

ON FINE DINING AND THE SPIRITUAL LIFE

I found myself recently musing on how there is such a broad spectrum of restaurants in our culture. At one end of the spectrum, there are the "fast food" chains—quick, simple, low on atmosphere but cheap and convenient when in a hurry. At the other end

of the spectrum, there are places that offer the experience we generally refer to as "fine dining." Having a meal at this sort of restaurant is radically different from stopping for a burger at McDonald's. And while it is true that the quality of the food at a fine dining establishment is typically much higher than a fast food joint, the difference in the dining experience encompasses so much more than just the food.

What are some of these differences? Well, I suspect that for most of us, going out to a really nice restaurant is something we plan in advance. We likely make reservations so we will know a table will be ready for us and are certain to keep our schedule free of any other events that evening. If eating out is a relatively uncommon event, we might experience growing excitement in the days leading up to the "big night." When the day comes, we dress up in extra nice clothes. Upon arriving, there's no "rush" to order and eat quickly like at a fast food place. We might begin by ordering drinks while looking

over the menu. Perhaps order appetizers. Likely, our main meal will be preceded by salads and/or soups, and of course the ubiquitous basket of bread or fancy dinner rolls. We likely take advantage of the time between courses to



engage in intentional conversation with the person (or people) we are with. We look around and soak in the ambiance of the room . . . the decorations on the walls, the centerpieces on the tables, the carpeted floors, perhaps the majestic views out the windows. There might be beautiful classical music (softly) playing in the background. The restaurant staff is likely much more nicely dressed than what is found among fast food workers. When the main course arrives we might "ooh" and "ahh" at each other's selections, making comments about the intricacies of the presentation, seasoning, and so forth. And after the meal is over, lingering even longer over coffee and dessert is often the capstone of the evening's meal.

So why, in a bulletin letter, would I spend so much time describing the difference between these two restaurant experiences? Because, I think there are a lot of parallels to be found in how we experience attending Mass. I'm convinced that, at least in many parishes throughout the country, many Catholics who regularly attend Sunday Mass do so in more of a "fast food" mindset. The goal is to get in and out as quickly as possible. There might be minimal

focus on taking in the "ambiance" of the Mass, perhaps not much intentional conversation (with God, i.e. prayer), and not much effort or desire to arrive early or linger afterwards. Are these people fulfilling their Sunday obligation? Yes, they are. But I suspect that the "fast food" attendees rarely experience Mass in such a way that it makes a significant impact in the rest of their lives.

But there are others who experience Sunday Mass more along the lines of fine dining. It is the calendar item that has the highest priority on their schedules. They look forward to it for days in advance. They dress up extra nicely. They show up early to spend time before Mass in prayer, or perhaps reading the readings ahead of time (the "appetizer.") They intentionally focus on every detail of the Mass while it's happening and actively "pray through" the entire Mass as one big, intentional conversation with God. Rather than rushing out as soon as Mass is over, they remain behind for some time (even if only a couple of minutes) to pray a prayer of thanksgiving (the "dessert") for the sacred banquet in which they have just participated. In short, they invest themselves in every aspect of this beautiful gift known as the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

And as for most of us? I suspect that for most of us, most of the time, we are somewhere in between. Lots of factors (some within our control, others often out of our control) can impact our ability to arrive early, focus while we are there, or spend time in prayer afterward. Often, we might desperately wish to do these things, but "life circumstances" (sometimes known as "toddlers" haha) currently make them a near impossibility. If that describes you, that's okay. Relax. God sees your heart, and he knows all.

To whatever degree it is possible this Lent, may all of us focus and try to make our experience of Sunday Mass a little closer to the experience of fine dining. The price of admission is free, and the benefits are out of this world.

In today's secular world, it's critical for girls to have examples of Catholic women who beautifully live their faith in all walks of life.

SGB: What do you enjoy most about leading the St. Anne Guild? **Ann:** I love the energy and enthusiasm the girls bring to each meeting. They are a joy to be with. We have a fantastic group that really has fun both socializing and working together.

Ann: My family and I love to camp and travel. I enjoy time outside and like to walk and garden, but I also love to curl up with a good book.






St. Anne's Guild


LADIES OF CHARITY CEREMONY & LUNCHEON

ASK A PRIEST—THE "PURGATORY" OF THE PRESENT MOMENT

Q: This year, I had the sense that God was asking me to do something very specific for Lent. However, now I feel depressed as to how grumpy and disheveled I get when I give up certain comforts and commit to

other, higher things. Do you have any spiritual advice for this?

A: It sounds like you're facing purgatory—but here and now! You have my sympathy. At the very least, you should know that what you describe suggests to me that you're doing something right. And why do I say that? Because Lent is a kind of "purgatory"—a period of purification—from all that which distracts us from God and the promise of eternal life with God.¹ Scripture tells us that this process, even if painful in the moment, turns out to be a great blessing: God's beloved sons and daughters are purified in the course of their trials like precious metal is purified by intense temperatures.



During Lent, we respond to Christ who tells us, "Repent and believe in the Gospel" (Mark 1:15) and the Church which vividly reminds us on Ash Wednesday, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" (Gen 3:19). So our Lenten practices keep the reality of sin, mortality, repentance, and faith in eternal life keenly before our eyes. During this time, we train ourselves to embrace the "purgatory" of the present moment so that selfish ways are "melted away" and our hearts better reflect the "shimmer" of God's love.

Specifically, the practice of fasting—hunger pangs and all—becomes a bodily expression of prayer's desire for a deeper, purer love. When fasting, we can learn to pray like this:

"One does not live on bread alone, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God" (Jesus in Matthew 4:4; see also Deuteronomy 8:3).

And like this:

"My food is to do the will of the one who sent me and to finish his work" (Jesus in John 4:34).

And like this:

"O Lord, it is you who are my portion and my cup; it is you yourself who are my prize" (Psalm 16:5).

So don't be distraught when fasting and other Lenten disciplines show you your limits, both physical and spiritual. In these moments, Jesus teaches us to rely on God's love and care for us. God will provide! Most of all, this experience teaches us that our physical strength and good psychological and moral dispositions all rely on God's mercy, building upon the normal and healthy ways in which we take care of ourselves. Ultimately, solely human efforts pale. Someday, each of us will "return to dust." However, we have come face-to-face with the Son of Man who is also the Son of God. By his grace, he has made even temptation and suffering profitable.

<u>LENTEN REMINDERS -</u> FASTING & ABSTINENCE

According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.
