REINSTATEMENT OF THE SUNDAY OBLIGATION AND A WALK TO REMEMBER

The Bishops of Ohio have decided that the general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (including the

Saturday/Vigil Mass) is to be reinstated (CIC, can. 1247). This will take effect in each of the Dioceses of Ohio the weekend of June 5-6, 2021. As has always been the case, those who have a serious reason are exempt from attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2181). This includes those who are ill, have significant health risk factors or care for someone who is immuno-compromised or ill, as well as those who have significant fear or anxiety of contracting the Coronavirus in a large group of persons. Nevertheless, these persons should observe the Lord's Day (CIC, can. 1247) and are encouraged to spend time in prayer on Sunday, meditating on the Lord's Passion, death and Resurrection; an appropriate way to do this is through viewing a broadcast of the Sunday Mass. Masses that are broadcast through various media are not intended as a substitute nor do they fulfill the obligation for the persons who are able to gather for a Sunday celebration and other Holy Days of Obligation. Instead, they are intended for the sick, homebound, the imprisoned, etc., who are unable to attend Mass in person. Kindly consult your pastor with any specific questions regarding the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.

The book of Exodus reminds us to keep holy the Sabbath day (Exodus 20: 8-10). As Catholics, we are invited by God to gather together in community, and participate fully in the Sunday Eucharist, which is the "source and summit of the Christian life." "Participation in the communal celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is a testimony of belonging and of being faithful to Christ and to his Church. The faithful give witness by this to their communion in faith and charity. Together they testify to God's holiness and their hope of salvation. They strengthen one another under the guidance of the Holy Spirit" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2182).

The obligation to attend Mass on Sunday and Holy Days is not something God asks of us out of His own necessity to be worshipped, but rather a gift to the faithful for their spiritual well-being, eternal salvation and formation in our relationship with God and one another. To that end, Saint John Vianney rightly asserts, "There is nothing so great as the Eucharist. If God had something more precious, He would have given it to us." The Eucharist is the greatest gift Christ left to the Church—the gift of Himself. There is no substitute for Mass celebrated in person. As you may recall, in 2019 a decision was made to discontinue the annual St. Gertrude Parish Festival. The decision was not an easy one; the Festival had been a part of our parish community for many years. It brought together parishioners and citizens of the wider community for fun and friendship while simultaneously providing vital financial support to the parish and school.

With the desire to retain the social and communal aspects of parish life, the Pastoral Council has determined to transition from one annual event, the Festival, to several smaller fundraising activities throughout the year. The original plan was to have a final Parish Festival in 2020, but COVID-19 restrictions made it unachievable. As the number of cases of COVID-19 continue to drop and the state-mandated restrictions are lifted, we are moving forward with our transition by renewing some of the favorite activities of the Festival – especially those with an emphasis on bringing people together and building community.

I have asked Pete and Donna Marcello, parishioners since 2011, to lead a new fundraising committee. They will be working with parishioners to bring about the smaller fundraising activities. I am pleased to announce the first of these activities will be a "*Walk to Remember*," on Saturday, June 19, 2021. Details are found elsewhere in this bulletin.

Yes, it will have a likeness to a "*Run to Remember*," the 5K race which was held on the Saturday morning of a Festival weekend. Instead of running, we will be walking to involve a greater number of people. Please save the date. After the past year, this will be a wonderful way for us to rally together as a parish and as a community; and to remember our departed loved ones. I hope you will consider joining us for the first of several events planned for this year.

(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: GREASY

I must have been 18 years old. It was late and the Wendy's dining room had just closed. I approached my car, a white 1991 Mercury Topaz that I had

purchased for \$900.00.

As I reached my car, my buddy Luke, who was a good 50 feet behind me, yelled, "Hey Bursa! Catch!" He hurled one of those Wendy's sandwiches toward me – you know, one of those beastly sandwiches that has a ferocious name that makes it sound like it's going to eat you. This memory only exists in slow motion. The sandwich soared into the night sky, its silver foil glistening in the golden hue of the parking lot floodlight. The somersaulting sandwich began to shed its wrapper as it descended. By the time it reached me, it was practically naked. The burger rocketed off my chest and exploded on my car's back glass.

