A PROPHETIC VOICE, 55 YEARS LATER

It was 55 years ago this month that Pope Paul VI, in the midst of almost unprecedented media fanfare, issued his encyclical *Human Vitae*, on the topic of artificial birth control. In the weeks and months leading up to the release of the document, nearly every "expert" that was interviewed by

newspapers and TV news shows professed a virtual certainty that the pope's encyclical would reverse the constant teaching of the Church on the immorality of artificial birth control and give an official "green light" to Catholic couples who wished to avail themselves to such measures. Instead, the encyclical reaffirmed the traditional teaching of the Church. The outrage over this decision led to a firestorm of protests from both within and outside the Church and a level of dissent internally, the likes of which have rarely (if ever) been seen in the history of Catholicism.

That there would be protests was not a surprise to Pope Paul VI; he wrote toward the end of the encyclical, "It is to be anticipated that perhaps not everyone will easily accept this particular teaching. There is too much clamorous outcry against the voice of the Church, and this is intensified by modern means of communication. But it comes as no surprise to the Church that she, no less than her divine Founder, is destined to be a 'sign of contradiction.' (Lk 2:34). She does not, because of this, evade the duty imposed on her of proclaiming humbly but firmly the entire moral law, both natural and evangelical" (18).

Pope Paul VI was a prophet. Beyond the immorality of contraceptive acts in themselves and the impact on the individuals resorting to such means, he also predicted that widespread contraception would have a devastating impact on our culture as a whole. In Human Vitae he predicts that widespread use of artificial contraception would result in increased marital infidelity, an attitude (on the part of many men) to reduce women to nothing more than instruments for the satisfaction of their own desires, governments imposing contraception as a means of "resolving problems" affecting whole countries, and a general lowering of moral standards. Many people mocked Paul VI in 1968 for asserting such things. Over 50 years later, can anyone argue that **all four** of those predictions have not come to pass? Infidelity rates in marriage have increased dramatically, to the point that we have become so numb to infidelity that some couples readily accept it (or, even more shockingly, choose it) as a part of married life. The objectification of women (seen especially today in the explosion of internet pornography) is absolutely out of control. Over the last decades, the United Nations and many first-world nations (the United States most of all) have regularly linked food and economic aid to thirdworld countries with the demand that those countries impose the spread of contraceptives and even have conducted forced sterilization campaigns. And as for the general lowering of moral standards . . . simply look around. Those who are old enough to remember life in the 1950s versus life today can testify to how radically our society has lost its moral compass.

Were all of the present ills purely a result of birth control? Of course

not. But we would be fools to deny it was one of the contributing factors. The "contraceptive mentality," which widespread birth control fuels, damages our basic understanding of humanity. The most beautiful, most precious, most unique gift in the entire world is the gift of a new human life, a baby. Rather than viewing a baby as a gift of infinite worth and value, the contraceptive mentality sends a very different message: a baby, a new human life, is a burden, an imposition, a hardship. In short, instead of a gift, a new life is seen as an enemy—an enemy of my comfort, an enemy of my independence, an enemy of my plans for my life.

A society that sees babies as enemies is a society that has no future. Pope Paul VI saw that. May we wake up and see that too . . . before it is too late.

EVANGELIZATION



(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: THE KINGDOM OF GOD IS NOT A CHEESEBURGER

Burger King, the famous "home of the Whopper," recently fell from the number two fast-food burger chain, to number three. Apparently, years of settling for second place behind McDonald's was acceptable, but being

usurped by Wendy's and demoted to third caused an existential crisis in the C-suite. It was time to rebrand. According to the marketing firm in charge of helping Burger King reclaim its rightful spot as the proud second fiddle to McDonald's, the goal of the rebrand is to "make the brand feel less synthetic and artificial and more real, craveable, and tasty." Mmm, I'm hungry already! All for the low low cost of \$400 million dollars over two years, Burger King is betting that this new marketing campaign will return the company to its roots and increase sales by conjuring up nostalgia for a bygone era of carefree summer nights with juicy Whoppers, crispy fries, and ice cold Coke. Now I'm really hungry!

Time will tell if Burger King's strategy will work or not, but clearly marketing matters. The product you are selling could be the greatest thing since sliced bread, but it won't matter if people don't know about it. This is why it seems so strange that Jesus only reveals the meaning of his parables to the Twelve. The Good News that God sent his only begotten Son to save us from sin so that we might live with him forever is the most important message conceivable . . . so where's the \$400 million ad campaign?! The Apostles themselves are wondering this same thing in today's Gospel when they ask, "Why do you speak to them (the crowd) in parables?" The answer is that Jesus is not selling a product or trying to increase his second-quarter profits. The kingdom of God is not a cheeseburger; it is the free gift of grace for those willing to accept it. Jesus reveals the meaning of the parable to the Twelve not so that they become some sort of elite class of privileged intellectuals, but so that they might increase their faith in him and thus be equipped to go out into the world and make disciples of others.

