the *incredible* love of our heavenly Father and the mercy of Jesus if there was no knowledge of those two parables. Nor would we have the parable of the Good Samaritan. Think about how many charitable ministries take their example (and sometimes even their names) after that parable!

Without Luke's Gospel, we would be ignorant of many important encounters of Jesus. Among them are the healing of the 10 lepers, Jesus' visit to Martha and Mary's house (and his teaching of how Mary "has chosen the better part"), and his conversation with the "good thief" at his crucifixion ("today you will be with me in paradise").


What would Christmas be like in a world without St. Luke's Gospel? Luke is the only one who records Mary and Joseph having to travel to Bethlehem for the census while Mary was pregnant. He is the only one who gives the details of "no room at the inn," the birth in the manger, the shepherds in the field seeing the vision of angels singing, "Glory to God in the highest. . ." [Side note: That means the "Gloria" ("Glory to God in the highest. . . .") that we say or sing at every Sunday and feast day Mass, would not be a part of our Catholic liturgy.]

Without any written record of any of those aspects of Christ's birth, today there would be no nativity scenes; no creches; no angels topping Christmas trees; no Christmas carols like "Away in a Manger," "Hark the Herald Angels Sing," "The First Noel" . . . none of them. Indeed, virtually every Christmas carol or hymn that exists relies on details found only in Luke's account of Jesus' birth. In short, Christmas—at least as we know it and as we celebrate it today—essentially **WOULD NOT EXIST** without St. Luke.

So, if your faith has been nurtured by any of these things, then before you go to bed tonight, I encourage you to say a brief prayer of thanksgiving for the person of St. Luke, and that he was docile to the promptings of the Holy Spirit to put all of these details into writing. Let it also be a reminder to us how one person can truly change the course of the future. God bless,

# **EVANGELIZATION & FAITH FORMATION**



### I AM LOVED

WALTER PLUMMER, DIRECTOR OF EVANGELIZATION

Welcome to part two of our series on the stages of discipleship! (Check out last week's bulletin for part one!) This week, I want to share a bit about my journey through those stages to help put some flesh on the ideas Tyler laid out last week.

#### Trust - Positive association with Christianity and/or Christians

I was raised Catholic but, in my teens, began to question whether this whole "church" thing was worth much. I daydreamed my way through Mass and religious education and only showed up mentally and spiritually for soccer and academics. My vision of a life to the full came from my teammates, coaches, and teachers: "You are what you achieve. You are what people say about you. You are what your clothes show to others." As I pursued this vision of success, I met some other guys my age who were fun and gifted athletes and not angry or sad or jerks to people outside their circle. They were also teen disciples of Jesus. I started to really listen to what they said and did.

### Curiosity - Intrigued by Christianity, but not willing to change one's life yet

I listened to the way they joked and talked. I saw a sense of joy, peace, and confidence that I didn't understand. They eventually invited me to their youth ministry. (I think they were pretty shocked when I showed up.) I wasn't totally sure what it would entail but wanted to check it out.

#### Openness - Open to a personal relationship with God and changing one's life, but not committed yet

My first night there happened to be a praise and worship night led by teens. It was amazing. The music was beautiful, and the teens around me were all singing—some even lifting their arms and dancing. They were so happy, so unashamed, so open and confident, so unafraid. I remember being rooted to the spot, goosebumps all over my skin, thinking, "I don't know what this is, but I want it."

#### Seeking - Everything in life is reexamined in light of Jesus

So I went to everything the youth ministry did. Youth nights, retreats, small groups, late nights at Applebee's. I wanted to know more, to hear more. A talk on chastity was especially powerful for me. I had to look at my own life, my own choices, and ask if they were good. I started reading the Bible. I found more and more joy and peace in my life.

