FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



THE JOURNEY FROM GUILT AND SHAME TO HOPE, HEALING, AND PEACE

With Issue 1 looming this coming November, anyone associated in any way with St. Gertrude Church has known how much we have been discussing abortion around the parish these past weeks and months. As pastor, I am so proud (and so thankful) we have *so* many of our parishioners

who have been leading the charge to defeat this proposed amendment, not just here but throughout the Greater Cincinnati area.

Today, I'd like to reflect on a very different facet of the legacy of abortion: how many profoundly wounded and regretful women (and men) it has left in its wake. There is a saying that hits this truth very accurately: "Every abortion leaves two casualties: one dead, and one wounded." This is especially true when a Catholic woman has made the choice to have an abortion.

I have seen this reality with my own eyes. I've had many conversations with women who have made this choice in their pasts. One described how, in the grocery store, she could not walk down the aisle that had diapers and other baby items without beginning to cry. Another told me that if she was watching TV and a show depicted a baby or a pregnant mom, she had to change the channel or else leave the room. A coworker of mine took a phone call on a hotline, where a 74-year-old woman broke down and could barely talk. She had had an abortion at age 17 and had never told another soul about it—not even her husband of 50+ years. She had been carrying around the guilt, regret, and utter shame of that decision totally alone for her entire life.

It doesn't have to be this way. It ought not to be this way.

In 1995, Pope St. John Paul II released an encyclical called *The Gospel of Life*. Towards the end of that encyclical, in paragraph n. 99, the saintly pope wrote these poignant words:

"I would now like to say a special word to women who have had an abortion. The Church is aware of the many factors which may have influenced your decision, and she does not doubt that in many cases it was a painful and even shattering decision. The wound in your heart may not yet have healed. Certainly what happened was and remains terribly wrong. But do not give in to discouragement and do not lose hope. Try rather to understand what happened and face it honestly. If you have not already done so, give yourselves over with humility and trust to repentance. The Father of mercies is ready to give you his forgiveness and his peace in the Sacrament of Reconciliation."

I would implore anyone reading this who has made this choice in the past and has not yet had this sin lifted in the sacrament of Reconciliation to do so. I can promise that anyone who comes to us at St. Gertrude for confession will not be yelled at, berated, belittled, or condemned. What you will receive is a warm welcome to be free of this burden and the experience of the mercy and forgiveness of God.

However, for many women, even receiving forgiveness and sacramental absolution doesn't fully heal the wound in your heart you carry. So often, there is healing that needs to happen on other levels. For anyone experiencing those continual wounds, I beg you to reach out to the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's Project Rachel ministry. According to their website, "The Project Rachel Ministry helps women and men journey to hope and healing by discovering God's love and grace through a network of spiritual counselors, advocates, and peer-to-peer ministry." Through a variety of options ranging from one-on-one counseling to support groups to special retreats for post-abortive women, our local Project Rachel offers multiple avenues to help women (and men), whether Catholic or not, to heal their wounded heart to find hope, healing, and peace so they can move on with life and not be haunted by a decision from their pasts. If you don't need this information yourself, I ask you to please pass it along to someone you know who might. Everyone who has been through an abortion deserves to know the peace and love of Christ. God bless,

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: MICHELLE SCHNEIDER

This week, St. Gertrude Bulletin chatted with St. Gertrude School alumni Michelle Schneider (Class of 1968). Michelle, a St. Gertrude Church parishioner, is engaged in parish life, pro-life and political work. She was the mayor of Madeira from 1997 to 1998 and was elected to the Ohio state legislature in 2001, serving for eight years. She was the majority whip—a position in

Michelle Schneider: I had many favorite teachers, but one that I remember best is Miss Love. She taught geography, and I was fascinated by all the places in the world that I wanted to visit. She also had funny sayings that I didn't understand at the time, but I remember to this day one of them was "you pull your little red wagon, and I'll pull mine."