It was not clever marketing and branding that led to the rise of Christianity in the early years of the Church. Rather, it was the passionate and authentic witness of disciples who had truly encountered the risen Jesus. Many people are familiar with the quote that has been dubiously attributed to St. Francis of Assisi to "preach the Gospel at all times. Use words when necessary." Sadly, this has led many people to think that they don't ever need to talk about their faith. Nothing could be further from the truth! The Apostles simply could not keep themselves from preaching the Good News of Christ. St. Paul speaks to this compulsion when he says, "Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel!" (1 Corinthians 9:16). By virtue of our Baptism, we are made partakers of this mission to make disciples and offered the grace to accomplish it. Evangelization, then, is not reserved to the clergy, or a particular group of especially zealous individuals; rather, it is the basic requirement for all Christians. Jesus is the sower of the seed, but we are called to participate in that work.

Here's my challenge (to myself included): Will you invite one person whom you know that is far from the Church in some manner to some event happening in our parish in the next month? This could be a group you're involved in (a Bible study, prayer group, Holy Hour, etc.), or a special event (Drinking with Dominicans, Parish Picnic, etc.). The goal is to simply extend the invitation to come and see what life is like as a follower of Jesus here at St. Gertrude. While there may be some who have "ears but do not hear" and "eyes but do not see," we nevertheless must make Christ known.

<u>ASK AN EXPERT -</u> AN OB/GYN'S PERSPECTIVE ON THE PROPOSED OHIO AMENDMENT

ANGELA BEALE MARTIN, MD, PARISHIONER IMPORTANT NOTE: This question covers the proposed amendment on abortion that is on the ballot for the November election,

which is different from the proposed amendment for the special election on August 8.

Q: What is important for Ohioans to know about The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety amendment that is on the ballot for the November election, and what is at stake for doctors?

A: A decade into my career as an OB/GYN, I still carry with me some of the most important advice I've ever been given: to live what you are passionate about—all the way out to your fingertips. I think of this advice as I help women through labor and emergency surgery, simply hold their hands during times of grief, care for mothers and their babies—and consider the serious implications of the proposed Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety amendment.

This extreme amendment to the Ohio Constitution is gravely concerning. It includes broad language that would take away the right of parents to be made aware when their child is undergoing an abortion and protects an abuser who facilitates an abortion for his under-age victim. It also includes language so vague that it could allow an unborn child to be killed throughout all nine months of pregnancy, right up to the moment of birth and well after the child has a heartbeat and can feel pain.

Second and third trimester abortions are often not discussed, but it's important to understand what they involve. Such procedures

can include injecting a vial of digoxin and potassium into a preborn baby's heart to make it stop beating or using sharp instruments to pull the baby out of the womb. These lateterm abortions are at odds with everything I've trained for, with every skill my fingertips perform daily.

All doctors take an oath to do no harm. As an OB/ GYN, my patient is not only the woman whose dignity I can see by meeting her eye-to-eye but also the unseen baby in her womb. That baby, too, is my patient. That baby has his or her own purpose and will have his or her own passions and fingertips. If I—or any doctor—use my fingertips to stop that baby's heart from beating or painfully tear that baby apart (which abortions do), where has that baby's dignity gone?

This proposed amendment to the Ohio Constitution could force me and other doctors to perform an abortion

even if we don't agree with doing so, sacrificing our conscience rights to abortion access.

As an OB/GYN, I have a responsibility to care for both mothers and their babies. The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety amendment would not only compel me to act against this reality, but also remove the existing health protections for abortion, which risks the well-being and safety of both patients. Many of the commonsense health protections that our state currently has in place for women and children could be eliminated because the amendment forbids any law that "directly or indirectly" would "burden" reproductive decisions.

Since the amendment doesn't define what is and isn't considered a "burden," basic health protections would also be discarded, such as ensuring that a woman seeking an abortion is screened and counseled by a licensed doctor who can transfer her into a local hospital if something goes wrong.

The amendment's title, The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety, is a misnomer. Any amendment that eliminates current health and safety standards for women cannot simultaneously guarantee to protect women's health and safety in the future.

Ultimately, this amendment threatens the quality of care for mothers and their babies in Ohio. Every day, I strive to use my fingertips to provide love, quality care, and compassion to my patients and their preborn children, and I will be using those same fingertips in November when I vote on the proposed amendment.
