FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



The following article, published on thecatholictelegraph.com, is the first in a series of articles covering each of the six foundational principles of Beacons of Light, the pastoral planning process of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. At a time when Mass participation is declining nationally and some Catholics don't even believe in Christ's real presence in the Eucharist, Jeremy

Helmes, director of the Office of Divine Worship and Sacraments at the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, offers eight goals to help parishes ensure that the Eucharist is the heart and center of parish family life. I encourage you to read the article and strive to achieve these goals together.

BEACONS OF LIGHT:

FOUNDATIONAL PRINCIPLES - #1: EUCHARIST

The Eucharist makes the Church. This simple statement is at the heart of what it means to be a member of the Catholic Church, the community of the baptized who gather each Sunday to do what Jesus commanded: Participate in His Sacrifice on the Cross, sharing a sacred meal — His body and blood — together in His memory.

It's no surprise, then, that Archbishop Dennis Schnurr established "Eucharist" as Beacons of Light's first principle with these words:

"The Mass is the source and summit of the whole Christian life. Accordingly, the Eucharist is the essential moment for building up and strengthening the parish community, along with the sacraments and other celebrations of the paschal mystery – the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ."

Yet, we are experiencing a Eucharistic crisis. Consistent Mass participation is declining nationally, with a sharp drop in attendance locally for the past decade. We anticipate our churches continuing to fill as the pandemic wanes, but attendance to-date remains far below even two years ago.

Perhaps it is partly because parish liturgical life isn't what it should be. The U.S. Bishops teach: "Good celebrations foster and nourish faith. Poor celebrations may weaken and destroy it." This includes diminishment of the Eucharist's importance in our lives — some Catholics even lack belief in Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist.

When parishes shape their new Family and plan a vibrant future together, the Eucharist's centrality must be upheld. The following goals help parish Families design effective plans that ensure the Eucharist has primary importance.

- The Sunday Eucharist is life-giving, beautiful, and transformative: When gathered for Mass, especially on Sundays, we are changed to be more fully like God. We experience God's love through the sacraments and He nourishes us for mission so that we can be more faithful disciples and witnesses to the Gospel.
- Christ's Presence is felt: Sacramental celebrations and other liturgies are unique, privileged and true encounters with Jesus Christ, who is present in Word and Sacrament.
- Unity is lived: As the sacrament of unity (1 Cor. 10:17), Eucharistic celebration is an opportunity for Family parish members to worship

- together, honoring and celebrating each one's cultural traditions, particularly special feast days.
- Formation is essential: Catechize (teach and make real) the faithful's understanding of what they celebrate in the liturgy and how to celebrate it well.
- Ars Celebrandi is faithful and participatory: Grant importance
 and attention to the "art of celebrating" the liturgy, such that the
 faithful's full, conscious and active participation are kindled and
 drawn more fully into the mystery of Christ through well-prepared
 preaching and music, fidelity to the texts and rubrics and the
 prayerful understanding of liturgical texts, feasts and seasons.
- Ministers are formed: Priests, deacons and lay liturgical ministers should be well-trained and formed for pastoral leadership of prayer communities and imbued with the spirit of the liturgy.
- Sacred Space leads to God: Churches, chapels and other sacred buildings are houses of the Church and houses of God: they should be "truly worthy and beautiful, signs and symbols of heavenly realities."
- Adoration is encouraged: Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, and catechesis regarding this holy practice, are readily available to prolong the Eucharistic Presence of Christ we experience at Mass and to adore Him as a community, even outside of Mass.

As we, together, plan our future in Families of Parishes, the primacy of the Eucharist comes to fruition through the prayer and hard work of both parish leaders and all the faithful. There may be difficult adjustments: changes to Mass schedules, new musical repertoires, new needs for liturgical ministers, and more. Through all of these efforts, we are called to uphold the Eucharist as the heart and center of parish Family life.

I recall that I have received most light during adoration which I made lying prostrate before the Blessed Sacrament for half an hour every day throughout Lent. During that time I came to know myself and God more profoundly. And yet, even though I had the superior's permission to do so, I encountered many obstacles to

praying in such a way. Let the soul be aware that, in order to pray and persevere in prayer, one must arm oneself with patience and cope bravely with exterior and interior difficulties. The interior difficulties are discouragement, dryness, heaviness of spirit and temptations. The exterior difficulties are human respect and time; one must observe the time set apart for prayer. A RICH SPIRITUAL TREASURY

Sister Karol Marie Zachmann, O.P., is one of St. Gertrude School's fourth grade teachers. She specializes in the subjects of math and religion, and received a Master of Arts in Thomistic Studies from the Pontifical Faculty of the Immaculate Conception at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, D.C., in the fall of 2021.

St. Gertrude Bulletin recently chatted with Sister Karol Marie about what it has been like teaching at SGS—she served here in 2009-2011 and then again from 2020-present—and what it is that makes the school a special place.

St. Gertrude Bulletin: What have you enjoyed most about teaching at St. Gertrude School?

Sister Karol Marie: I love teaching in a Dominican school with the presence of the friars and brothers and the opportunity given to me by such faith-filled parents and families to support them in the formation of their children. It is a privilege to serve here at a school with an academically rigorous curriculum and where students are formed in the Dominican tradition with an emphasis on virtue, freedom, happiness, and Truth!

SGB: What makes SGS a special place?

