

BEACONS OF LIGHT:

FOUNDATIONAL PRINCIPLES - #2: EVANGELIZATION

"Let us be witnesses. Let us radiate Christ." With these words, Archbishop Schnurr challenged the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's Catholic faithful to embrace the call to make Christ present in the world.

In his apostolic exhortation *The Joy of the Gospel*, Pope Francis proposes a vision of the local parish as a "center of constant missionary outreach." The Beacons of Light pastoral planning process gives each parish an opportunity to embrace this vision.

What does it mean for a parish to be a center for missionary outreach? The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines "center" with multiple meanings. One is "a facility providing a place for a particular activity or service." We might visualize a healthy parish this way, imagining a church campus bustling with activity every day of the week; a one-stop location for all spiritual and communal needs. However, an evangelizing parish is much more than that.

This alternative definition is a better consideration: "A source from which something originates." Viewed through this lens, the Church, primarily in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, is the origin of missionary activity that radiates outward to all the world. Pope Benedict XVI uses nuclear fission to illustrate the connection between the Eucharist and mission, in that each time we receive the Body and Blood of our Lord, He sets off a transformation in us that cannot be contained, but radiates outward. It transforms the world around us as we become more empowered to be witnesses for the Gospel and heroically love our neighbors.

To truly radiate Christ to the world, Families of Parishes must first have missionary initiative toward each person in their parish boundaries. In his *Joy of the Gospel*, Pope Francis expresses great hope in the parish institution because of its potential to be flexible, adaptive and creative with evangelizing efforts. It must choose "a 'missionary option,' that is, a missionary impulse capable of transforming everything, so that the Church's customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channeled for the evangelization of today's world rather than for her self-preservation" (*Joy of the Gospel*, 27).

Beacons of Light affords precisely this opportunity for each Family of Parishes to "transform everything" by striving for these six goals:

- 1. **Missionary Discipleship:** The Family of Parishes will implement a simple and clear evangelization process that ultimately equips and commissions missionary disciples, in every stage of their lives, for personal apostolates and vocations.
- 2. **Grounded in Discernment:** The pastor, staff and lay leaders prioritize prayer, formation and discernment, both for themselves and the faithful, so that they allow the Holy Spirit to inspire and guide their evangelization efforts.
- 3. **Family Partnership:** Because the family is the primary place of evangelization for young people and parents are the primary educators of their children, families are well-supported by the parish.
- 4. **Prioritize Adult Formation:** Priority for forming the faithful in evangelization and catechesis is directed toward adults, who can share that knowledge with others and use it in forming their children's faith at home.
- 5. **Effective Schools:** As an essential parish ministry, the parish school fulfills its purpose to be an "effective vehicle of total Christian formation" for young people and their parents.
- 6. A **Culture of Vocation:** Families of Parishes will prepare individuals to discern and embrace their vocations by helping them recognize and respond to God's unique call for their lives.

By embracing these six goals, Families of Parishes will become vibrant centers for missionary outreach and true beacons of light.

EVANGELIZATION



(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: BY MARY BETH DICKERT "Taste and see the goodness of the Lord"

(Ps 34:9a).

God didn't have to make food taste good, but he did! A friend of mine often rejoiced over this fact when we were in

college. She loved distinguishing the particular herbs and spices in dishes, describing the textures and aromas on her plate, and creating colorful and nutritious meals for friends. There are extraordinary culinary possibilities for we human beings to enjoy!

The diet of animals—wild or domesticated—is a stark contrast by comparison. Our family dog eats the same bland food day after day with the addition of a couple raw carrots and a tiny scoop of peanut butter (to hide his medicine) in the evening. He will make sure you don't forget that peanut butter! The birds outside are content with seeds and berries. The lucky squirrel that found an apple slice I placed outside may have just enjoyed the sweetest food he'll have for months.

I wonder what it would have been like for the Israelites to finally eat "of the yield of the land of Canaan" after forty years of wandering in the desert, sustained by the manna, the mysterious (yet bland) "bread from heaven." How delighted those men, women, and children must have been when they savored a variety of foods that had been previously unimaginable!

God's people had *rejoiced* over his providential care when he at first gave them the gift of manna. As the years passed, however, they

grew exceedingly disgruntled by this "wretched food" (see Numbers 21:4-5). Can we see similarities in our own life of faith? At first we may be enamored by the goodness of the Lord and experience his presence in our life in tangible ways: powerful moments of prayer, inspirational retreats, joyful Christian friendships. Then? Years pass, life continues on, and . . . ? Have we become so accustomed to his grace that we have lost our spiritual "taste"? Have we forgotten his immense and unchanging love for us?

Or perhaps, like the younger son in today's Gospel passage, we have hardened our hearts to the loving presence of our Father. He had had "enough." He wanted to be on his own and seek fulfillment, but in ways that could never satisfy. What brought him back? His hunger: "here am I, dying from hunger. I shall get up and go to my father . . ." (Luke 15:17-18). He had reached a point of desperation.

Have we experienced a similar hunger? Have we reached the end of our own resources and capabilities and are looking for where to turn? Fasting during Lent allows us to experience a little hunger. This physical discipline ought to awaken our spiritual longing. We experience the reality of our limited human nature. It prompts us to recall what truly nourishes our soul. It reminds us, "man does not live on bread alone" (Mt 4:4).

Lent is an opportune time to return to the house of our Father. Let us turn back to him as we recognize our need. Let us go back to him, who alone can satisfy. He awaits us with a sacred feast.

ASK A PRIEST: THE PRESENCE OF GOD IN MORAL LIFE

FATHER JOHN CORBETT, O.P. Today's Ask a Priest column is devoted to our parish Lenten Speaker Series. This 4-week series on the Presence of God has taken place on Thursday, March 10, 17, 24, and will continue

on March 31 at 7 p.m. in the St. Gertrude School cafeteria. We hope you can come with a friend or family member! Our fourth and last speaker in the series is Father John Corbett, O.P., who will be talking about the Presence of God in Moral Life. Here is a short preview of his presentation.

Q: On Thursday, March 31, you will speak about the Presence of God in Moral Life. If I'm not especially "moral," how can God be in my life?

A: The question presupposes that God is "moral" by our standards. Actually, he isn't. When we say someone is moral, we usually mean one of two things. First, we mean that he or she keeps the rules or commandments. Second, we mean that he or she has the kind of character that leads to true happiness. Neither of these fully apply to God. God is the author of the commandments, so he isn't measured by them. Neither is he acting in a way that leads him to happiness, since he is already fully and completely happy. What we can say and without reservation is that God is good. Infinitely good.

We can be good, too. Why? How? Because there is a family resemblance between ourselves and God. We are made in his image and likeness. God is infinite intelligence, and our own minds share in this. He loves himself and everything he made. He calls us to do the same. God set himself a vocation to bring the whole creation to reflect his glory. And as his images, we get to share in this work as well. He does this through Christ—his only true image. Notwithstanding our moral challenges, God's promise stands, and we can share in his glory. If only we say "yes" to his offer.
