CHRISTMAS: GIFTS YOU CAN GIVE YOUR PASTOR NEXT WEEKEND

It's hard to believe, but next weekend will be Christmas! That means that, for most

of us, the days ahead are going to be quite busy. Some will be doing some final last-minute Christmas shopping; others might be, *ahem*, only beginning their Christmas shopping (!!!) Many will be either making travel plans for the holiday, or finalizing plans to receive guests over the days ahead. Our St. Gertrude School children are just days away from putting on their beloved annual Christmas Pageant. Soon, volunteers will be decorating the church for the Christmas Masses. All of these preparations are meant to enable us to be prepared to celebrate the birth of Our Savior in the best possible way.

It is also a time of year when so many generously give gifts to the Dominican friars here. But as the pastor, I have a very *specific* set of gifts I would like to request from St. Gertrude parishioners this year. What follows is my "Christmas Wish List" for next weekend:

- 1. Many people will be coming to Mass here next weekend who, to be honest, perhaps have not stepped foot in a Church in a long time. If you see an unfamiliar face, please say hello or wish them a Merry Christmas; or at the very least, smile at them in welcome. Convey by your body language that you are happy they are here. If they failed to grab a liturgy program on their way in or seem confused about what hymnal to use, do your best to give them a helping hand.
- If you usually sit in the same pew and you arrive only to find someone else in "your" pew . . . relax. Don't get angry or give them the side-eye. Peacefully move on and find another place to be seated.
- 3. If an infant begins wailing or a toddler makes a fuss, don't glare at the parents or whip around in your pew to stare backwards to figure out who the "offending party" is. Of all the days of the year, the day in which we celebrate that Our Lord was born as a tiny baby is a day to rejoice with how many babies and small children we have in our parish.
- 4. While we hope we have planned adequately to have enough programs for each of the Masses, should we run short and you see people without, consider sharing with the family members or friends you are with and offering a program to someone without one.
- 5. Especially at our busier Masses, our ushers are going to have their hands full trying to find seats for everybody. Please do all you can to assist them by moving closer together to try to free up seats if you see the Mass is getting full.
- 6. A special request for the gentlemen: if you are at a Mass that has reached the point of people standing because every seat in every

- pew is full, consider offering your seat to someone who is elderly, or to a pregnant mom or mom with a baby, or anyone you see standing who might need that seat more than you. (Obviously prudence is needed here; if you are a young dad with five little ones that you and your wife are struggling to corral as a team, then offering your seat to someone and letting your wife try to handle all five herself all Mass long is probably not a wise decision.)
- 7. I didn't think I would ever need to say this, but just in case: please reserve the blue handicapped parking spaces for those who are truly in need of them. Similarly, please reserve the front two pews on the Rosary Altar side for those with limited mobility and their families.
- 8. If you are a lector, Eucharistic minister, usher, or server and are attending a Mass but not assigned to serve at it, if you arrive early enough, kindly check in with the sacristy to see if your services may be needed. Inevitably, this time of the year plans change at the last minute, or people get sick and have to cancel. To have someone ready to step in makes the sacristan's life a lot easier.
- 9. Have mercy on your priests and musicians! During the period from 8 a.m. Sunday through 12 p.m. Monday, we will be offering 10 Masses in 28 hours! It is inevitable at some point that exhaustion will set in and mistakes will be made. Be gentle!
- 10. No matter what the circumstances around your arrival for Christmas Mass, once you are inside, remember the reason you are there. Do your best to ignore any distractions, let go of any frustrations, set aside any anxieties . . . and as much as possible, immerse yourself into the mystery we celebrate. "For today a Savior is born for us, who is Christ and Lord" (cf. Luke 2:11).

That is my Christmas Wish List. To whatever degree you can do this next weekend, you will fill your pastor's heart with great joy. See you at the manger,

HOLY TEACHING

THE INFANCY NARRATIVE ACCORDING TO ST. LUKE

FATHER JOSEPH ALOBAIDI, O.P.

St. Luke, most likely, is the Bible's only author who is not from Israeli origin. However, his knowledge of the Hebrew Bible is so thorough that the hypothesis of his conversion to the religion of Israel,

before his adherence to the faith in Jesus Christ, seems probable. He is pagan and of Greek descent, and there are traces of Greek epic literature in the structure of his writings. His work is twofold: The life of the Lord Jesus Christ (Gospel of Luke) and the beginning of the Church following the Resurrection (Acts of the Apostles).