SKM: One of the things that sets St. Gertrude School apart is not only the presence and witness of consecrated men and women religious who have given their lives to God and his Church, but also the spiritual patrimony and heritage that denotes. The fruits of the sacrifices of consecrated religious being present in the parish for nearly 100 years (and almost just as long in the school) provides a

rich spiritual treasury—something intangible that can't be quantified yet real nonetheless. That, with the rich sacramental life and Christ at the center of the school—literally, being present in the chapel located in the heart of the school— makes St. Gertrude not just a "special" Catholic school but one with supernatural riches available to all students it seeks to form as Christian disciples.

CGS HAS CHANGED OUR LIFE

EMILY HESS, CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD CATECHIST

"Be still and know that I am God" (Ps 46:10) is a verse that we sing frequently here at St. Gertrude Church during Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS). This small verse deeply captures my experience as a catechist and as a mother working with children in CGS.

I have four children ranging from nine months to six years old. While life can feel crazy and hectic at times, CGS has helped me to slow down and reflect on things that truly matter. Simply put, CGS has helped me to discover Jesus—to discover Jesus within my own heart and in the hearts of my children. I continue to stand in awe at the capacity children have to personally encounter Jesus and come to know him deeply in their own hearts.

When I tell my friends about CGS, I tell them it is truly an education in humanity. CGS has helped me to discover more fully what it means to be human—our innate desire for God and our unique personal relationship with him. As I discover this more and more for myself personally, the more I am aware of this in each child I encounter in the atrium. "Young children have a natural ability to enjoy their relationship with God in a very deep way. . . . How important this is to realize. If we can enjoy the presence of God in our life, then our faith is established on the only sure foundation. If children are helped to enjoy God, they really have a strong foundation for their religious life" (Sofia Cavalletti, *Joyful Journey*, pp. 12-13).

Why do I do CGS? Because I noticed a difference in everything once I began working in the atrium: I was different, my family was different, and my children were different. I noticed a deep and beautiful relationship with God stirring in my own heart and the heart

of each of my children. It was nothing I had done as a mother or as a catechist; rather, it was God working and dialoguing with my children through their time spent working in the atrium.

Everything we do in CGS is deeply rooted in sacred Scripture and the liturgy. All is about Christ, and all we do helps to lead us back to him. In CGS, we meet in a room called the "atrium." I love this name because it refers to the entrance of the Church building, which is also called



the "atrium." The CGS atrium, therefore, is the entryway into the life of the Church for the child; everything we discover and learn about in our CGS atrium leads us more deeply into the life of the Church.

The atrium has changed the way we live as a family in our own home. My children are very aware of the liturgical year and are filled with such joy as we celebrate the different seasons and feast days within the Church calendar. They are fascinated with the liturgy because of what and how they learn about the liturgy in CGS. They can't wait to get to Mass to see what color the priest will be wearing. They beg me to sit in the front row so they can watch the priest set the altar. My two-year-old has recently started whispering, "I love you Jesus" as he sees the priest elevate the body and blood of Christ. As I am sitting here writing this, my four-year-old is singing to my ninemonth-old a song she learned from CGS about the Annunciation: "The angel came from heaven, his name was Gabriel, and he came to tell Mary she would have a baby named Jesus."

The life of the Church is lived in a very tangible and relatable way within my home because of our experience in CGS. The awareness of Christ's presence is living and active and shines through my children. I am so grateful for the gift of CGS and how it has helped us to have a continual awareness of Christ's presence in our day-to-day life. As I observe children in the atrium and within my own home, I am constantly reminded that God is here now in the present moment, speaking softly to me through the gaze of my children, "Be still and know that I am God."

ASK A PRIEST: THE PRESENCE OF GOD IN THE SACRAMENTS

FATHER JORDAN KELLY, O.P.

Today's Ask a Priest column is devoted to our parish Lenten Speaker Series. This 4-week series on the Presence of God will take place on Thursday, March

10, 17, 24, and 31 at 7 p.m. in the St. Gertrude School cafeteria. We hope you can bring a friend or family member!

Our third speaker is Father Jordan Kelly, O.P., who will be talking about the Presence of God in the Sacraments. Here is a short preview of his presentation. Q: On Thursday, March 24, you will speak to us about the Presence of God in the Sacraments. I bring my family to Mass on Sundays and my children have received Baptism, first Communion, etc., but I'm no expert in theology. Will your talk be good for me to hear?"

A: This talk will be great for you to hear! To understand more about the presence of God in the sacraments, you don't need to be an expert in theology—you just need to be willing to allow God to move your heart and soul into deeper union with him. It's wonderful that you bring your family to Mass on Sundays and that you are attentive to their sacramental preparation, but God longs to give us so much more in life!

In this talk, you will learn more about why Sunday Mass is not only required by the Commandments but also essential to having a vibrant, alive, and mystical union with the Trinity and the communion of saints. You will learn why being prepared for the sacraments of Baptism,

Eucharist, Reconciliation, and Confirmation is both the beginning, as well as the way, to encounter Christ in every circumstance of our lives. In this talk, you will also learn about the importance of the sacraments in family life today.

You might want to ask me, "Father, why are the sacraments important in the life of my family? Can the sacraments help?" First, yes! Knowing the presence of God in the sacraments will help your family life. Why? The sacraments will be of the greatest assistance in family life because sacraments affect what they signify. In other words, the graces of each of the sacraments change our hearts to encounter Christ and his presence in every person. The pulls and tugs of family life can be healed through the graces of the sacrament of Reconciliation and strengthened and united by the graces of the Eucharist. The family is preserved through the transforming graces of the sacrament of Matrimony, as husband and wife vow to Almighty God and to one another the great mission of fidelity, forgiveness, and unity all the days of their lives. And because sharing in the sacraments of the Church always deepen the unity of those who have received the sacraments, the sacramental presence of God will deepen and perfect the unity of family life.


