MEET OUR VOLUNTEERS: TOM DORSEY

ASK A PRIEST



ASK A PRIEST— THE CHARACTER AND KEEPING OF ADVENT

FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P. Q: Is it appropriate to call Advent a penitential season? What is the difference between Lent and Advent in terms of daily Christian practices?

A: During Advent, we turn toward the Lord, the "King who is to come."¹ This spiritual posture easily follows the celebration of Christ the King and the emphasis on the Second Coming in the final days of Ordinary Time. But as Christmas approaches with its remembrance of the first coming of the Son of God, our fundamental orientation does not change: "The Lord is close at hand, come let us worship him."² Indeed, Jesus Christ our Savior has already come! While it is important to remember all the things he said and did during his first time on this earth, we would be missing the point if Christmas were simply an annual trip down memory lane!

The Church explains that the four weeks of Advent are meant to accomplish two things. First, to prepare for the commemoration of the first coming of Christ with the solemn celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany. Second, Advent "is a time when that remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's Second Coming in the last days."³ This means that, by remembering the beginning of Jesus' life on this earth, we are meant to increase our expectation for when Jesus will come again. This shouldn't dilute our experience of Christmas but underscore how very significant this annual season can be, spiritually speaking. Jesus came once because he will come again. If we have loved the first coming, then there is no reason to fear the second.

So, how are we supposed to treat Advent? Should we hunker down as Catholics of strict observance who expect Christ's return any day? Yes and no. The Church explains that Advent is "a period of devout and joyful expectation"⁴ and "a time of waiting, conversion, and of hope."⁵ Yes, this season is important. We shouldn't shirk it off as if we had no need of it. You and I probably have a lot of room to grow in love of God and neighbor! We will be judged on this someday. No, the Advent season cannot be a dour time of doom and gloom. This is against St. Paul's attitude and prayer: "I pray always with joy in my every prayer for you, because of your partnership for the gospel . . . and this is my prayer: that your love may increase ever more and more in knowledge and every kind of perception, to discern what is of value, so that you may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ."⁶

Like the rest of life, we should aspire for our Advent days to be marked by simple joy, sober awareness, acts of love for God and neighbor, and a determination to leave sin behind so that we can fully possess Christ. Advent may not be explicitly penitential like Lent, but to remove all penance would be un-Christian. The point is to do or to suffer those things—even if unpleasant—that help us turn toward the Lord.

There are many prayers and customs that can help us remain expectant for Christ who has come and will come again: the use of Advent wreaths, Jesse trees, the rosary, Liturgy of the Hours, frequent attendance at Mass (especially on Sundays and December 8, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception), singing hymns like *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel*, and the installment of Nativity scenes. Other practices are better saved for the celebration of Christmas itself: Christmas carols, the Christmas tree, gifts, Christmas feasting, and the placing of the Christ Child in the manger. Even if no Catholic family or parish will execute the timing of these things perfectly, we should remember to use Advent according to its purpose: devout and joyful expectation of the King who is to come.
