

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



<u>CHRISTIANITY</u> WITHOUT ST. LUKE

Earlier this week, the Church celebrated the feast of St. Luke, who authored one of the four Gospels as well as the Acts of the Apostles. This morning, it struck me—a Catholic Christian powerfully that Catholicism would be radically different had St. Luke never wrote what he did. Consider this:

Without St. Luke, we would not have the Acts of the Apostles. Which would mean . . .

We would not have any significant details of the Ascension of Christ. Would not know how it came about that Matthias was chosen to replace Judas Iscariot as the twelfth Apostle. We would not have the account of the martyrdom of St. Stephen the *protomartyr* (the first martyr). We would not have the full details of St. Paul's conversion on the road to Damascus. We would know virtually nothing about St. Paul's missionary journeys, other than the tiny tidbits/references in some of his own letters. And most of all, we would not have the account of Pentecost. Imagine Christianity without a written account of Pentecost!

Regarding Luke's Gospel, one might think, "Come on, if we had Matthew, Mark, and John, that would be enough." Well, consider this...

Luke is the only Gospel that recounts some of the most beloved parables of Jesus, including the prodigal son and the good samaritan. It is also the only Gospel that records several very important events, including the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth, the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, the raising of the widow's son, the cleansing of the 10 lepers, the incident with Martha and Mary, the story of Zacchaeus, the promise Jesus made to the "good thief" at the Crucifixion, and Jesus' post-resurrection appearance to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus.

In addition, Luke is the only Gospel that records the Annunciation. Without his Gospel, we would never know it was the archangel Gabriel that appeared to Mary (or that any angel did at all!), nor would we have some of our most beloved Catholic prayers—without Luke's account of the Annunciation, we would not have the Angelus or the Hail Mary. (Try to wrap your mind around Catholicism without the Hail Mary!) And that means we would not have the rosary.

Similarly, Luke is the only Gospel that records Mary and Joseph having to travel to Bethlehem for the census while Mary was pregnant. The only one that gives the details of "no room at the inn," the birth in the manger, the shepherds in the field seeing the vision of angels saying, "Glory to God in the highest." Liturgically, the *Gloria* ("Glory to God in the highest") that we say or sing at every Sunday and feast day Mass would be unknown.


When it comes to Christmas, there would be no nativity scenes,

no creches, no Christmas hymns like "Silent Night," "Away in a Manger," "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing"—none of them. In short, Christmas (at least as we know it and celebrate it today) essentially *would not exist*.

If you enjoy any of these things or, more importantly, if your faith has been fed by any of these things, then before you go to bed tonight, say a brief prayer of thanksgiving for St. Luke and that the Holy Spirit inspired him to put his Gospel down on paper. And then strive every day to come to better know Christ our Lord and his Blessed Mother, both of whom St. Luke witnessed to so beautifully in his sacred writings.

MONARCH BUTTERFLY PROJECT

IVOTECATHOLIC: FORMING FAITHFUL CITIZENS BY MICHELLE DUSHENSKY,

It's that time of year again: Election season. As citizens of this country,

we are called to participate. As Catholics, our faith calls us to not just participate by casting a vote, but to do so in a manner that is consistent with the mission of Jesus. The problem is, many Catholics don't actually know what the Church teaches about the dignity of every human person, the dignity of life, caring for the poor and the earth, the importance of family and community, the value of work and the rights of workers.

Regardless of where we stand—or lean—we're all faced with the same timeless question as the 2022 elections quickly approach: Who do I vote for?

It's not a question that your husband or wife, parent, pastor or anyone else can answer for you. As stated in *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, a document from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), "The responsibility to make choices in political life rests with each individual in light of a properly formed conscience."

So how does one properly form his or her conscience and vote with confidence? By reading the papal, conciliar and episcopal documents on the Church's social teaching. While these are deep and rich, many of us do not have the time to dive into *Gaudium et Spes*, "Statement on Capital Punishment," "Called to Compassion and Responsibility," or any of the other 50-plus foundational documents—and thanks to the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's initiative, iVoteCatholic, you don't have to.

The goal of iVoteCatholic, which was launched ahead of the 2020 presidential election, is to equip archdiocesan pastors, parish leaders, and educators with the resources they need to help their parishioners and students get a fuller picture of Catholic social teaching and form good consciences, not only for the November election but also for life. The hope is that with a better understanding of what the Church teaches and why, people will apply these teachings to their lives, thoughtfully evaluate candidates during elections and vote with their faith in mind.