#### Discipleship - Saying "yes" to Jesus and committing to following him


Then at a small group night, pairs split off for conversations about faith. The youth minister, Jake, was paired with me. We talked, and then he asked, "Walter, have you ever asked Jesus to be your personal Lord and Savior?" In our Catholic world, this could seem to leave out the necessary sacramental and communal parts of following Jesus. In this context, it was the missing component that I desperately needed. I had the others: I was a confirmed, practicing Catholic. But in my heart, I held Jesus at arm's length.

By the grace of God, I was honest and said, "No." He led me in a prayer asking Jesus to come past my interior walls and into my heart. And I broke down and sobbed with relief. I was loved. I belonged somewhere. To someone. That love won my heart. I felt, and still feel, like St. Peter, when he said to Jesus, "You have the words of everlasting life" (John 6:68). And I committed to following Jesus. Not perfectly, but I said yes.

As you hear this (very) brief overview of my journey, I hope it reminds you of your own. Maybe you resonate more with the Trust stage or the Seeking stage. Wherever you are in your journey, here's my invitation for you this week: Tell someone the story of your relationship with Jesus, and ask him or her if he or she would share as well. Then tune in next week for our next piece on accompanying others in their paths of discipleship.



# HOLY TEACHING

10 tips

for discussing Ohio's abortion ballot measure

It's likely we'll all have opportunities to talk about the upcoming state vote on abortion. Whether it's a casual conversation with a neighbor or friend or a more structured discussion with a campaign representative, you may be asked to share your thoughts on the proposal. What will you say, and how can you keep important relationships strong, even if you disagree?

The first step-and the most important one of all-is prayer. Talk to God before you talk to anyone else, and ask the Holy Spirit to fill you and guide your words. Filled with this peace, your conversation is sure to be a fruitful one.

Once your spirit is settled, its time to begin. Here are 10 easy steps:

#### 1. Check yourself.

Before you start talking, you should make sure you know how far you're willing to take the conversation and be prepared to give yourself an "out" if things get heated. You can always decide to take a break and return to the conversation later or agree to disagree. Conversely, you don't have to be a doormat. If someone else tries to force their views onto you, you must decide when it's important to speak up or step back. Only you can decide where the appropriate boundaries are going to be for you.

### 2. Check your facts.

Don't open a conversation you're not ready to have. If you haven't thought much about your position, your arguments or your facts, you could quickly find yourself in way over your head. Do vour homework and be prepared to speak thoughtfully and sincerely.

# **3.** Be honest and curious.

These conversations are not comfortable for anyone. Acknowledge all the feelings involved and be prepared to act in ways that are vulnerable and open. Ask good questions and listen well - after all, you're trying to understand as much as you're trying to be understood.

# 4. Try to find shared experiences.

Facts and data points are never going to be as convincing as when one heart truly speaks to another. Use your heart as a resource and a guide for a conversation that enriches, informs, and loves deeply.

# 5. This isn't a presidential debate.

Don't perform, shoot "zingers" or try to score points at the

expense of your relationship. Be real, thoughtful, and sincere—after all, your integrity and sensitivity are going to be far more convincing than any fancy oneliner.

# 6. Don't engage in "shaming" behaviour.

When someone feels defensive or embarrassed, they stop hearing you. Let your conversation be hopeful and friendly, so your relationship will still be intact when you're done speaking.

# 7. You have two ears and one mouth.

Use them proportionally. Really listening to the people you're in conversation with will help you better understand where they're coming from.

# 8. Find common ground.

Most people value the same things—truly! Start with neutral statements and always seek the ideas and feelings you share—at the end of the conversation, these are the most important things you take with you.

### 9. Avoid anger.

Don't let your emotions carry you away. It's okay to disagree with someone and love them at the same time. Christ does this throughout the Gospels, and you can do it too!

# 10. Remember to rest in the power of your convictions.

Even if you don't succeed in convincing someone else of your arguments, you don't have to change your mind. The most important action you'll take, after all, isn't in a personal chat with your neighbor, but in making sure you make it to the polls on Election Day!
