<u>SEEK THE LORD</u>

ARCHBISHOP DENNIS M. SCHNURR

On Christmas morning, in the opening prayer of the Mass at Dawn, we ask God to allow the light of faith, which radiates from the incarnate Word, to shine through in our deeds. This prayer reminds us of a beautiful truth: the

gift of our faith is not something we keep to ourselves; rather, having received the very life of God within our souls, He then calls us to share that divine goodness with others.

Jesus Christ is the model of such self-giving. Out of love for us, with nothing to gain for Himself, He entered into our human nature and offered Himself for our redemption from sin. During the season of Advent, we prepare ourselves to celebrate this mystery at Christmas. Christ's birth into this world invites us to renew our awareness of the humble nature of God's saving love and His desire to reveal the truth of our humanity by becoming human Himself.

The Lord, who has given us everything out of love, asks us, in turn, to give of ourselves for others. We live in a world desperately in need of love. Our faith invites us to put the love we have received from God into action, thereby recognizing the inherent dignity of each person created in the image and likeness of God. The Church has outlined the 14 Works of Mercy, the practical, time-honored ways we can put our love into action. The Corporal Works of Mercy are to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, visit the imprisoned, shelter the homeless, visit the sick and bury the dead. The Spiritual Works of Mercy are to instruct the ignorant, counsel the doubtful, admonish the sinner, bear wrongs patiently, forgive others, comfort the afflicted and pray for the living and the dead. There are so many ways in which we can strive to love others as God has loved us!

As we prepare this Advent to celebrate the mystery of the Lord's Incarnation, it is a fitting time to reflect on the love we have received from God and what our response to that love may be. As individuals and families, we can discern how God may be inviting us to grow in our love for others. There are many opportunities to share Christ's love with others through our parish communities and other groups, including the many charitable ministries which offer assistance or provide services addressing the wide range of needs in our society. Maybe there is one such ministry which is uniquely suited to your own talents and interests. If so, this might be the perfect time to get involved.

I pray that this Advent may be a fruitful period of prayer and preparation for each of you, for your families, for our parishes and for our archdiocese as a whole. May we welcome the Christ Child and know that with the love He has come to offer us, He also calls us to offer that love to our brothers and sisters here on earth. And may the peace, joy and fullness of life that only Christ can bring be yours this Advent and Christmas!

EVANGELIZATION & FAITH FORMATION



GOSPEL HOSPITALITY TYLER CASTRUCCI, COORDINATOR

OF ADULT EVANGELIZATION "It's the holiday season . . ." I can't help but think of Andy Williams crooning

those words each year at the beginning of December. Advent is here, which means Christmas is just around the corner, which means lots of fun Christmas traditions, movies, music, family gatherings, and in-laws. As a parish community, it means we are about three weeks away from potentially hundreds of people entering our church doors for the first time in many years—or for the first time, period. If you've ever had large amounts of guests over to your home for Christmas, then you know the ensuing panic and frenzied preparations that lead up to the big day. Preparing the church for Christmas can sometimes feel the same way. In light of this, I've been reflecting on hospitality and what hospitality should be in light of the Gospel.

Basic hospitality is something that many nonreligious groups and organizations value. Chick-fil-A is a great example of basic hospitality. It is a key "strategic anchor" for them. Chick-fil-A certainly isn't shy about their Christian values. But they are first and foremost a business, and being hospitable is good for business. The vice president of Chick-fil-A talks about this in an article in which he emphasizes learning and using customers' names, offering a warm greeting and farewell, and more. This is all good stuff, but it's not radical hospitality, or what I like to call Gospel hospitality.