I must say a few words about this beloved vehicle. It came with a broomstick, because the trunk would smash against your head otherwise. The heat and A/C no longer worked, but luckily the windows could still be manually rolled down. This conveniently allowed one to stick his head out the window in the freezing cold or in the rain, because the windshield would not defrost. The car's stereo system had been completely overhauled with Naturally, everyone laughed until they were nearly crying and everyone, of course, let me know how terrible I was at catching hamburgers. Not once did anyone question why Luke threw the beef in the first place. That's teenage boys for you.

With one swoop of my arm, I wiped the burger's guts to the ground and drove away. A few days later, it rained. I distinctly remember looking in the rearview mirror and realizing that my whole back glass was repelling water with incredible proficiency. I never did pull out the Dawn to let the detergent do its work. It seemed like too much work. Eventually gravity must have pulled the grease onto the trunk and down the side of the car. So, I gave it to my sister and left for college.

I've always reflected on this experience as something of a parable about sin. Sin's like that thick greasy layer that prevents us from receiving that living water that Jesus promises us. Instead, sin repels it, it forces the water into little beads that quickly roll away. Sin breaks down and breaks apart our relationship with God. Plain and simple as that.

Today, on Pentecost Sunday, we hear this beautiful Gospel account of Jesus giving the Holy Spirit to the disciples (cf. Jn. 20:19-23). He comes to bring them peace, peace that the world cannot provide. So, He breathes on them, and gives them the Holy Spirit who, in turn, grants them the power to forgive sins. Here, Jesus establishes the Sacrament of Confession.

It's a weak analogy, but confession is like a deep clean for our

ASK A PRIEST - WHEN DO DISCIPLES RECEIVE THE HOLY SPIRIT?

Q: I always thought the Holy Spirit first descended on the disciples at Pentecost, after Jesus' Ascension.

However, the Gospel back on the Second Sunday of Easter has Jesus saying: "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." Can you help me understand this?

A: The Gospels reveal a profound truth about Jesus: whatever He does and says, He is never apart from the heavenly Father. Nor does He work outside of the love and power of the Holy Spirit whom He and the Father share. We receive an especially

clear picture of this in the account of Jesus' Baptism: the Father speaks from the cloud, "You are my beloved Son," while the Holy Spirit descends upon Christ in the form of a dove (see Mk 1:9-11). During His public ministry, the Lord maintained dialogue with His Father in prayer and performed signs through the Spirit (see Jn 3:34).

The Gospel according to John is emphatic about Jesus' unity with His Father and the Holy Spirit in all that He does. Indeed, the passage used at Mass on the Octave of Easter (Divine Mercy) depicts Jesus walking into the Upper Room on the evening of the Resurrection and saying to the disciples, "Peace be with you;" He then breathes upon the disciples the Holy Spirit and commissions them to forgive sins (In 20: 19-31). This same Gospel passage may be read on Pentecost Sunday. St. Thomas the Apostle was famously absent during this Resurrection appearance and it was one week later that Jesus came again among them to reinforce His Gift. We need not have doubts as to whether Thomas received his needed share of grace for the forgiveness of sins.

The Gospel according to Luke, especially attentive to chronology, also recounts

Christ's unique Resurrection gift of peace. However, the treasured promise of the Holy Spirit is explicitly given to the disciples later. Jesus explains the Passion, Resurrection, and commissioning of the apostles for preaching and forgiving sins. But He instructs His friends to wait for something more: "And behold I am sending the promise of my Father upon you; but stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high" (see Lk 24:46-53). The Acts of the Apostles, written by the same author, picks up with the disciples awaiting the Promised Holy Spirit. Pentecost signals a definite turning point: the Spirit who rested upon Jesus and worked through His public ministry now comes upon His followers in a great manifestation of power.

From the moment the Apostles met Jesus, they were also in contact with the Holy Spirit. "When the Father sends his Word, he always sends his Breath...To be sure, it is Christ who is seen,



the visible image of the invisible God, but it is the Spirit who reveals him."¹ The Catechism teaches here that the Son and the Spirit are "distinct but inseparable" in performing their missions in the world. As with the people of Israel, God gradually allowed His inner nature to be made known to the disciples.

It is good for us to appreciate the inner nature and ways of God, but we would be fooling ourselves if we tried to parse things out too neatly in our reading of the New Testament. Likewise, in our reception of the Sacraments such as Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist, all three Persons of the Trinity are active within us. This does not mean that one Person may not be more "recognizable," given the spiritual fruits of a particular encounter. Nevertheless, if we receive Jesus, we also discover the way to know His Father and we begin to experience more and more perfectly the love and power of the Holy Spirit in our lives.
