THREE...TWO...ONE...

As I write to all of you this week, I could not be more excited. Kick-off weekend for our year of preparation for our parish centennial has finally arrived. I am so looking forward to the next few weeks and the amazing liturgies and events that will be happening. And as we all begin together this "journey" of

preparation toward our 100th anniversary, there are two ideas that I would like to invite everyone to keep in mind throughout these first couple of weeks of centennial events: thanksgiving and grace.

We begin this Sunday with our centennial kick-off Mass, being celebrated by Archbishop Christopher Cardone. As many of you know, he is a Dominican friar of our province who was assigned here as a young parochial vicar. After his time at St. Gertrude, he responded to an invitation from God to leave his home country to serve in a land far away and became a missionary in the Solomon Islands. In 2016, he was appointed Archbishop of Honiara, the largest diocese in the Solomon Islands. His ministry is a testimony to his openness to the movement of God's grace within him, and we are so thankful that he has been able to make the journey here to Madeira to celebrate with us this week.



Monday and Tuesday, we celebrate All Hallows' Eve (All Saints Eve) and All Saints Day. In our special Halloween night prayer service, the Vigil of All Saints, and during our Masses on All Saints Day, we recognize all of those holy men and women who opened themselves to the power of God's grace during their lifetimes and now "reign with Him forever" in heaven (Rev. 22:5). In celebrating these saints, we also appeal to them to intercede for us, thankful for the power of their intercession before the throne of God.

Wednesday, we celebrate the somber yet beautiful commemoration of all the faithful departed, more commonly called All Souls' Day. It is a day of special prayer for our deceased whose souls are in purgatory and whom we can assist along their journey to heaven by our prayers and sacrifices on their behalf. This day reminds us of the purifying and sanctifying power of God's grace. It is also a day to be thankful for the sacrifice Christ made for us on the cross and the salvation that is possible because of his passion, death, and resurrection.

Finally, next Saturday, November 5, we welcome the Panivnyk Family, refugees from war-torn Ukraine, who will speak to us about their experience of fleeing their home and homeland because of the Russian invasion. They are an extraordinary family, and the strength of their faith in the midst of such trial is a testimony to the power of God's grace to overcome the sufferings of this world. We are so thankful they were willing to come to Cincinnati to share their story with us.

There is much more coming, as well; more on the rest in next week's letter!

Finally, one last thing. It seemed like this year of preparation would be the perfect time for all of us to become more acquainted with our patroness, St. Gertrude the Great. To help us with that, in every bulletin over the course of this next year we will be sharing a prayer, hymn, or a piece of prose written by St. Gertrude. May the beauty and wisdom of her writings be a source of grace for all of us. God bless,



As Christians, we are all called to evangelization and missionary discipleship, especially to care for those who are vulnerable, like mothers and children on the peripheries.



In the apostolic exhortation *Evangelii gaudium (The Joy of the Gospel)*, Pope Francis calls the Church to a new chapter of evangelization and invites every Christian to a life of missionary discipleship. The Holy Father writes that "the word of God constantly shows us how God challenges those who believe in him 'to go forth." As those who have encountered Jesus, we are called to share the joy of the Gospel: "Each Christian and every community must discern the path that the Lord points out, but all of us are asked to obey his call to go forth from our own comfort zone in order to reach all the 'peripheries' in need of the light of the Gospel." ²

Evangelii gaudium reflects on the example of Christ who himself knelt to wash the disciples' feet. Like Jesus, an evangelizing community becomes involved in the lives of its people; "it embraces human life, touching the suffering flesh of Christ in others." ³ Parishes make manifest the presence of the Church in a local community and provide an environment to encounter God and grow in the Christian life. The parish is "a sanctuary where the thirsty come to drink in the midst of their journey, and a center of constant missionary outreach." ⁴

The foundation of all our missionary efforts is the truth "that every person is worthy of our giving... because they are God's handiwork, his creation." ⁵ God created human beings in his image and likeness, and every person reflects God's glory: "Every human being is the object of God's infinite tenderness, and he himself is present in their lives." ⁶

Therefore, every Christian is called to "be actively engaged in evangelization; indeed, anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love does not need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love." ⁷ Pope Francis challenges the Church to be bold and creative in reassessing its approach to evangelization: "Pastoral ministry in a missionary key seeks to abandon the complacent attitude that says: 'We have always done it this way." ⁸

Instead, the Holy Father proposes a culture of encounter and accompaniment, "standing by people at every step of the way, no matter how difficult or lengthy this may prove to be." 9 With "patient

expectation and apostolic endurance" ¹⁰ the art of accompaniment "teaches us to remove our sandals before the sacred ground of the other (cf. Ex 3:5)" ¹¹ and to show special preference for the poor, despised, and overlooked.



