

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners, Christ is risen, Alleluia!

As we continue our journey through the Easter season, where we bask in the joy of the resurrection of our Savior and open our hearts to the newness of life that he came to bring, our parish is celebrating a bit of a "newness" of its own this weekend, as I arrive and begin my time as your pastor.

For those who may not have had the opportunity to watch the short introduction video that was posted on the parish website, let me take a few moments to share a bit about myself. I was raised in the suburbs of Chicago. I am a "science nerd" at heart, earning a B.S. in chemistry from the University of Illinois and an M.S. in chemistry and environmental engineering from Johns Hopkins University. I entered the Dominicans immediately after my graduate studies, professed my solemn vows in 2000, and was ordained a priest in 2002. I have been blessed to have experienced a variety of ministries during my 20 years of priesthood. I have worked in college campus ministry both at our own Providence College (PC) as well as at Johns Hopkins. I have taught theology at PC and served for a time as the director of Pastoral Formation at our Dominican House of Studies. I had the wonderful opportunity to spend a year of advanced studies in Rome at the Angelicum. Most recently, I served for over six years as pastor of our Dominican parish of St. Mary in New Haven, CT-the "mother church" of the Knights of Columbus, and the final resting place of Blessed Michael McGivney. I had the profound experience of being the pastor there when Father McGivney was beatified just over a year ago.

I've also worked with the pro-life movement in a variety of ways over my years, especially working with post-abortive women through Project Rachel and the Sisters of Life. I served for a time as a contract chaplain with the U.S. Army, celebrating Mass on a regular basis at several military installations, including the Pentagon. I've worked rather extensively with homeschooling families and, during my years in Baltimore, worked in a variety of ways with the Dominican Sisters of St. Cecilia at their high school, Mount de Sales Academy, just outside the city. I also have rather extensive experience in Catholic Young Adult (20s–30s) ministry and for the last four years have served as one of five members of our Dominican province's Vocations Council.

For those who have been in the parish here for a few decades, you might remember that I helped out at St. Gertrude Church during my "young dad" summer as a newly ordained priest in 2002. Among the highlights of that summer was accompanying a busload of our parish teenagers to World Youth Day in Toronto.

I can't tell you how excited I am to be here and how eager I am to get to know the parish and all of you. Our Gospel reading this weekend is a small portion of the rather long Good Shepherd discourse from the Gospel of John. The line of that discourse that resonates most with me (which, alas, was not in this week's reading) is where Jesus says, "A good shepherd lays down his life for his sheep" (Jn 10:11). The most important thing I can do for you all is to "lay down my life" for you every day. This is what I intend to do, to the best of my frail human abilities, every single day that I am here as your pastor. Please join me in praying that I receive the grace to do that well! I can't wait to see where the Holy Spirit leads us all over the months ahead.

(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: WHO AM I?

A few weeks ago, I was having a conversation with a coworker when she mentioned that her parents had been in town visiting for a while: "It's definitely crazy when they're here, but

there's also so much peace—they remind me of who I am."

They remind me of who I am. I mulled over her words for a few minutes. My dad and mom had *also* been in town for a while—but they weren't visiting. Last November, my parents sold their house in Illinois and moved in with my husband and me while they looked for a house in the Greater Cincinnati area. As I thought about the past six months with our new roommates (yes, they are still living with us*), I realized that my coworker was right: *they remind me of who I am*.

As a young child, I never doubted my parents' love for me or questioned my dignity as a human person. I was confident and outgoing, secure in the truth that I was their beloved daughter—and in turn, God's beloved daughter. But as I got older, I quickly forgot that I am loved not for the things that I do, my appearance, the amount of money I make, the house my husband and I live in, how smart I am, how fast I can run, or any other temporal thing on which society tends to base a person's worth and success. My parents' physical presence during the past six months has once again reminded me of who I am in their eyes and God's eyes. They have reminded me that I am loved simply because I am their daughter, created in the image and likeness of God (see Genesis 1:26–27). What an incredible gift.

This past Lent, our Blessed Mother also reminded me of who I am when I read the book *Mary's Mantle Consecration: A Spiritual Retreat for Heaven's Help*, by Christine Watkins. Inspired by an ancient tradition in Mexico called "El Manto de Maria," *Mary's Mantle Consecration* is a 46-day journey in preparation for consecration to the Blessed Mother—46 because that is the number of stars on the cloak (mantle) countenance, your heart be disturbed. Do not fear any sickness, nor anything that is sharp or hurtful. Am I not here, I, who am your Mother? Are you not under my shadow and protection? Am I not the source of your joy? Are you not in the hollow of my mantle, in the crossing of my arms? Do you need anything more?"

These are the consoling words that Our Lady of Guadalupe spoke to Juan Diego on December 12, 1531, the final time she appeared to him on Tepeyac Hill near Mexico City. Juan Diego's uncle, Juan Bernardino, had fallen ill the day before, preventing Juan Diego from going to meet Our Lady, as he had promised. On his way to get a priest to minister to his uncle, Juan Diego traveled a different route around Tepeyac Hill to avoid the Virgin Mary—but the Blessed Mother intercepted him. Juan Diego explained the situation, and Our Lady gently chided him for not making recourse to her. Mary assured Juan Diego that his uncle had recovered, and we all know the rest of the miraculous story.

