THE LORD IS OUR SHEPHERD

The responsorial Psalm for Mass this weekend is Psalm 23—a favorite for many people. “The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. In verdant pastures he gives me repose; beside restful waters he leads me; he refreshes my soul.” These beginning verses are a source of consolation for our lives. Whatever our circumstances, however busy we may be, and whenever we are in need, the Lord is the shepherd of our souls who will bring us rest and refreshment. How does he do this? In my experience, he asks us to slow down or even to stop. When we lose our recollection that the Lord is near, that his Divine Providence is working in our lives, that his grace is abundant and sufficient to assist us in our lives, we become self-reliant and isolate ourselves from this intimate relationship that sustains us. Fear, worry, and anxiety increase in our lives if we remain apart from him.

We all know that there is a myriad of challenges in our culture, our government, and our church. Many are living like sheep without a shepherd (to allude to the Gospel reading for today). The challenges impact our families, our schools, our workplaces, and our parish. What are we to do? With confidence, we turn to Jesus and learn from him. The Gospel reading tells us today that Jesus began to teach the people many things. No doubt, he was speaking directly into the challenges, questions, and experiences of their lives. No doubt that he was offering a message of grace and hope. No doubt that he was proclaiming the love and mercy of the Father and inviting everyone to live in the Kingdom of God.

Our personal prayer time every day is an encounter with Jesus who desires to shepherd our souls if we will allow him to do so. He speaks to us through the sacred Scriptures and through the Holy Spirit who dwells in our hearts. He receives our burdens and concerns if we are willing to surrender them to him. Yes, the rest and refreshment for our souls is found and retained if we remain close to Him and follow His lead. We will want for nothing.

Please welcome Fr. Jordan Kelly, O.P. to our parish. Fr. Jordan arrives this weekend to begin his assignment as parochial vicar. He is an experienced priest and an excellent musician. I am happy to welcome him onto the pastoral team. He will provide an introduction of himself in an upcoming bulletin.

Please remember our six Dominican novices in your prayers. They are on retreat this week in preparation for their

first profession of religious vows on August 15.

FIRST THINGS FIRST

I can remember it like it was yesterday. The countertop in front of me, still with a few crumbs from last night's dinner prep, has five things on it:

two coffee mugs, a carafe of coffee, my phone, and a box of cereal. The breakfast table behind me has more cereal (but in a bowl), a spoon, and a gigantic book I've been working my way through for the past seven months. Slowly. Like, really slowly.

I get about fifteen to thirty minutes to make some headway in this book every day or two, and that's only if I'm really intentional about it. But it's so good. It's full of insights about our culture today and how we got here, full of history and philosophical nuggets that leave me seeing the world in a new way, in a deeper way, full of truths that have helped me and healed me. It's a good book. (To be clear, it's not *the* Good Book. Just *a* good book.)

So there I am, about to tuck into one of my favorite books and one of my favorite meals—yes, cereal in the morning is one of my favorite meals. (Panini sandwiches are up there, too. And nachos. Also, yes, nachos are a meal, not just an appetizer.)—when it hits me: My wife has been awake four times through the night with our youngest, my kids will be up in thirty minutes, and I've got to leave for ministry in about thirty-two minutes. So now it's decision time.

Do I sit down and spend a delightful thirty minutes with this good (again, not Good) book? Or . . . do I start to ask the

question, "What do my wife and children need from me during the next thirty minutes?" Because on the one hand, this book is widening my horizons, deepening my questions, and . . . and I've only got this little window of time, so I should take what I can get. But on the other hand, I can see how the extra fifteen minutes of kid-free work could save my wife two hours of work with our little "helpers." What do I do?

Spoiler alert: This actually was yesterday. And the day before that. And the day before that. And it probably happened the day you're reading this, too. This is an everyday moment in my house. And maybe it's an everyday moment in yours, too—this choice between two really good things that's not so much about the things themselves but our reasons for and circumstances around the choice.

Also, spoiler alert: I don't have the answer yet. But what I do have are the words of St. Paul, "If I speak in human and angelic tongues but do not have love, I am a resounding gong or a clashing cymbal. And if I have the gift of prophecy and comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge; if I have all faith so as to move mountains but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away everything I own, and if I hand my body over so that I may boast but do not have love, I gain nothing." And the words of St. Augustine, "Once for all, then, a short precept is given thee: Love, and do what thou wilt: whether thou hold thy peace, through love hold thy peace; whether thou cry out, through love cry out; whether thou correct, through love correct; whether thou spare, through love do thou spare: let the root of love be within, of this root can nothing spring but what is good" (*A Letter to John of Parthos*).