SGB: How did your St. Gertrude School education prepare you for higher studies, your career, and ultimately for life?

Michelle Schneider: St. Gertrude School had a profound effect on my life by giving me a solid foundation. It has solidified my faith in God and taught me that Jesus is always with me; I should not be afraid, and I should pray every day.

SGB: What is your wish for today's St. Gertrude School students? **Michelle Schneider:** My wish for today's St. Gertrude School students is that they will study hard, prepare themselves for today's world, and appreciate all the things that they have—the love and deep-rooted education that will serve them well the rest of their lives.

SGB: What is one piece of advice you have for today's St. Gertrude School students?

Michelle Schneider: My one piece of advice for today's St. Gertrude School students is to study hard and deepen their faith by loving Jesus and praying daily. Trust Jesus, and when you are in times of stress or anxiety, picture Jesus holding your hand. He's always with you. If he's for you, you cannot fail. ASK A PRIEST—SATAN AND THE DEVIL FATHER DAVID ENDRES.

PROFESSOR AT MOUNT ST. MARY'S SEMINARY & SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Q: Do Catholics believe in the existence of Satan? Is Satan the same as the devil?

A: A significant number of Christians do not believe in Satan. They consider him representative of evil, but not an active being. Yet the Catholic tradition has long acknowledged the existence of Satan and associated with him evil presences that seek to undermine humanity's relationship with God.

VARIOUS NAMES

The Evil One has various names. The most common terms include Satan, from the Hebrew verb meaning "to oppose," and the devil, from the Greek word for "accuse" or "calumniate." These names are used frequently in the Bible, and Satan, Lucifer, the devil, the tempter, or the Evil One are usually synonymous in the Scriptures and Christian writings.

Demons and other evil spirits are related to the Evil One. When Satan rebelled against God, many angels joined in his rebellion. These fallen angels, now called demons, share in Satan's opposition to God and actively work to tempt and deceive humanity.

ANGELS AND DEMONS

Belief in Satan is based on the understanding that God created both the angelic and the earthly. We confess this whenever we say the Creed: "I believe in ... things visible and invisible."

Satan, one of the invisible creatures, is a fallen angel. The Church teaches that God created the devil and other demons as good, as angels, but they became evil "by their own doing." Through their own choice, they "radically and irrevocably rejected God" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 391-392).

Though invisible, the devil and other fallen angels are no less real. Pope Paul VI related that "evil is not merely the absence of something but an active force." There are many demons, but there is principally one (Satan) who rules. Together, they comprise "a



whole mysterious world, convulsed by a most unfortunate drama about which we know very little" (General Audience, November 15, 1972). **GOD SAVES**

Jesus came to save humanity from sin and death. His name means "God saves." The early Church interpreted His coming as the means to destroy Satan and his works. As St. John relates, "The Son of God was revealed to destroy the works of the devil" (1 Jn. 3:8). It is fitting that Jesus went head-to-head with Satan just before beginning his public ministry. After successfully enduring three temptations, Jesus said, "Get away, Satan!" and the devil left him (Mt. 4:1-11).

But this was not the end of Jesus' dealing with the Evil One. Many of His healings in the Gospels involved persons possessed by the devil. Notice how Jesus interacts with the forces of evil: He commands the evil spirits to leave. Whether one or many, they depart. In a most dramatic scene, Jesus sends demons into a herd of pigs, who then rush into the sea where they are drowned (Mt. 8:28-32).

EVIL DOES NOT WIN

Satan and his demons are powerful, but this does not mean they cannot be defeated. Through Jesus' death and resurrection, Satan has been overcome. The Church, through Christ, has power over evil. This is seen in the blessings offered by the Church and in special rites called exorcisms that sanctify persons and objects, commanding evil to flee.

Why God has permitted Satan to have influence here on earth is not known, but we need not fear. Through the power of Christ, we can have victory over Satan's temptations. We need only call upon Him in faith, as we pray so often in the Lord's Prayer, "Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil."
