GRATEFUL FOR OUR HISTORY

For many people around the world, the Fourth of July is just another day. But for us Americans – for us American Catholics – it's an opportunity to remember the principles upon which this country was founded and to thank God

for the many blessings He has bestowed upon our great nation and each one of us. Despite the struggles we are facing today in our country, our Church, our homes, and in our hearts, we are obligated to be grateful.

As we celebrate the founding of the United States of America, I am reminded of two other foundings: the establishment of the Diocese of Cincinnati (1821) and St. Gertrude Church (1923). No doubt, these are two more gifts to add to our gratitude list.

Just like the United States, the Archdiocese of Cincinnati and St. Gertrude Church have rich histories and rare beauty that merit being shared. That's why Fr. David Endres and members of the archdiocese's bicentennial committee have collaborated with publisher Editions du Signe to create two timely books, *Treasures of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati* and *Seeking the Lord*.

As its introduction states, *Treasures* is "a pictorial celebration of many of the Roman Catholic places of worship that grace the landscape of Western and Southwestern Ohio. Over much of the past 200 years, these beautiful churches and religious sites have helped millions of Catholics, in times both good and bad, lift their hearts and minds to God...

These are the places where we have gathered to give praise and worship to God, introduce our children to the love of Jesus and grow as followers of Christ. These are the places where we have been baptized, confirmed, forgiven and, ultimately, commended to God's mercy. These are the places where we encounter our Lord and Savior, both in His Word and in His Real Presence in the Holy Eucharist, welcoming Him into our hearts so that we can radiate Christ to all we meet."

The authors acknowledge that "no single book could possibly capture the rich history of every parish or all the beautiful architecture, statuary, stained glass and iconography of the expansive Archdiocese of Cincinnati." In fact, out of the 210 parishes in the archdiocese, only 135 parishes (along with seventeen non-parish locations) are featured. Some of the churches are familiar to many, while others are hidden gems known only to local parishioners. This bicentennial year presents the perfect opportunity to learn about and visit these historical places.

I am happy to share that St. Gertrude, the only Dominican

parish in the archdiocese, is among the parishes highlighted in this keepsake book. For many of you, St. Gertrude has been a building block of your faith and an important – and essential – part of your everyday lives. It's where you grew up. It's where you were married. It's where you had your children baptized. It's where you've brought your joys and sorrows and offered them to your Heavenly Father. And it's where you gather with the faithful every Sunday to give praise to God and encounter Jesus Christ.

I encourage you today to thank God for not only the many freedoms you have as a citizen of the United States but also the incredible gift of our parish and the archdiocese, both of which have shaped us and connect us to the generations of faithful Catholics who have come before us and the generations that will come after us.

MEET THE TEAM: WALTER PLUMMER



Each month, the St. Gertrude bulletin will feature an interview with a member of the parish's Evangelization team. This month, we're highlighting Walter Plummer, director of youth formation.

St. Gertrude Bulletin: You're new to the staff at St. Gertrude, right?

Walter: Yes! My first day was June 10. So by the time people are reading this, I'll be a seasoned veteran of almost one month. Prior to arriving at St. Gertrude, I served in youth ministry for seven years here in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati and two years as a program manager for high school and college mission trips.

SGB: Can you share a bit about what drew you to the position at the parish?

Walter: Wow, it's hard to shrink it down to just a few points. But I'll try, for the good of the reader. First, the beautiful liturgy. My first Easter Vigil in Cincinnati as an adult, Abby (my then girlfriend, now wife) and I worshipped here at St. Gertrude. I just remember being struck by the beauty, simplicity, and reverence of the Mass at the parish. Second, the Dominican



charism of preaching. We have regularly received the sacrament of reconciliation here at St. Gertrude since we started living in the area and have been extraordinarily blessed by the wisdom and clear teaching of the Dominican priests. Third, the community of intentional disciples. My primary vocation is marriage and the blessing of family life that flows from it, and one of my greatest desires is to see my wife and children know the Lord more and more. It is a blessing to see and be with so many other families who desire the same, who run the race so as to win.

SGB: Had you always planned on doing ministry?

Walter: Not always. My undergraduate studies were in English and secondary education, with the goal of being a high school teacher. At some point I realized that at the heart of what I loved about working with young people was seeing them embrace a future full of hope. I believe at the center of that hope, of any real hope, is the reality of who God is and who He says we are. At that point I knew that I wanted to spend the rest of my life witnessing to that fundamental reality.