Pope Francis reminds

us that "among the vulnerable for whom the Church wishes to care with particular love and concern are unborn children, the most defenseless and innocent among us." ¹² The defense of unborn life upholds "the conviction that a human being is always sacred and inviolable, in any situation and at every stage of development." ¹³ Yet, the Holy Father acknowledges that the Church has often "done little to adequately accompany women in very difficult situations, where abortion appears as a quick solution to their profound anguish." ¹⁴

As members of the Church that "goes forth," we are called to take the first step toward those in need — sharing in their lives, listening to their concerns, offering them both material and spiritual support. For "true faith in the incarnate Son of God is inseparable from self-giving, from membership in the community, from service, from reconciliation with others." ¹⁵ And while we may feel unequipped for such a mission, the Holy Father reminds us that "whenever we take a step towards Jesus, we come to realize that he is already there, waiting for us with open arms." ¹⁶

Our mission as disciples of Christ Jesus "is at once a passion for Jesus and a passion for his people." For having received the love of Christ, how can we but share that love with others? "The joy of the Gospel is such that it cannot be taken away from us by anyone or anything (cf. Jn 16:22)." ¹⁸ The evils of our world and challenges within the Church cannot diminish our commitment to missionary discipleship: "With the eyes of faith, we can see the light which the Holy Spirit always radiates in the midst of darkness." ¹⁹

The joy of the Gospel is for all people. May each of us seek to renew and deepen our relationship with God and strive "to meet every challenge as a leaven of Gospel witness." ²⁰

In response to Pope Francis' call to share the joy of the Gospel, especially with those on the peripheries, the USCCB Committee on Pro-Life Activities is inviting Catholics to walk in the shoes of local pregnant and parenting mothers in need. Through the initiative Walking with Moms in Need, parishes and dioceses are invited to join a nationwide effort to increase outreach and support to pregnant and parenting women facing difficulties. ASK A PRIEST— THE AFTERLIFE

FATHER JOACHIM KENNEY, O.P.

Q: What happens to the body, theologically speaking, after physical death? We know and believe through the Church that the saints are now in heaven; do they have their bodies now, or must we all wait for the last day?

A: A human being is a body-soul

composite. The soul is what animates the body, or in other words, is what makes it alive. The soul is immaterial and not dependent on the body for its existence. Therefore, when the soul departs the body at death, it continues to be. Our bodies decay, but our souls do not.

Death is a prospect that is, by turns, humbling and frightening. According to Benjamin Franklin's famous quip, death is one of only two certainties we have in this life (the other certainty being taxes). Since the dawn of history, people have pondered how to face death well and wondered what comes after it. Religion and philosophy are the two redoubts we have typically turned to for answers.

God has revealed to us that, though our bodies decay at death, death is a change and *not* the end of the line for us. Our souls continue in existence after death. Based on how we have lived our lives and whether we have chosen friendship with God at the end of them, our souls will either enter into eternal separation from God (hell) or eternal union with God (heaven). Most of those going to the latter state will get there after first spending time in purgatory, being purified of attachments to anything that does not lead us closer to God.

One of the core beliefs of Christianity is that our bodies will be raised up and reunited with our souls at the end of time. Until then, those who have departed from this world are in a state of "incompleteness," in the sense that their souls are existing without the body-soul composite that is natural to human beings. It sounds strange to many to think of our disintegrated bodies being reconstituted and reunited with our souls. How does a body that has decomposed all of a sudden come back together after hundreds or thousands or millions of years? Like many of the things God has revealed to us, it is



a mystery, but the God who brought us into existence out of absolute nothingness has the power to also put us back together again on the last day.

As we wait, the Church helps us to ponder these mysteries of life, death, and resurrection through the liturgy. In the celebrations of All Saints Day on November 1 and All Souls' Day on November 2, we're reminded of the companionship of the Communion of Saints and that we are not alone in facing or pondering these realities. All Saints Day—which we will begin celebrating in our parish with a special Vigil of the Saints prayer service on October 31 at 7:30 p.m.—gives us a taste of the joy that is to be had in heaven and is a special opportunity to ask the intercession of all those faithful who have entered eternal life. On All Souls' Day and for the rest of the month of November, we have the opportunity to pass on the favor by praying in a special way for the souls in purgatory, thereby helping them to be purified more quickly so they can enter into heaven sooner.

During November, often called the Month of the Dead, our thoughts are easily led to the faithful departed by the annual dying of so much in the natural world during this season. The Church builds on this natural rhythm and helps us reconcile with it by giving us the hope and support of one another's prayers. We can assist the souls in purgatory, especially through gaining indulgences for them. Indulgences take advantage of the "treasury of grace" Christ entrusted to the Church. By praying certain prayers and doing specific works stipulated by the Church, we can apply our merits to those in purgatory. Just like we can apply our material possessions to those in need, so also the Lord allows us to apply our spiritual riches to those who need them.

A plenary indulgence gains a soul full and immediate release from purgatory. Each person can gain one of these each day from November 1-8 by visiting a cemetery and praying for the departed. On All Souls' Day, we can also gain a plenary indulgence by visiting a church or oratory and devoutly praying the Our Father and the Creed. These plenary indulgences are gained provided the following conditions are met by the person seeking the indulgence:

- 1. have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin;
- 2. receive the sacrament of Reconciliation;
- receive the Holy Eucharist (it is certainly better to receive it while participating in Holy Mass, but for the indulgence, only Holy Communion is required), and
- 4. recite **prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father** (one Our Father and one Hail Mary is suggested as a minimum, but any other additional prayers may be added).¹