What is Gospel hospitality? It's pouring oneself out for another in view of their dignity as a human person for the sake of their salvation. Sounds heavy, but it's really quite simple. It involves a fundamental mindset shift from that of our animal nature (strangers are enemies) to that of our human nature in light of Christ (by welcoming a stranger I am respecting his or her dignity as a human being). A well-known and beloved story about St. Dominic reflects this attitude. When Dominic began his travels to evangelize, he rode to an inn late one evening and encountered an innkeeper who subscribed to the Albigensian heresy. According to tradition, St. Dominic stayed up with the man (even though he was probably exhausted from his travels) all through the night discussing the faith. By the time morning arrived, the innkeeper had returned to orthodox belief. This is Gospel hospitality. I'm sure Dominic had convincing arguments and things to say, but that in and of itself probably isn't what won the innkeeper over. Dominic didn't just learn his name, and offer a warm greeting and farewell. He went beyond that and invested himself fully in the man's story. The innkeeper only cared about what Dominic had to say because he knew that Dominic cared about him as a person.

Extreme? Yes. Difficult to replicate? Absolutely! Nevertheless, I believe this is the type of Gospel hospitality that Jesus calls us to. It doesn't always have to take the form of an all-nighter with a stranger, but the principle of taking genuine interest in another person's story remains the same. We can start by doing something simple such as making it a point to go up to an unfamiliar face after Christmas Mass and welcoming and getting to know him or her. Imagine if all of the new faces that pass through St. Gertrude Church's doors this Christmas encountered this type of Gospel hospitality. If it prompts one person to return to the Church or discover the Gospel for the first time, then it will have been worth it.





<u>CHILDREN IN THE BIBLE –</u> FROM SACRIFICE TO BLESSING

I'd like to begin this series on the infancy narratives—and, in particular, this article about children in the Bible—by acknowledging two biblical facts: the Bible,

as we know it, took approximately 11 centuries to be formed, and it is a collective work, by many authors, written in three languages, in the Middle East (a land of many cultures).

In other words, the status of men, women, children, animals given the unavoidable development of the society in such a long period of time—has passed through many stages. There are differences in the status of human beings between the earliest layers of the Old Testament (parts of the books of Exodus, Numbers, Judges, etc.) and the last writings of the New Testament (Second Epistle of Peter, Revelation, etc.). Let us examine how such developments affected children's place in society.

Investigating the early historical facts pertaining to the relation between human beings and the divinity seems like looking at dreadful scenes taken from a horror movie. In fact, it is certain that humans, especially children and, in a few cases, women, were offered in sacrifice during some old religious ceremonies. Storms, thunder, flooding, fire, and sicknesses were considered manifestations of the divinities' anger. Human sacrifices constituted means by which primitive populations in the Middle East and elsewhere tried to appease the anger of these divinities. That was more than 3,000 years ago, and the Bible adamantly condemns such practices. Witnesses to these condemnations are, for example, Leviticus 18:21. Furthermore, we learn in Leviticus 20:2-3 that the death penalty was imposed on anyone who destined his child to be sacrificed. However, the painful truth remains that the Bible suggests that early Israelite communities, in imitation of their pagan neighbors, were tempted by the same kind of sacrifices. Indeed, the Bible (Judges 11:29-40) mentions one such sacrifice by Jephte. Although it is slightly different from the pagan sacrifices, it remains the only clear case of human sacrifice in the Bible. Other biblical passages imply that such practice was known, if not accomplished, by the early Israelites, but never to the God of the Bible. The Bible's condemnation of such acts is unambiguous.

We advance in history to reach times where children become a blessing. Psalms 128:3 describes the faithful as a happy man whose "wife is like a fruitful vine" and whose "children are like olive branches surrounding his table." Then comes the time of The New Testament when the Lord Jesus Christ, ostensibly and to the objection of his disciples, welcomes the children among his auditors: "Let the children come to me and do not hinder them for to such belongs the kingdom of God" (Mark 10:14). Moreover, he asks his disciples to initate the children if they want to inherit the kingdom of God: "Truly I say to you, unless you turn and become like children you will never enter the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 18:3). The children, at the end, receive their highest praise when the Lord Jesus Christ identifies himself to the children, making of them a representative of God: "Whoever receives this child in my name receives me and whoever receives me receives him who sent me" (Lk 9:48).
