A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S

Earlier this week (June 21 at 5:13 a.m. to be precise) our planet experienced what we, in the northern hemisphere, call the summer solstice (or more informally, as Shakespeare and others have called it, midsummer). It is the moment when the earth's north pole is at its

maximum tilt toward the sun. It is the day of peak sunlight; beginning after the solstice, the days start getting a little shorter and sunset comes a little more quickly. By all astronomical accounts, the summer solstice is indeed the exact midpoint of the season of summer. But it never *seems* like it is.

I remember being quite confused as a child, when my dad first explained to me what the term "summer solstice" meant. With June, July, and August being the months free from school, it always seemed like July represented midsummer, not June. From the standpoint of temperatures, the solstice seemed "off" as well. Where I grew up in Chicago, the average peak summer temperature occurs during the last days of July and early days of August—certainly not during the third week in June! (The same is true for Cincinnati as well, I believe.) Most children would not necessarily lose any sleep over this, but the nerdy, scientist-in-the-making young Father John Paul was quite perplexed by all of it! But, once I learned the reason *why*, it all made sense. And it teaches a lesson about our spiritual lives.

You see, while it is true that the days right around the summer solstice are the days when the sun's rays are most directly hitting our planet, and while that would presumably dictate that those days would correspond to the hottest temperatures, the reality is that the earth is a big planet. There is a lot of air, a lot of water, and a lot of dirt. And so it takes a good long while—more than a month—for the energy from all of that peak sunlight beating down on our planet to really heat things up to their peak temperatures. As an analogy, think about turning on an oven. If you put on the oven and set it to 400 degrees, it's sending max heat into that oven from the moment you turn it on. But it takes a while before the whole oven actually reaches the temperature of 400 degrees. There's a delay. The "effect" (having a 400 degree oven) is produced at some point after the cause (turning on the oven).

So why have I been rambling on about all this? Because in our spiritual lives, our faith lives, and our human lives, *the same reality is often true*. We see the effects of our choices only after a period of delay, not immediately. **Actions often take time to manifest their fruits.** This is where the Christian virtues of patience and perseverance are so necessary. If I'm not one who usually prays the rosary and I pick up a rosary one day to pray it, it's unlikely my entire spiritual life is going to be transformed instantly. But if I pray the rosary every day, seven days a week, week after week after week . . . it will change me. It will transform my life. If I'm a parent and I encourage my children

to seriously discern and ask God whether they might be called to a vocation as a priest or vowed religious, that invitation—depending upon the child—might not seem to have any effect in the moment. But perhaps years, even decades later, when the Lord is moving a certain way in their hearts, they will remember that invitation and it will finally bear its fruit.

There are limitless examples we could consider, across every spectrum of human life. Reaching out and saying a word of welcome the first time you see someone new show up at Sunday Mass (perhaps someone new to the area and "shopping around" for a parish) might not bring them back the very next Sunday, but weeks later, after they've looked at a half dozen churches, maybe your friendly greeting after Mass that one day is what made them decide to make St. Gertrude Church their new home.

While I'm not aware of the summer solstice appearing anywhere in the Bible, the lesson it teaches us is very biblical indeed. During the days and weeks ahead, I pray we all dedicate ourselves to making choices that will bear much fruit over the long term. God bless,

ASK A PRIEST— PROPHECY IN THE OLD AND NEW TESTAMENTS

FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P. Q: During Scripture study, I have frequently read that the prophets spoke for God to improve the behavior of the people of the Old Testament and not to foretell the future. Yet

in studying the New Testament, Jesus and St. Paul frequently mention that actions/teachings fulfill the words of the prophets. I am confused, this seems contradictory. Can you help me understand what I am missing?

A: Prophecy is a more expansive phenomenon than we popularly imagine. What do I mean? Prophecy is part of a class of supernatural gifts given by God for the benefit of his people. Specifically, it is a higher-than-human insight bestowed on certain people that will help God's people reach salvation. Prophecy as graced-insight (the gift of "a God's eye view") rather than merely a look into the future might help us see your question in a fresh way. Biblical prophecy always has to do with graced-insight; only sometimes does it yield clear premonitions of things to come.


Of course, it's impossible for a Christian to read certain passages of the Old Testament and *not* see Christ. Yet even here we can appreciate the difference between what was grasped by any human author and what was known only by the Holy Spirit who inspired that author. For example, we might look at the Fourth Servant Song in the prophet Isaiah (Isaiah 53:1-12):

- "He was spurned and avoided by men, a man of suffering, knowing pain, like one from whom you turn your face, spurned, and we held him in no esteem . . ."(Isaiah 53:3).
- "He was given a grave among the wicked, a burial place with evildoers, though he had done no wrong, nor was deceit found in his mouth . . ." (Isaiah 53:9).
- "By making his life as a reparation offering, he shall see his offspring, shall lengthen his days, and the Lord's will shall be accomplished through him" (Isaiah 53:10).

Naturally (or supernaturally, by faith), we see Jesus in this prophetic passage. But the original author of the passage did not necessarily receive a Mel Gibson-esque preview of Christ's Passion. This seems to be what Jesus means when he exclaims: "Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear and did not hear it" (Mt 13:17). Prophetic knowledge, however impressive, is not perfect knowledge (see 1 Cor 13). Maybe this is why Jesus explicitly says about the Fourth Servant Song:

 "For I tell you that this scripture must be fulfilled in me, namely, 'He was counted among the wicked;' and indeed what is written about me is coming to fulfillment" (Lk 22:37; cf. Isaiah 53:12)" Jesus calls the passage from Isaiah to mind just before he leaves the Upper Room to undergo the Passion. Through his teaching and suffering, he brings all Scripture together; various hints of God's salvific plan expressed in so many modes throughout the Old Testament come to full light in Jesus and the culmination of this plan. Hopefully something similar will be said for each of us; our "inspired" lives are not always comprehensible from the ground level where we live and struggle and suffer in faith. Yet, from God's perspective, our lives each possess a greater intelligibility that will only completely surface one day in the blessed vision of Jesus who died and rose for our sakes.


