#### PREPARING FOR THE COMING OF JESUS

Today we begin the holy season of Advent and the new liturgical year. The blessing of the Advent wreath directs our attention to Christ, the light of the world, who penetrates the darkness we experience because of our sins. The readings for

the Mass today and throughout the season of Advent prepare us for the celebration of Our Lord's *first coming* (his Nativity or "birth" and Epiphany or "manifestation") at Christmas, and they deepen our anticipation of his *second coming* (his Parousia—literally, "his glorious presence") on the Last Day. In the mind of the Church, the two comings are deeply related.

Our lives are lived in the middle period of these two comings, and this time is filled with the opportunity to receive an abundance of grace. Taking a cue from a prayer of the Mass, the Lord comes to us each day in word and sacrament to strengthen us in holiness. The word proclaimed in the liturgy and used within our personal time of prayer is the living word of God that has the power to cause an effect in our lives. The Letter to the Hebrews confirms this for us, stating: "the word of God is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword, penetrating even between soul and spirit, joints and marrow, and able to discern reflections and thoughts of the heart" (4:12). The sacraments that we receive give us the grace we need to live our lives each day according to the will of God. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches us that "the seven sacraments touch all the stages and all the important moments of Christian life: they give birth and increase, healing and mission to the Christian's life of faith" (CCC 1210).

Through the sacred Scriptures and the holy sacraments, Christ comes to us with his presence and the power of his grace. Preparing our hearts and minds for his coming to us disposes us to experience all that his grace is able to accomplish in us. The more we are recollected and prepared to welcome the Lord, the more we will discover the sublime effect of his gifts. Such is the nature of our Advent preparations and the blessings for which we can hope. This is a season of special grace. "Come, Lord Jesus!"

#### PRAY FOR DOBBS



Celebrating the birth of the Lord reminds us of the inherent dignity of every child in the womb from the moment of conception. Sadly, in the United States, abortion has taken the lives of over 60 million unborn children since 1973 and kills well over 600,000 each year. It is an institutionalized evil of enormous proportion. The United States is an extreme outlier in abortion law and policy, being one of only four countries—along

with China, North Korea, and Canada—that allows abortion at *any stage* of a woman's pregnancy. The upcoming Supreme Court case *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health* could start to change that, as the court considers the question of whether it is constitutional to ban abortion at any point pre-viability. This could be the case for which we have prayed and waited for over a generation to hopefully overturn *Roe v. Wade*.

Oral arguments begin on Wednesday, December 1. Prayer for this intention begins in earnest on November 30 and needs to continue until a judgment is reached. See information elsewhere in this bulletin and at stgertrude.org/news/prayfordobbs.

#### (TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: BROADENING HORIZONS

Parish involvement—what is that? How do we measure that? I know there are varying metrics and organizations to calculate and weigh these sorts of things. Usually, such mechanisms weigh the thing based upon activity...

"He's very active. You see, he rakes all of the leaves on campus every Saturday,

even in the summer. He's part of the men's group and the Knights of Columbus, and he's a hall of fame seventh grade basketball coach."

"She practically runs the parish. Last year she organized the festival, sang in the choir while lectoring, and won the 5k while organizing it. Not to mention, she volunteers in the school all of the time."

You get the point.

In our overactive world, we tend to define ourselves or our fellow parishioners based upon activity and activity alone. Now, I'm obviously not arguing that everyone should halt involvement in all St. Gertrude activities. Far from it. But, I do think we might benefit from broadening the horizon a bit. We can start this by going back to square one. What's the point of the Catholic Church anyway? I think we can glean an answer from the first three paragraphs of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* that would go something like this: God calls persons, divided by sin, into the unity of one family called the Church. Urged on by the love of Christ, the members of the Church are to participate in proclaiming the Good News everywhere in the world—assisting with that apostolic mission of making disciples of all nations.

In other words, the Church is a family, yes. And families do things together. But, this is a family on a mission with a very real outward focus. This is a family that doesn't just stay in—there's some of that—but one that isn't afraid to go out, to engage others, and to invite them into the family home.

What is a parish, then? How does it function within the Catholic Church and its mission? Well, Jesus sends the apostles from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth (see Lk 24:47; Acts 1:6-8; Mk 16:15; and Mt 28:16-20). As they go along, they establish the Church in each locale with its own bishop, and the bishop eventually ordains priests and deacons, and there we go. As the Catholic Church's structure and status

in society becomes more solid, parishes are eventually established. As canon law tells us, a parish is "a certain community of the Christian faithful stably constituted in a particular church, whose pastoral care is entrusted to a pastor (parochus) as its proper pastor (pastor) under the authority of the diocesan bishop" (Can. 515, §1). In other words, the bishop entrusts a group of Catholics to a pastor who has an administrative and pastoral responsibility. But, there is more! Canon 518 says, "As a general rule a parish is to be territorial, that is, one which includes all the Christian faithful of a certain territory." Parishes are both people *and* territories. (The etymology of the word "parish" is indicative of this, but you can look that up yourself and ponder it.)

