

SUMMER TRANSITIONS INTO FALL

The parish continues to return to the fullness of life as the summer transitions into fall. School began last week with 316 students. Faculty, staff, and students started the academic year with an all-school Mass (what a blessing to be all together again). We

celebrated a votive Mass of the Holy Spirit praying that God will give the Holy Spirit so that all may learn, grow, and be filled with wisdom and understanding in all disciplines of the arts and sciences. We pray this way because we believe that all that is good, beautiful, and true comes from God and leads us into a deeper relationship with God. His glory is reflected in every person and in everything he has created. Learning and understanding the divine order for humanity and the natural world leads toward a flourishing that brings peace to hearts and joy in relationships.

The parish picnic also signals the end of summer and a return to varied activities of the parish. The members of the parish pastoral council hosted this event and coordinated its planning and fulfillment. We are grateful for their efforts to bring the parish community together for food, fellowship, and fun. Included in the picnic was a feature of past parish festivals—the Golf Ball Drop. Thanks to the sponsorship of the Seeger family in memory of their parents, a City of Madeira fire truck raised and dropped 1,000 numbered golf balls onto the parish lawn where a hole was prepared. The person whose ball made it into the hole or landed closest to the hole won \$1,000. The proceeds from golf ball sales/chances support the operating budget of the parish.

Faith formation opportunities are resuming for children and adults. Newly designed programs for families, junior high, and senior high students offer a more robust catechesis that engages the mind, heart, and body. Every effort is being taken to bring families and their children to a personal encounter with Jesus and to nurture and support that encounter with formation that encourages an intentional response to Jesus' continual call: "Follow me." A Bible study, From Genesis to Jesus, begins in September, as does Become Catholic (formerly RCIA). Sacramental preparation for Baptism and Marriage are also receiving a makeover.



For nearly one and a half years, the parish has been celebrating holy Mass on a schedule of 4:30 p.m. anticipated Mass on Saturday; and 8:00 a.m., 10:00 a.m., 12:00 p.m., and 6:00 p.m. on Sunday. During this time, and even before the pandemic, an attendance count has been recorded for each Mass. The data shows a decrease in Mass attendance over the years; and recent data over the last 13 months of my pastorate shows that the current schedule accommodates the needs of the parish. Here are five newly discovered benefits of this schedule:

- 1. More time for a beautiful celebration of the Mass without the pressure of "getting out to prepare for the next Mass."
- 2. Less congestion in the parking lot.
- 3. More time for greeting and socializing with and among parishioners after Mass.
- 4. More time for the Faith Formation programs provided on Sunday.
- 5. More reasonable time for the celebration of Baptisms after the last Mass.

With all these benefits, the current Mass schedule will remain in place.

There is no real need to lose these benefits, which enhance the life of the parish and support its mission.

(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: TABOO

Talking about this issue is taboo for many parents.

Some know it is a problem, but they simply do not know what to say or how to keep up with tech and app developments. For

them, distraction, dismissiveness, and avoidance become key strategies for navigating parenthood in the twenty-first century.

Other parents were raised in households where family members rarely talked about such topics, and they only came to understand the Church's teaching on human relationships and sexuality in terms of a rather rigid "no" that was offered with little explanation. Only the weirdos or perverts or sinners engaged in that kind of behavior. At the same time, the revolutionized mainstream culture urged forward with a "yes" to all sorts of expressions, causing a tremendous gap between the Catholic position on such matters and the more progressive secular one. Then, when issues did arise in the home, people found themselves speechless and embarrassed, and it would all get brushed under the rug. As a result of such silence in their childhood, some of today's parents do not know where to begin when it comes to having a conversation or talking about the Church's teaching on this subject matter in a positive way.

Yet for others, the silence is more personal, wrapped up as it is in the darkness of a wounded and shameful history that leaves one painfully mute.

I understand all of these positions, because they basically express my own tendencies. For the sake of this generation of children—one that has been dubbed "the porn generation"—we cannot remain silent about pornography any longer.

On average, children will be exposed to pornography between ages 8 and 11 (the average age for a child in the United States to own a smartphone is 10). By age 15–17, 80 percent of teenagers will be exposed to hardcore pornography. For most children, it is not a question of *if* they will be exposed to porn, but *when*. From billboards and pop-ups to TV screens and some 4.2 million websites, pornography is everywhere. It is not some sort of odd, "fringe" behavior but something that has become so normalized that 90 percent of teens are encouraging, accepting, or neutral when it comes to talking about porn with their friends. We, quite honestly, live in a "pornified" culture.

Learning to Drive (the Conversation)

I grew up in Tiffin, Ohio. It is a small town of around 15,000 people and surrounded by farmland in the middle of Seneca County. When I turned 15½ and my parents taught me to drive, they taught me how to drive in a small town and on narrow county roads. My wife, however, learned how to drive in the suburbs of Cincinnati. She had to navigate city traffic and master the interstate highway just to safely arrive in her high school parking lot.

I think this anecdote illustrates an important point: the roadways and traffic patterns shape how we teach our kids to drive. More broadly, the cultural environment in which we live impacts how we parent our children. It seems clear to me that we live in a "pornified" culture. But, am I willing to parent accordingly? Are you? Are we willing to talk about the dangers of pornography with each other and with our children in order to help them navigate this mess?


