Information will be forthcoming. May God bless us abundantly with the graces of the Lenten season.

Let us pray for the grace of conversion for ourselves and for others.



"Crucifizion of Christ with the Two Thieves", Fra Angelico (c.1437), National Museum of San Marco, Florence


## FROM THE DIARY OF ST. MARIA FAUSTINA KOWALSKA

## ASH WEDNESDAY 2021 - FEBRUARY 17

While observing the existing guidance already in place relative to worship in a time of public health concern, the blessing and distribution of ashes to the faithful on Ash Wednesday will be modified to follow the instruction from the Holy See on January 12, 2021. After blessing the ashes, the priest addresses all those present and only once says the formula, applying it to all in general: "Repent, and believe in the Gospel," or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The Priest then takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything.

## **NOTES**

- The wearing of ashes, while customary and laudable, is not an obligation of the faithful, so anyone who is fearful of becoming sick should not come forward, or even come to Mass on Ash Wednesday.
- Ashes may not be self-imposed: they are always given by a minister.

## LENTEN REMINDERS -FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Ash Wednesday, February 17, and Good Friday, April 2, are days of abstinence from meat and also days of fast, that is, limited to a single full meal. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. The law of fasting binds all Catholics from their 18th birthday until their 59th birthday. (canons 97, 1252) "Let the paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, so that the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection may be attained with uplifted and clear mind." (Constitution on the Liturgy, No. 110)

With regard to the obligatory days listed above, however, there are frequent questions about the degree of seriousness of the matter. To paraphrase Pope John Paul II: the obligation to do penance is a serious one; the obligation to observe, as a whole or "substantially," the penitential days specified by the Church is also serious. No one should be scrupulous in this regard; failure to observe an individual day of penance is not considered serious. People should seek to do more rather than less. Fast and abstinence on the days prescribed should be considered a minimum response to the Lord's call to penance and conversion.

## ASK A PRIEST - THE TRADITION OF RECEIVING BLESSED ASHES ON ASH WEDNESDAY BY FR. JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P.

**Q**: Can we receive ashes here in the traditional way this year?

**A**: The first Ash Wednesday I spent outside the United States was in 2010 in Rome, during the pontificate of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI. I remember an exciting "chance" encounter with the papal motorcade leaving the Vatican that evening to celebrate Mass at the Dominican Church of Santa Sabina. It was also the first time I noticed that the distribution of ashes is not done in the same manner everywhere in the Catholic world.

The practice of imposing ashes as an external sign of interior repentance is an ancient one. It is mentioned in the account of the King of Nineveh repenting after hearing the preaching of the prophet Jonah. Our Lord Jesus Christ acknowledged the efficacy of this practice (see Mt 11:21), although He taught His disciples that exterior penance should be more than just a sign to be seen by others (see Mt 6:16-18). Fr. Dennis McNamara explains that the Church has employed the imposition of ashes as a sign for penitents since her earliest centuries, although the practice was more generally extended and officially entered the Mass by the twelfth century.<sup>1</sup> Receiving ashes from one of the Church's ministers or someone delegated by them has remained a very popular way for the faithful to enter the season of Lent, even though Ash Wednesday is not a Holy Day of Obligation.

The Congregation of Divine Worship has said the following about the significance of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday:

"On the Wednesday before the first Sunday of Lent, the faithful receive the ashes, thus entering into the time established for the purification of their souls. This sign of penance, a traditionally biblical one, has been preserved among the Church's customs until the present day. It signifies the human condition of the sinner, who seeks to express his guilt before the Lord in an exterior manner, and by so doing express his interior conversion, led on by the confident hope that the Lord will be merciful. This same sign marks the beginning of the way of conversion, which is developed through the celebration of the sacraments of penance during the days before Easter."<sup>2</sup>

As I suggested at the beginning, the *way in which ashes are imposed* varies from country to country and has evolved over time. Although it is common for ashes to be smeared on the forehead in the shape of a cross in English-speaking countries, in places such as Rome, they are customarily sprinkled over each person's head. In the ancient Dominican Rite as well as in the modern Roman Rite, clergy receive ashes over the crown of their head in the sign of a cross. (Fr. McNamara reports that the tradition of the smeared cross appears to have started as a practice specifically for women in the middle ages, whose heads would have been veiled during Mass.)

This Ash Wednesday (February 17), given the situation of the worldwide pandemic, the Congregation for Divine Worship has noted that everyone is to receive ashes in the same manner. The practice will be at once traditional and innovative: "[the Priest] addresses all those present and only once says the formula ... 'Repent, and believe in the Gospel' or 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.' The Priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. The priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything."<sup>3</sup>
