

SOMETHING NEW THIS YEAR ON HOLY SATURDAY MORNING

I have vivid memories as a child going with my family to the parish church on Holy Saturday for something we simply referred to as the "blessing of the Easter baskets." It is something that is quite common in the Polish and Eastern European tradition (my mom's

side of the family is full-blood Polish) but has grown in popularity in more recent decades to Catholics of all ethnic backgrounds. It is a custom that, from asking around, it seems has never been done here at St. Gertrude—or at the very least, not in recent decades. I believe it is a beautiful custom, so, beginning this year, I plan on instituting it here. I know Holy Saturday is still a couple of weeks away, but I wanted to let people know in advance so that those who are interested in participating have time to dig up a basket from somewhere and plan out what you would like to bring to be blessed.

What is the Blessing of Easter Baskets?

Very simply, individuals and families are invited to put together a basket containing various food items that you will be serving at your Easter meal and then bring that basket of food to the church to be blessed by a priest. In my family's Polish tradition, we would typically include things like hard boiled eggs (whether dyed by the children or white), bread, butter (sometimes in the shape of a lamb), perhaps some Polish sausage or ham, maybe some horseradish, etc. But I could see where people from other culinary backgrounds might have baskets that look very different. If your Easter meal is a big Italian feast, I could see a basket of things like pasta noodles, fresh tomatoes, and blocks of Parmigiano Reggiano cheese. Fruits or candies that would be part of dessert would also work well. I recently spoke to a family that told me one of their customs is to include in the basket (in addition to their food items) their "Easter candles" that they will light in their home to celebrate Easter—which I thought was a wonderful idea!



Why bless Easter baskets?

The act of bringing food to the church to be blessed helps us to recall that all of the food we have is ultimately a gift from God. It is a recognition that the bounty of the earth is a gift from our Creator. It also acknowledges that there is something holy and sacred about gathering together for a meal on this holiest of all days. Finally, since most families will not have a priest present at their Easter table to say grace and bless their food, this is one way by which that "priestly blessing" is made present to families on Easter.

I'm excited! When will this be happening?

This year, we will bless Easter baskets at 8:45 a.m. on Holy Saturday. Just before that, from 8 to 8:30 a.m, the Dominican community will be praying the Office of Readings & Morning Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours in the church, to which everyone in the parish is invited to come and join in. After those prayers conclude, there will be a brief pause, during which those with Easter baskets will be invited to come forward and place the baskets in the sanctuary in front of the altar. (If you are coming for the prayers with the Dominicans beforehand, please keep your baskets with you in your pew until after the Liturgy of the Hours has concluded and families are invited to bring forward their baskets.) The brief pause will also allow the celebrant to vest and prepare for the blessing. The blessing ceremony itself will start at 8:45 a.m. and last less than 15 minutes.

This custom is near and dear to my heart. It is my hope that many in our parish will find it a meaningful and moving addition to your celebration of Easter this year and beyond.

(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: ENTER IN

WALTER PLUMMER, COORDINATOR OF YOUTH FORMATION

When I was in college, I was blessed to be able to attend RCIA with my dad. At the session, our pastor, Father Neil, led us through a reflection on the same Gospel we hear this Sunday—the raising of Lazarus. Like any good pastor, Father Neil had the Father's heart for


his people. He wanted to see his spiritual sons and daughters come close to Jesus, to be with him, to be like him. So he invited us to enter into that story with our hearts and minds and personally encounter Jesus.

Maybe it's because I'm a child of the feelings-driven culture of the 1990s and early 2000s, but I'm always a little leery about "entering into the story" and "seeing what it feels like." That imagination stuff somehow feels too . . . touchy-feely. The heroes of my adolescence and young adulthood are men like Pope Saint John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI, C.S. Lewis, Dr. Peter Kreeft, Jason Evert, and Chris Stefanick, whose cleareyed and not-so-warm-and-fuzzy reiterations of the Gospel message are a cool breeze in the self-enclosed "do-what-feels-right-to-you" culture. The anchor-less feeling soup of a me-centered culture needs something it can't find on its own: a firm foundation and a destination. My life and yours need a real stake in the ground of something bigger than just our appetites and preferences. Life needs purpose, a destiny that is beyond us, because none of us actually created ourselves, which means that none of us has sole ownership of where we're headed. Rather, we have been dropped in mid-story, and a good life is one lived in right response to reality, not in fitting reality to ourselves. It is only in knowing where we are from and where we are going that we can truly find where we've been and find ourselves today. So entering the Lazarus story to "personally feel" the love of Jesus Christ just seemed . . . off. But (as you are probably already anticipating because y'all are holier than me), entering into the stories of the Gospels is anything but a self-centered experience. Being confronted with the presence of the incarnate Son of God has a funny way of drawing us out of ourselves. As C.S. Lewis puts it in his book Miracles, "An 'impersonal God'—well and good. A subjective God of beauty, truth and goodness, inside our own heads-better still. A formless life-force surging through us, a vast power which we can tap—best of all. But God himself, alive, pulling at the other end of the cord, perhaps approaching at an infinite speed, the hunter, King, husband—that is quite another matter."