The Role of the Virgin Mary, According to St. Luke

The first two chapters of St. Luke's Gospel are the origin of the devotion to the Mother of God in the old churches (or in Christianity before the Reformation). The Annunciation, the Visitation, the Magnificat, the presentation of the infant Jesus in the temple and his reception by Simeon and Anna, the finding of Jesus in the temple . . . all of these are events found in the Gospel according to St. Luke. They are passages that narrate the early life of the Lord. In so doing, they also underline the role of the Virgin Mary. Let us examine some of the often ignored aspects concerning the Mother of God, since it is impossible to speak of the child Jesus, or any child, without mention of the mother.

The Annunciation

Unlike St. Matthew who speaks about the Annunciation from Joseph's perspective, Luke speaks of the Annunciation from Mary's point of view. Let us limit our short investigation to four aspects, usually treated lightly, while speaking about the encounter between the angel Gabriel and the young Mary.

Mary's Age: If we take into consideration the age at which girls in the Middle East more than two thousand years ago got married, young Mary was probably 13. It is at this age, the beginning of her womanhood, that Mary agreed to have a child by the Holy Spirit. The icons, presenting Mary as a mature young woman, do not correctly reflect the true age of the Mother of God.

Mary's "Yes": With St. Luke, we admire Mary's acceptance of the will of God, and we imagine the whole event happening in a peaceful and serene atmosphere. The truth is, when Mary accepted the angel's offer, she knew that she was risking her life. While the iconography presents her peacefully hearing what is proposed to her, the reality is much more dramatic. It is only her strong faith in God that allowed her to overcome the anxiety and fear that the angel's words provoked in her. Many facts were unknown to her: she didn't know if Joseph would still take her as his

wife, she didn't know how her family and neighbors would react . . . It is with uncertainty about the future and life-threatening dangers that Mary said "yes" to God's will. The law and customs of her time sentenced to death any woman having a child before living with her husband. It is only in placing Mary's "yes" in its historical and social setting that we can truly measure the greatness of her trust in God.

The Angel's Words: Everything the angel Gabriel said about the child Jesus was in the future and unverifiable. Yet, Mary had chosen to believe. In other words, Mary's faith does not concern her miraculous motherhood alone, but extends to envelop the future of the child who will be born to her. All that she heard from the angel were "words" about the child's future. The glorious future of the child Jesus was announced to a poor and homeless family with no guarantee whatsoever. Nevertheless, Mary believed. She never doubted the realization of God' promises, becoming the exemplar for those who believe, the perfect illustration of the definition of faith: "believing in the existence of realities that at present remain unseen" (Hebrew 11:1).

Mary's Virginity: There is discussion amongst exegetes about the word "virgin." A passage in the Book of Isaiah (7:14) speaks about a "maiden" who will be pregnant. When the Greek Jewish community of Alexandria (North of Egypt) translated this passage, instead of "maiden," the translators chose the word "virgin." Many, especially in the Reformation, think that the veneration of the original churches for the Virgin Mother of God comes from this imprecise translation of this Hebrew word. It is sad, if not ridiculous, to reduce more than 20 centuries of veneration for the Virgin Mary to an error of translation. It is sad also because it ignores the obvious. Indeed, it is her question to Gabriel, "How can this be, since I do not know any man" (Luke 1:34) that is at the heart of our Marian devotion.

Magi or Shepherds?

St. Matthew speaks about the magi who came from the east to venerate the Child Jesus. St. Luke speaks about the angels and the shepherds who venerate the Child Jesus. How do we reconcile the difference? The answer becomes possible if we consider the end of the Gospel according to St. John. In the last verse of his Gospel, John states: "There were many other things that Jesus did, if all were written down the world itself, I suppose, would not hold all the books that would have to be written" (John 21:25). In other words, the Gospel writers had to make choices between many stories about the Lord. Matthew and Luke, inspired by the Holy Spirit, wanted to say that the birth of the Child Jesus is not only a local event concerning Mary and Joseph alone, but also a universal event. To express this meaning, St. Matthew spoke about the magi who are wise men from the east, not Israelites, coming to show their allegiance to the Child Jesus and to worship him. St. Luke, expressing the same meaning, chooses another event. He speaks about the rejoicing of the angels and shepherds at the birth of the Savior. The writers chose different events to express the same meaning: the cosmic dimension of the birth of the Son of Mary.


