They are an extraordinary family, and the strength of their faith in the midst of such trial is a testimony to the power of God's grace to overcome the sufferings of this world. We are so thankful they were willing to come to Cincinnati to share their story with us.

The Saturday after that, November 19, is the all-parish dinner/party celebrating St. Gertrude's feast. The celebration will feature a live band, lots of food and beverages, and a promise of a good time to be had by all.

Don't forget that, as is our custom every year, we will be praying a novena to St. Gertrude in preparation of her feast day. Our novena prayers will begin on November 7 and continue until the eve of St. Gertrude's feast day. Novena prayer cards will be in the church, and we encourage everyone to join in the novena prayers, which will take place just before the beginning of each Mass.

Finally, we have one last piece of news. I'm happy to announce that we will be having a new friar, Father Darren Pierre, O.P., joining our Dominican community here at St. Gertrude Priory in the coming days. Father Darren will be engaging in a variety of community ministries, including some assistance with Masses and confessions in the parish. Father Darren is a former pastor of St. Gertrude who, for the past 12 years, has been serving in a variety of positions at our Dominican provincial headquarters in New York City. After serving for a brief period of time as our prior provincial, Father Darren came to recognize that his gifts and talents were not the right match for the responsibilities of that position and recently resigned from that office. We're thrilled to have him joining us at St. Gertrude and look forward to his pastoral ministry among us.

MAKING MORAL CHOICES

Below is an excerpt from Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, a teaching document from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops on the political responsibility of Catholics. This section of the document, along with the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's iVoteCatholic website, is a great resource as you thoughtfully evaluate candidates for Tuesday's elections.

31. Decisions about political life are complex and require the exercise of a well-formed conscience aided by prudence. This exercise of conscience begins with outright opposition to laws and other policies that violate human life or weaken its protection. Those who knowingly, willingly, and directly support public policies or legislation that undermine fundamental moral principles cooperate with evil.

32. Sometimes morally flawed laws already exist. In this situation, the process of framing legislation to protect life is subject to prudential judgment and "the art of the possible." At times this process may restore justice only partially or gradually. For example, St. John Paul II taught that when a government official who fully opposes abortion cannot succeed in completely overturning a proabortion law, he or she may work to improve protection for unborn human life, "limiting the harm done by such a law" and lessening its negative impact as much as possible (Evangelium Vitae, no. 73). Such incremental improvements in the law are acceptable as steps toward the full restoration of justice. However, Catholics must never abandon the moral requirement to seek full protection for all human life from the moment of conception until natural death.

33. Prudential judgment is also needed in applying moral principles to specific policy choices in areas such as armed conflict, housing, health care, immigration, and others. This does not mean that all choices are equally valid, or that our guidance and that of other Church leaders is just another political opinion or policy preference among many others. Rather, we urge Catholics to listen carefully to the Church's teachers when we apply Catholic social teaching to specific proposals and situations. The judgments and recommendations that we make as bishops on such specific issues do not carry the same moral authority as statements of universal moral teachings. Nevertheless, **the Church's guidance on these matters is an essential resource for Catholics** as they determine whether their own moral judgments are consistent with the Gospel and with Catholic teaching.

34. Catholics often face difficult choices about how to vote. This is why it is so important to vote according to a well-formed conscience that perceives the proper relationship among moral goods. A Catholic cannot vote for a candidate who favors a policy promoting an intrinsically evil act, such as abortion, euthanasia, assisted suicide, deliberately subjecting workers or the poor to subhuman living conditions, redefining marriage in ways that violate its essential meaning, or racist behavior, if the voter's intent is to support that position. In such cases, a Catholic would be guilty of formal cooperation in grave evil. At the same time, a voter should not use a candidate's opposition to an intrinsic evil to justify indifference or inattentiveness to other important moral issues involving human life and dignity.

35. There may be times when a Catholic who rejects a candidate's unacceptable position even on policies promoting an intrinsically evil act may reasonably decide to vote for that candidate for other morally grave reasons. Voting in this way would be permissible only for truly grave moral reasons, not to advance narrow interests or partisan preferences or to ignore a fundamental moral evil.

36. When all candidates hold a position that promotes an intrinsically evil act, the conscientious voter faces a dilemma. The voter may decide to take the extraordinary step of not voting for any candidate or, after careful deliberation, may decide to vote for the candidate deemed less likely to advance such a morally flawed position and more likely to pursue other authentic human goods.

37. In making these decisions, it is essential for Catholics to be guided by a well-formed conscience that recognizes that all issues do not carry the same moral weight and that the moral obligation to oppose policies promoting intrinsically evil acts has a special claim on our consciences and our actions. These decisions should take into account a candidate's commitments, character, integrity, and ability to influence a given issue. In the end, this is a decision to be made by each Catholic guided by a conscience formed by Catholic moral teaching.

ASK A PRIEST— THE SIGN OF PEACE FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P.

Q: What is the background to the sign of peace at Mass? I always thought it was a very meaningful part of Mass, but I realize that some people don't mind when it is omitted. In an ideal Catholic Mass, how important is this gesture?

A: You ask a very good question. And

you're accurate to detect that, somewhat ironically, the sign of peace is a practice that can divide Catholics—at least according to personal preference, if not in deeper ways. I will answer according to your line of questioning.

Like many parts of the Catholic Mass, the sign of peace has a complex history. I won't even begin to comment on how it is or is not practiced in other rites, such as the Maronite Catholic Liturgy or the Ukrainian Catholic Liturgy. You'll have to discover these on your own! It appears that the "kiss of peace" gained popularity in the Roman Rite (i.e., our own patrimony, along with the Dominican Rite) by the turn of the first millennium. This kiss, a common social greeting in the ancient world, was exchanged among the clergy in

the sanctuary and often made its way into the congregation (a separation between the sexes also frequently being in practice when people went to church). For obvious reasons, often the "kiss" instead became a simple embrace, the passing of folded hands from one person to another, or the passing of an object that everyone kissed. By a certain point in time, the gesture became an option only exercised by certain ministers in the sanctuary or on certain occasions.¹ Of course, it was again made more widespread with the Novus Ordo Mass of Vatican II.

More deeply, what does this gesture mean? Its place in the Mass is highly significant: it follows the Lord's Prayer and the greeting, "The peace of the Lord be with you always." There is also a reference to our Lord's promised gift to the Apostles in a prayer of the priest: "Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will."² At the heart of the Church's celebration of the Eucharist is a desire for unity initiated by Jesus himself. This is the proper context for the sign of peace.

Our present ritual for Mass, as found in the *Roman Missal*, leaves the invitation to extend the sign of peace to the discretion of the deacon or priest. The rubrics go on to say: "And all offer one another a sign, in keeping with local customs, that expresses peace, communion, and charity. The Priest gives the sign of peace to a Deacon or minister."³ There is room for discretion on the part of priest and people, but some sign of this other type of "holy communion" is asked for by the Church in our present form of the Mass. As always, the Church's liturgy keeps us on our toes and calls us to the conversion of heart essential to the Gospel. And there, meeting the Lord, we find peace.