"Instead of people voting Republican or Democrat, we want people to vote Catholic," said Andrew Musgrave, director for Catholic Social Action and point-person for the initiative, "And that doesn't mean voting for Catholics. That doesn't mean only voting for people who line up with one particular issue in the Catholic Church. You're never going to find someone who lives by the Catechism and always abides by every teaching of the Church, but who do you find best embodies, best lives out, best leads from the fullness of the Catholic position? It's a discernment process."

SEVEN THEMES

To assist in that discernment process, Musgrave and the iVoteCatholic initiative team, examined the seven themes of Catholic social teaching and paired them with the seven weeks preceding this year's election:

- Week 1: Life and Dignity of the Human Person
- Week 2: Rights & Responsibilities
- Week 3: Family, Community, and Participation
- Week 4: Option for the Poor and Vulnerable
- Week 5: Solidarity
- Week 6: The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers
- Week 7: Care for God's Creation

They then compiled and created dozens of digital resources for each of those weeks, housing them on <u>iVoteCatholic.org</u>. Materials include explanations of each theme, prayers, videos, homily helps, social media posts, bulletin articles, discussion guides for small groups, musical suggestions, activities for kids, lesson plans, papal statements and more.

Jeremy Helmes, director for Divine Worship and Sacraments at the archdiocese, said that because the Church does not align herself with political parties, some pastoral leaders tend to shy away from social and political issues. He hopes this initiative will open up those conversations and inspire parishes and schools to help their communities grapple with urgent political issues and understand more about what the Church actually teaches. Because, in the long run, iVoteCatholic isn't about a specific election.

"It's really about Catholic social teaching," said Helmes. "It's evergreen content. We're hoping that this [website] will continue to be a resource."

The times are calling us to be more engaged in our political lives. We're not all going to vote the same way, but Musgrave said that by making a concerted effort to learn more about the fullness of our faith and what it means to vote Catholic, we can step forward with peace of mind.

ASK A PRIEST— VARIOUS "ACTS OF CONTRITION"

EATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P. Q: What are the different options the Church gives for the faithful to make an Act of Contrition? It seems different people have different versions of the prayer that they'll use in the confessional. A: As a priest who frequently has the privilege to hear confessions, I can testify trition used by the Catholic faithfull. The


to the variety of Acts of Contrition used by the Catholic faithful! The traditional formularies are beautiful and, more importantly,

help Catholics to express true sorrow for their sins and a resolution not to sin again. A good Act of Contrition is meant to help us be sorry for having sinned for fear of eternal punishment, *and most of all*, for having offended God's love. That is, it cultivates what the Catechism calls "imperfect contrition" and moves us toward the "perfect contrition." Wonderfully, this is also the work of the sacrament itself. Some newer versions are drawn from Scripture. All Catholics should commit to memory and use some form of the Act of Contrition, even daily. Here are a few possibilities:

- My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy.
- 2. O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee, and I detest all my sins because I dread the loss of Heaven and the pains of Hell; but most of all, because they offend Thee, my God, Who art all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of Thy grace, to confess my sins, to do penance and to amend my life.
- 3. Father of mercy, like the prodigal son I return to you and say: "I have sinned against you and am no longer worthy to be called your son." Christ Jesus, Savior of the world, I pray with the repentant thief to whom you promised Paradise: "Lord, remember me in your kingdom." Holy Spirit, fountain of love, I call on you with trust: "Purify my heart, and help me to walk as a child of light."
- 4. Lord Jesus, you chose to be called the friend of sinners. By your saving death and resurrection free me from my sins. May your peace take root in my heart and bring forth a harvest of love, holiness, and truth.
- 5. Lord Jesus, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner.

Can you imagine the transformation such a prayer can lead to in your life? An Act of Contrition can be offered daily following a brief examination of conscience. This is a great way to prepare for the sacrament of Reconciliation (a.k.a., confession or penance), and you'll be less likely to go blank when it's time to recite it in the presence of the priest! Thankfully, contrition is first of all the work of God who calls us to turn from sin to believe in the Gospel. These formularies and others do their part to help us answer the call.