This is a good start, but what are the people of a parish supposed to do within the parish (i.e., geographical territory)? Be really active? Let's look at canon law again:

A pastor is obliged to make provision so that the word of God is proclaimed in its entirety to those living in the parish. . . . He is to make every effort, *even with the collaboration of the Christian faithful*, so that the message of the gospel comes also to those who have ceased the practice of their religion or do not profess the true faith (Can. 528, §1).

Did you catch that? The pastor bears pastoral responsibility for bringing the Gospel to the non-Catholics in the parish territory and the members of the lay faithful are to help him. Might this be the key for broadening our horizons around parish involvement? Sure, being involved on campus is valuable and necessary. However, we can't forget that "what specifically characterizes the laity is their secular nature," meaning "the laity, by their very vocation, seek the kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God. They live in the world, that is, in each and in all of the secular professions and occupations. They live in the ordinary circumstances of family and social life, from which the very web of their existence is woven. They are called there by God that by exercising their proper function and led by the spirit of the Gospel they may work for the sanctification of the world from within as a leaven" (*Lumen Gentium*, §31).

It is worth considering, perhaps, how an understanding of "parish involvement" might expand to embrace a fuller meaning for each parishioner—over and above the activities, events, and groups he or she engages with on our campus and into the neighborhood, workplace, social settings, and beyond.

#### ASK A PRIEST—JESUS' REIGN AND MY NEEDS FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P.

**Q:** Should I ever judge my neighbor? If I don't, how will justice come about? When and why must Christians forgive?

A: Pope St. John Paul II once wrote about

justice that "if [it] is in itself suitable for 'arbitration' between people concerning the reciprocal distribution of objective goods in an equitable manner, love and only love (including that kindly love that we call 'mercy') is capable of restoring man to Himself."<sup>1</sup> Justice is important, since it prompts you and me to see that our neighbors have what they need and deserve. The Church lists justice among certain values that promote human dignity: truth, freedom, justice, and love.<sup>2</sup> If it is isolated from these other values, justice can become something rather heartless, self-serving, and miserable. Justice must serve the higher reality of love.

Jesus taught that "with the judgement you pronounce you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get."<sup>3</sup> This serves as a warning to everyone of us, however innocent or guilty, with respect to upholding the aforementioned human values. Jesus clearly expected his disciples to be both righteous in their relations with others;<sup>4</sup> he did not erase the basic value of justice for human society. "In no passage of the Gospel message does forgiveness, or mercy as its source, mean indulgence toward evil, scandals, injury, or insult. In any case, reparation for evil and scandal, compensation for injury, and satisfaction for insult are conditions for forgiveness."<sup>5</sup> Mercy, as an expression of true love for the human person, includes a respect for standards of justice. Mercy that ignores or smothers my brother or sister isn't worthy of the name! However, in the face of justice, mercy points to something higher and more essential in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Jesus Christ is Divine Mercy unveiled. He fully reveals God's uninvited love with which he wishes to reconcile each sinful man and woman to himself. Remember last week's recognition of Christ the King, he who invited the thief into his kingdom while dying next to him on the cross.<sup>6</sup> Christians have always been known for their willingness to imitate Jesus in this respect: "Forgiveness demonstrates the presence in the world of the love which is more powerful than sin. Forgiveness is also the fundamental condition for reconciliation, not only in the relationship of God with man, but also in relationships between people."<sup>7</sup>

Christians confess they are sinners before God and man. Then they let that mercy flow toward others. This imprints upon the world a new shape and the pledge of heavenly glory.

Mercy affirms justice and leads it toward new heights. What better can "restore me to myself" if not God's love and mercy in Jesus Christ? What better can prompt me to show respect and fairness toward others, if not the mercy that has so deeply impacted me? "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." "Blessed are the merciful for they shall obtain mercy." If I ever find myself praying for someone in need or helping a stranger or sacrificing time to address a social issue in our community, this should be counted among the miracles of Jesus' mercy. Something has been "re-adjusted" inside me that cannot *not* impact those around me. In this new reality, justice is not just an exercise in social arithmetic, but it is revealed as a blessing of God "springing up" from the earth Jesus has renewed.
