FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



A SUGGESTED MEDITATION AS WE BEGIN 2024

Nearly all of us are familiar with the concept of "New Year's Resolutions," where we look ahead to the upcoming year and decide that *this* is the year we are going to eat healthier, spend more (some?) time at the gym, stop smoking,

be more involved in our community, clean the house regularly (or at least *occasionally*), or any of dozens of other good intentions. While not spiritual or religious in its origin, if the popular culture has swept you up into making some such resolutions, then good for you. I pray the Lord gives you perseverance to accomplish whatever good intentions the popular culture has inspired you to pursue!

As the last days of 2023 drift into the realm of "last year" and we turn the calendars to 2024, I would suggest everyone take some time during the upcoming week—as an individual, or perhaps as married couples or even whole families together—to prayerfully reflect and meditate on this transition from 2023 to 2024, taking time to both look *back* at the past year and *forward* to the upcoming year.

What follows below are your pastor's suggestions for just a few questions you might ask and reflect upon if you choose to make such a meditation. I would suggest you set aside a block of time, as uninterrupted as your state in life might allow, and begin by praying to the Holy Spirit to enlighten your mind as you reflect and pray about the past year and the upcoming year. You might do all of this in one sitting, or perhaps break up this time of prayer and meditation over several days. Hopefully doing so will help you to start off the new calendar year on a spiritually fruitful note.

Looking Back at 2023

- What are some of the greatest blessings I have experienced this past year? Did I recognize those blessings immediately, or did it take some time for me to recognize them as blessings from God?
- What are the crosses that the Lord has asked me to carry this past year? In what ways have other people, and even the Lord himself, helped me to carry those crosses? How have I grown as a result of carrying those crosses?
- In what ways have each member of my family reflected the face of Christ to me this past year? How have my close friends done so?
- Who are the new people who have come into my life during this past year? In what ways have they been blessings to me?
- Who are the people who have been examples of faith and sources of inspiration to me, who have urged me by their words and examples to pursue holiness?
- What are the events I have experienced that have helped me grow in my faith? Which of our parish centennial events had the greatest impact upon me?



Looking Ahead to 2024

- What is the greatest hope I have for myself for 2024 (and how might "achieving" this hope, or being granted this hope, help me to serve God and my neighbor more faithfully?)
- What is the one sin currently present in my life that I most want God's help overcoming during this next year?
- What is the one virtue I truly hope to grow in during the upcoming year?
- Among my family, friends, and acquaintances, who most needs my *prayers* during the months ahead? Who most needs my *words* (whether words of support, encouragement, instruction, correction, etc.)? Who most needs my *actions*?
- What is one concrete change I can make in my life that will bring me closer to being the living saint that the Lord has created me to be?

TEACHER Q&A WITH MRS. ANDREA STROPE (LIBRARIAN)

St. Gertrude Bulletin: Why did you choose to work at St. Gertrude School? **Mrs. Strope:** I chose to work at SGS because I wanted to be more involved in my parish community. When I saw that the school had a job opening, I prayed a novena



HOLY TEACHING



ASK A PRIEST—SOULS OF THOSE BEFORE CHRIST

FATHER DAVID ENDRES, PROFESSOR AT MOUNT ST. MARY'S SEMINARY & SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Q: What does the Church believe happened to the souls of those who lived before Christ? **A:** Many presume that those souls who lived

before Jesus had no opportunity to attain heaven, but the Catholic Church teaches that salvation is a gift from God offered to all people. Those who lived before the coming of Christ were able to attain salvation by their faith in God's promises and by their responses to Jesus when He preached to them in the realm of the dead.

The People of the Covenant

In the Old Testament, God made a covenant with Abraham, promising to be the God of his descendants and to bless all nations through them. This promise was fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ, the "Lord of Life" and the savior of the Jews and Gentiles.

The Church believes that the Old Testament patriarchs and prophets, such as Abraham, Moses and Elijah, were saved by their faith in obedience to God's promises and obedience to God's commands. As we read in the Book of Genesis, Abraham "put his faith in the Lord, who attributed it to him as an act of righteousness" (15:6). God's grace was at work in their lives, enabling them to respond in faith. This is why the Church venerates the saints of the Old Testament as heroes of the faith and examples of obedience of God.

The Abode of the Dead

In the Apostles' Creed, we proclaim that after His crucifixion, Jesus "descended into hell." This phrase is often a source of confusion, leading some to believe that Jesus raised the damned. But "hell" in this context is different: it is the abode of the dead (Sheol in Hebrew or Hades in Greek).

In this so-called hell, all are deprived of the vision of God—but not necessarily for eternity. Rather, in this abode of the dead, souls awaited the Redeemer, and the just responded to his call to salvation: "Jesus did not descend into hell to deliver the damned, nor to destroy the hell of damnation, but to free the just who had gone before him" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 633).

Salvation Through Christ

Even for those who lived centuries before Jesus, their salvation is from Him. The saints in the abode of the dead were saved by divine grace and their response of faith to Jesus, not by their pre-Christian religious observance. As St. Peter writes in his first epistle: "The gospel was preached even to the dead" (4:6). In going to the dead, Jesus brought the message of salvation to fulfillment. All—from the beginning of time—have the opportunity for redemption. Jesus' descent to the dead was the last phase of His mission, which, though "condensed in



time [is] vast in its real significance" (*CCC*, 634). Christ's redemptive work spread to all humanity—peoples of every age, language, religion and place.

The Souls of the Just

Christ's descent to the dead reminds us that just men and women have lived throughout history. As we hear in a passage from the Book of Wisdom, which is often proclaimed at funerals: "The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no torment shall touch them . . . They are in peace" (3:1, 3).

Those who lived before Christ had the opportunity for redemption when Jesus descended into the realm of the dead. This act is considered the fulfillment of the Gospel message and the completion of Jesus' redemptive work, extending salvation even to those who lived before His time on earth.

Endres, a priest of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, is academic dean of the Athenaeum of Ohio and professor of Church history and historical theology at Mount St. Mary's Seminary and School of Theology. He holds a doctoral degree from the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., and is editor of the scholarly quarterly U.S. Catholic Historian. In addition, Father Endres is a regular contributor to The Catholic Telegraph.