The first morning I read our Blessed Mother's loving words, I was filled with peace and moved to tears, because I knew she wasn't just speaking them to Juan Diego; she had the same soothing message for me, her spiritual daughter, centuries later. As easily as I had forgotten who I was in my earthly parents' eyes and God's eyes, I had just as quickly forgotten who I was in Mary's eyes. But as I let our Blessed Mother's words sink into my soul over and over again for 46 days, I began every day with the knowledge that I was her daughter, under her protection, and wrapped in her maternal arms.

From time to time, we all need to be reminded of who we really are and that our Blessed Mother is always here. I encourage you to post Our Lady's words to Juan Diego in a spot where you will see them every day. For she's not just speaking these words to Juan Diego and to me—her message is meant for you, too.

of the miraculous image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Incorporating fasting and a daily reading and rosary, the consecration helps one strive "to live the virtues and to walk in the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit."

While the entire experience was lifechanging, one of the most powerful aspects of my 46-day consecration preparation was the last paragraph of the opening prayer, which I prayed each morning before diving into the day's reading on a virtue.

"Listen, put it into your heart, my dearest one, that the thing that disturbs you, the thing that afflicts you, is nothing. Do not let your

ASK A PRIEST – LITURGICAL PRACTICES WITH FATHER JORDAN KELLY, O.P.

St. Gertrude Bulletin recently visited with Father Jordan Kelly, O.P., regarding two liturgical questions. St. Gertrude Bulletin: Father Jordan, why is it important that the communicant responds "Amen" to the words, "the body of Christ"?

Father Jordan: The first reason is simple and clear: in the Novus Ordo Celebration of the Mass, both in the Roman Missal Third Edition, as well as in the Sacramentary of Pope St. Paul VI that preceded the Roman Missal, the practice of saying "Amen" is clearly indicated and called for. In the Roman Missal, we read in #134, "After this, he takes the paten or ciborium and approaches the communicants. The Priest raises a host slightly and shows it to each of the communicants, saying: "The Body of Christ.' The communicant replies: 'Amen,' and receives Holy Communion." Saying "Amen" is what the Church asks of us.

Our response, "Amen," is a profession of faith—our "I believe!"—to the priest's or other minister's words, "the body of Christ." At a time when so many Catholics doubt the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, our "Amen" creates a *habitus*, a virtuous habit, of grace and affirmation of the Divine Presence of Christ, body and blood, soul and divinity, under the forms of bread and wine.

As I was recently distributing Communion, I said, "The body of Christ," and I heard, "Yes, thank you." Figuratively, I stumbled! I have never heard that. I withdrew the host and said, "Your response is, 'Amen." It took a couple of tries, but finally the communicant said, "Amen."

SGB: Does a person respond, "Amen," when he or she receives Communion during the Traditional Latin Mass?

FJ: No, when you attend the Traditional Latin Mass, the communicant does not reply, "Amen." In the Extraordinary Form, the priest presents the Host while uttering a prayer for the communicant, saying (in Latin), "May the body of our Lord Jesus Christ preserve your soul unto everlasting life. Amen." Because the priest has ended the prayer with, "Amen," the communicant does not need to make a reply to the priest; he or she simply opens their mouth and extends their tongue to receive the Host.

These kinds of rubrical differences call us to be aware that we are quite literally in the presence of God, and Mass has its particular

expectations and responses. Such awareness is a deep form of "full, active, and conscious participation."

SGB: Thank you for explaining that, Father Jordan. Another question, unrelated to Communion but still regarding the liturgy: What should a boy do if he wants to be an altar boy?

FJ: That's a great question—we *need* more servers! I have seen pictures around the parish of an army of servers, and I would love to make that army of servers a reality again.

I am happy to tell you that training is on the way! Two of our dads will be helping me shepherd the servers and will begin providing training for the servers on a regular basis. There will be one training for seventh and eighth grade boys to be trained as head servers. Keep watching the bulletin and weekly Saturday Flocknote email for news about when this training will begin.

SGB: That's great, Father Jordan! Speaking of altar boys, why do they sometimes wear black cassocks; at other times red cassocks; and still other times red cassocks, a surplice, and a red cape? Does this have any meaning?

FJ: It does have meaning. Let's look:

- 1. A black cassock is the regular color of the customary dress of the diocesan clergy. In times past, the cassock would have been worn throughout the day while being in the rectory. The addition of the surplice over the black cassock was the sign that the priest was engaged in sacramental/liturgical ministry. Today, the cassock is part of the liturgical vesture of diocesan clergy. When Domincans are involved in sacramental/liturgical ministry and not the principal celebrant, a surplice is worn over our habits to indicate the same thing. Black is the color our servers wear during the regular times of the year and the times of preparation or penance (Sundays throughout the year, Advent, and Lent).
- 2. Red is worn by our servers during more solemn seasons, such as the Christmas and Easter seasons. The vestment tells us that there is something special, or celebratory, taking place. The addition of a cape is a distinction of both a particular role and/or a sign of distinction as a senior or head server.

No matter the vestments, we need to see a great number of new servers!