As we sat and entered into the mystery of Christ's life in the story of Lazarus, I didn't get to "Walter-ize" Jesus - he "Jesus-ized" me. I knew that call, that hunt, that pursuit from Jesus the Bridegroom in my own mind, in my own heart. I knew him and knew that he had told me all that I had ever done, all my desires and fears and gifts and brokenness. I knew that he knew me and looked at me with love, like the rich young man who came to him seeking eternal life. He had entered into my story as I entered into his. And then he said, "Untie him, and let him go." He had entered

my feeling-soup, and in those words, invited me to remember where I am going. He knew how I felt and what I wanted most. And without losing those desires, he invited me into my destiny. The clear-eyed truth was united to love in his invitation to come, follow him, to remain in him, to know the Father and to know the Son, for this in itself is eternal life. Through him, with him, and in him, I had been invited to come and share in my master's joy—which meant to share in his work. To get his life, his light, his mercy, his peace, his freedom, his very self into my bones, into the very squishy, soupy middle of who I am and join him in his mission. To participate in his destination and so to find mine. Raised up with Lazarus, I heard clearly that my life's work is to join my Lord in untying the ties of the tomb, those falsehoods, wounds, and vices that hold us back from the fullness of life that he offers. And the reason I'm telling you this is because I think it's your work, too, because he's my God and your God, my Father

The Father's heart is made known to us in his Son (cf. CCC 516) so that we might be with him as he is (cf 1 John 3:2). He wants us to be with him. To be like him. To enter into his heart always means to meet Jesus personally. Today, I think you and I need to do that again. (We might need to do this tomorrow as well. And maybe the next day, too.) Spend some time with the Gospel story. Enter into the mystery of his life and let him into yours. And then let him invite you on mission. Share in his joy, not just in your head but in your very bones. Go to confession this week. Go to Mass. And set the captives free.

ASK A PRIEST— CATECHUMENS AND CANDIDATES

FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P.

Q: What is the difference between a catechumen and a candidate?

A: Lately it's been great to see St. Gertrude Church welcoming so many new people into the parish, often entire families! Among these, to my special delight, have

been individuals and families who are seeking to learn about Jesus Christ and the Catholic faith and who are coming from different faith backgrounds and/or Christian communities.

Our **Become Catholic program** has been a helpful "landing pad" for many such people, in addition to attendance at our parish Masses and events. Further, the **RCIA/RCIC** component (i.e. Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults/Rite of Christian Initiation for Children) of the Become Catholic program becomes very visible this time of year, with minor exorcisms and special blessings for

"catechumens" and "candidates" at select Sunday Masses. Starting with Holy Week through Easter Sunday, the Become Catholic participants will be very visible at our main parish liturgies.

Catechumens are unbaptized people who have been recognized at a Rite of Acceptance as desiring the faith of the Church. They are more or less slated to receive Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Communion at the upcoming Easter Vigil. They include children beyond age seven through adulthood. The Church takes special care to give them the time and space to ask questions and learn about being a member of the Catholic Church. St. Gertrude Church provides instruction in Catholic doctrine, the Christian moral life, the sacraments, and prayer for catechumens through Become Catholic, whether they are little children, teenagers, or adults. Become Catholic is more than just a

class, and priests and parishioners act as catechists and mentors in the Catholic life. Formation continues even after Easter with a 50-day period of spiritual formation (i.e. "Mystagogy") and incorporation into parish life.

Candidates are fellow Christians who desire full communion with the Catholic Church and the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Communion. Although people in this situation can be received into the Catholic Church throughout the year, we usually designate a special Mass for their reception and sacraments on Easter Sunday (this year, the 12 p.m. Mass). The Become Catholic program usually includes some fellow Christians who have decided to seek full, visible communion with the Catholic Church. A third group we frequently

include in formation as well as the rites of initiation are adults who were baptized Catholic once upon a time, but were prevented until now from receiving Confirmation and Holy Communion.

Finally, I should mention *inquirers*, or those who join us for Mass and Become Catholic formation without having yet made a firm commitment to pursue the sacraments. It's been marvelous to see individuals and families come into our parish at various points during the year and then decide to seek out some advice and formation through the Become Catholic program.

- 1 In our Roman Catholic tradition, unbaptized "infants" (from birth until age 7) are eligible for an abbreviated process, namely, infant Baptism. They receive Confirmation and Holy Communion at the normal times with other Catholic children.
- 2 Our main group meets on Monday nights, September-late May/ early-June, in the Parish Center. Children receive special preparation through parish and school catechists and teachers.

<u>LENTEN REMINDERS -</u> FASTING & ABSTINENCE

According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.