SGB: Let's switch gears and talk about life outside of ministry. Were you born and raised in Cincinnati?

Walter: Born, yes. Raised, kind of. My family and I lived here until I was in third grade, and then we moved to Cleveland because of my dad's work. So my formative years involved a lot of Browns' and Cavs' games, which has got to earn me at least a year off of purgatory. I came back to Cincinnati in 2013 and have loved being here ever since.

SGB: Describe your family a bit, if you don't mind.



Walter: They're pretty great. My beautiful wife, Abby, and I have been married for almost seven years. We have three boys who keep us busy and remind us of the joy the Father has in us. (Most of the time!) Our son William is four, James is two, and Benedict is eight months and counting. We love to be

outside, water our plants (and each other), hike, and have pillow fights. And we love Jesus.

SGB: Did you decide to register your family in the parish? Walter: Absolutely!

SGB: What excites you most about that?

Walter: I believe that a Christian life is an integrated one, where our spiritual lives, domestic lives, and work all join together into one organic whole. My wife and I want to be a part of this parish family, to bring those parts of our lives together, to worship, serve, and be formed with the other members of this family, old and young. What excites us most is seeing the other families devoted to the same end, truly operating as a family of faith: encouraging, loving, serving, and praying for one another, united to the head of our family, Jesus Christ.

SGB: What do you like to do for fun?

Walter: I am a total nerd, so I like to read philosophy, theology, and really good books. I also like to pretend that I understand them. Beyond that, I'd say wrestling with my kids (haven't lost yet!), playing board games with Abby (at which I do lose often



enough), and catching the occasional international soccer match.



<u>ASK A PRIEST -</u> TALKING ABOUT PEOPLE: INFORMATION OR DETRACTION?

BY FR. JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P. **Q:** My family of origin is somewhat "complicated" (drinking issues, drama,

etc.). As I build friendships, is it okay to share things about my background with my friends? Or is this the sin of detraction?

A: When it comes to speech, ultimately, we're all responsible for what we say or don't say, for what we choose to hear or not hear. Our ability to converse with others is a great gift which sets us apart from the other animals. It's an essential skill to survive in society and also an art that takes practice and perfection. Speech can set us apart from those who oppose us and it can also bring us into community with friends. Most importantly, speech is how we sinners-invited-to-be-saints received the news of salvation from God: "Faith comes through what is heard, and what is heard comes by the preaching of Christ" (Romans 10:17).

Admittedly, most of us don't think very much about what we say from moment to moment. In some families and social settings, talking is treated almost like breathing – do it or die! But Christians understand that we're meant to use the spoken word for more than simple chatter. If important words are to be heard or said, we need silence first! Our conversations, due to our faith in Christ, can carry salvific meaning if we budget the "room" for God.

This goes to the heart of your question: What do Christian friends talk about? Should some things be left unsaid? We know that friends need to share certain things in order to communicate. Some of these things will be mundane and basic to close-living while others will be more refined and important to cultivating mutual knowledge and trust. But other things can hurt communication. The love of friendship, explains St. Thomas Aquinas, extends even to those who are related and connected to our friends. Whereas for simple pagans, this might mean loving those family members or connections my friend loves and despising those whom he despises (and letting my speech convey this), it's different for Christians. After the model of Jesus, we learn

to love even our enemies because we love God and recognize they are God's children too. Alongside my friend, I don't have to like them, but I do have to love them. The way I speak to my friend should help us both to adapt and grow in Jesus' way of seeing and loving other people.

What does this mean regarding speaking to our friends about "complicated" family situations? We must talk to our friends about other people in a way that keeps love of God and neighbor before our eyes, never allowing this charity to be eclipsed. A friend is "another self" and can be a great help in dealing with difficult people and issues. But we should always respect the privacy of others, their reputation, and their value in the eyes of God. Whether I am alone or in the company of a friend, not everything needs to be said or even thought. Detraction is disclosing the (true) faults and failings of another without an objectively valid reason.1 The Church teaches that truthspeaking must be guided by authentic love for our neighbor.² When speaking to my friend, what is important information and what is simply "gossip?" What is communication and what really offends Christian friendship? As a rule, I should shape my speech as I wish my heart to be shaped. A friend, by his or her thoughtful speech or by silence, will help me do this.