At St. Gertrude, we have launched an initiative called Illuminate. This series, offered multiple times throughout the year, provides a venue for parents to begin (or to continue) this tough conversation by illustrating the prevalence of the issue and presenting practical strategies for prevention and healing.

The Question

Matt Fradd, an international Catholic speaker and host of the wildly popular podcast *Pints with Aquinas*, once made this point, "We only have one decision to make when it comes to parenting in the digital age: Do we want our children to be protected from hardcore pornography, or not?" If we are serious about protecting our children, it is time for parents to talk about the issue—as difficult, awkward, and painful as it might be—band together, and take action. Given the prevalence of digital media, there's not a moment to spare.

The fourth Sunday of each month, we'll feature stories and tips for trying to live the faith in the ordinariness of life.






INTRODUCING: IMMERSION



ASK A PRIEST CONTINUING THE LATIN MASS?

Q: Given Pope Francis' recent liturgical directives, will we still have the Latin Mass at St. Gertrude?

A: This question hits on something near and dear to many Catholics, myself included. I can offer you a qualified "yes" in answer to this question. I hope that some personal background will help explain where I am coming from and contribute to the rationale that the friars want to implement at St. Gertrude Church.

I am a priest because I love Jesus, however imperfectly, and that comes from knowing his love for me in the holy Eucharist. I did not grow up in a parish with a celebration of the Mass as cultivated as one finds regularly at St. Gertrude: Gregorian chant, use of an altar rail, orthodox hymnody, the use of Latin, a plenitude of liturgical ministers, etc. For me, a strong dose of traditional Catholic worship came only after I met the Dominicans as an altar server for our cloistered nuns in West Springfield, Massachusetts, at age 12. Soon after, I joined a schola (an ensemble of singers performing Gregorian chant or other sacred music) at a Catholic school and began to be more immersed in the Church's life of study and prayer. I relished the opportunity "to feel with the Church" (sentire cum Ecclesia) and to pray at her heart through official liturgical prayers such as Mass and the Divine Office.

Like the majority of Roman Catholics, most of my experience of the Catholic liturgy—beginning in junior high school, continuing through college, and while in formation as a Dominican—has been

within the *Novus Ordo* of the Roman Rite (i.e. the Mass of Vatican II). Starting with the Dominican nuns in West Springfield, then especially with teachers and friends at Christendom College, as well as throughout my time as a Dominican, I've experienced beautiful, even transcendent, liturgies influenced by various elements of our tradition: *ad orientem* posture (where priest and people face a common direction during the Eucharistic Prayer); frequent use of the Latin language (still the official language of our

Roman Rite); Gregorian and Dominican Chant (some of our chant melodies are over 1,000 years old!); and the use of incense, bells, an array of vested liturgical ministers, etc.

Notably, the generous allowance of the Tridentine Mass and the Dominican Rite allowed by Pope Benedict XVI in 2007 has helped me understand the roots of our current liturgy. Like many other Catholics, I have been deeply impressed by the atmosphere of reverence cultivated in the smoke and silence of the "old rite." I've also come to appreciate some elements of the post-conciliar reforms, for example more flexibility in the use of sacred music, ready allowance of the vernacular languages, and an expanded lectionary with the proclamation of the Word of God facing the people. Of course, I'm grateful to God for many beautiful Dominican Rite Masses last year, for the men and women who served and chanted these Masses with precision and grace, and to my fellow friars who celebrated, sang, and preached each month.

Honestly, Pope Francis' recent apostolic letter, *Traditiones Custodes*, regarding the use of the Tridentine Mass came as a surprise to me! Yet, I see it as an installment in a long series of papal directives and interventions in recent years about how Roman Catholics are to worship according to their specific Rite. Popes St. John Paul II, Benedict XVI, and Francis have been trying to restrain people from abusing the pastoral flexibility that's built into the Mass of Vatican II. They've also been concerned to see that the faithful who have suffered through poorly-celebrated liturgies don't leave the visible communion of the Church in frustration. There has been an overarching desire to affirm traditional principles while recognizing that the Church can change the outward ritual of the Mass without, of course, altering the sacred mysteries themselves. Pope Francis has made a decision—one which I imagine Pope Benedict XV foresaw—that it is time to return to one expression of the Roman Rite.

Flowing from our personal and communal prayer, our discussion, and especially our vowed desire to "feel with the Church," the priests of St. Gertrude Church wish to recommit ourselves to a beautiful and traditional celebration of the Roman Rite according to what has been

decreed officially by the Second Vatican Council and recent Popes. Father George, Father Jordan, and I deeply love our Dominican "usage" of the Roman Rite that has formed us and so many of our parishioners. Two years of celebrating the Dominican Rite periodically at St. Gertrude has only enhanced our appreciation. In light of Pope Francis' decision, we will not offer a cycle of Dominican Rite Masses this year. But, we do intend to make more generous use of the treasury of traditional Roman and Dominican


more generous use of the treasury of traditional Roman and Dominican elements that remain at our disposal in the *Novus Ordo*. With time, we will develop a concrete plan that will help us to continue to pray the Mass in the heart of the Church.