So instead of an answer, I am left with a question: Do I choose this thing because in it I am choosing love, choosing to will the good of another? Do I do this for the praise and glory of my God, to be a helpmate to my wife and a good father to my children? Do I offer myself as a gift, obeying the most fundamental law of faith, and possibly of humanity as a whole, that it is only when we lose our lives that we find them? Or am I trying to accumulate treasures for my own benefit, to be wise in my own eyes, to build myself up so that others would see me and say, "Whoa. This guy." It's a hard question, for me at least.

But maybe the question is the answer. Or at least it's the first step in getting there. And maybe, just maybe, you and I are also left with a promise that when we put first things first, there might even be a few minutes for a good book (or the laundry) thrown in besides.

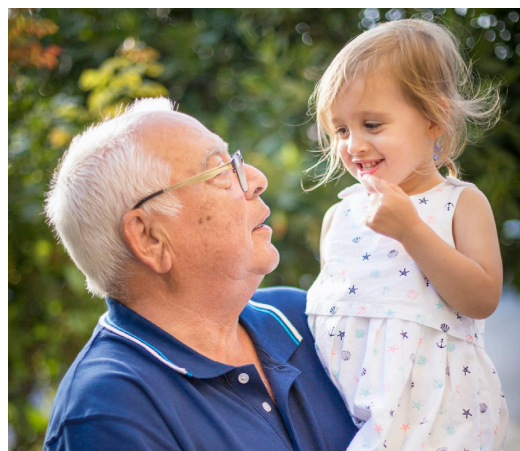

ASK A DEACON – ST. MARY MAGDALENE

Q: I heard that Pope Francis made St. Mary Magdalene’s celebration (July 22) a feast day a few years ago. Why did he do that, and what is her unique significance?

A: The Church has different levels of celebrations—optional memorials, obligatory memorials, feasts, and solemnities. In 2016, Pope Francis bumped St. Mary Magdalene from an obligatory memorial to a feast. This means more “smells and bells” for her—the Gloria is said, and there are more unique prayers.

Not a lot of saints get actual feasts, but all of the apostles do. The decision to jazz up Mary Magdalene’s celebration comes from the recognition of her apostolic vocation. St. Thomas Aquinas called her “an apostle to the apostles.”¹ The liturgy now takes up this title, saying that Christ “honored her with the office of being an apostle to the Apostles.”²

What does it mean to call Mary Magdalene an apostle? The Gospel of Mark describes the vocation of an apostle: Jesus “appointed twelve whom he also named apostles that they might be with him and he might send them forth to preach” (Mk 3:14). Two qualities stand out: the apostle is 1) chosen to be with Jesus and 2) sent by him to preach. Jesus sends the apostles to preach what they have witnessed with Him. While only twelve men are chosen to be apostles—the first bishops—in the strict sense, there are other ways of participating in the apostolic mission. Of these, Mary Magdalene has a preeminence.

She is an apostle because the Lord chose her to be with Him at His resurrection, the first witness that Christ is risen. Jesus then commissions her, telling her “go to my brothers and tell them” (Jn 20:17). She is the first to announce, “I have seen the Lord” (Jn 20:18). Since the Twelve will be the primary evangelizers of the world, Mary Magdalene’s role is both unique and exalted. She evangelizes the evangelizers, she preaches to the preachers.

Mary Magdalene’s role as the first preacher of the resurrection has always endeared her to the Dominicans, the Order of Preachers. Her day was already celebrated as a feast in the Dominicans’ calendar—we were ahead of the game on that one.

But the Dominican connection has another interesting twist, which sheds light on how we can all imitate this great saint. According to an ancient tradition, Mary Magdalene fled the Holy Land and moved to what is now Provence, a region of

southwestern France. There she continued the commission the Lord gave her at the empty tomb. Her preaching of Jesus Christ converted the first Christians in the area. In the 13th century, the Dominicans took over management of the cliffside cave she lived in and her tomb. I was able to visit there a few years ago. One really experiences her presence—she is still preaching even now!

The feast of Mary Magdalene reminds us that we are all called—not just bishops, priests, and deacons—to be with Jesus and to preach of Him. Like Mary Magdalene, our Lord calls us to friendship with Him and frees us from our sins. He then sends us out to witness to what we have seen—the mercy of the Risen Christ. St. Mary Magdalene, pray for us!
