BEACONS OF LIGHT: FOUNDATIONAL PRINCIPLES #5: STEWARDSHIP

"My need to give is more important than the parish's need to receive." A few years ago, I heard a priest share this statement when describing "stewardship as a way of life." It was a stark contrast to what we normally hear, as stewardship oftentimes gets associated with campaigns or financial updates, or at best, it is viewed as a program that promotes time, talent and treasure in the parish.

But true Christian stewardship is not a program; it is a primary way we live out our call to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. Through stewardship, we recognize that everything in our lives is a gift from God: our personal talents, skills, wisdom, and expertise, our family and friends, our life circumstances – every morning that we wake up to a new day is a gift ... and so much more!

In thanksgiving for everything God has blessed us with, we respond by generously giving of ourselves in how we live. "As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace" (1 Pet. 4:10). Gratitude becomes central when stewardship is a way of life and leads us to live out this scripture, sometimes without even thinking about it!

God gave the greatest of all His gifts: His one and only Son, Jesus Christ, who suffered and died so that we may live. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life" (Jn. 3:16).

Part of living stewardship is caring for and building up the Church (also a gift from God) in the world. From the pastoral letter on stewardship written by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops: "Because its individual members do collectively make up the Body of Christ, that body's health and well-being are the responsibility of the members – the personal responsibility of each one of us. We are all stewards of the Church." Through Beacons of Light, our sincere hope is that Families of Parishes will be communities of grateful disciples where parishioners are actively involved in the Family's life – using their talents, skills and resources to build up the Church and live as Christ's Body in the world. Families of Parishes have a vital role in bringing people to a deeper understanding and practice of stewardship.

STEWARDSHIP GOALS

To make this possible, these are goals for each Family of Parishes:

Everyday Stewardship & Vocation: The Family of Parishes forms people to hear and respond to God's call in their lives – from each day's individual moments to the overall purpose of living out their vocations.

Way of Life: More than a program or once-a-year report to the parish, stewardship is fostered as a spiritual way of life and becomes an expression of discipleship.

Gratitude & Giving: Parishioners are formed as disciples who grow in gratitude and become willing to share their time, talents, faith and resources within the parish and beyond it.

Invitation & Engagement: The Family of Parishes actively invites and engages people in all ages and stages of life and faith to contribute in ministry, service and giving.

Hospitality & Welcome: The Family of Parishes is a community that warmly welcomes newcomers and offers hospitality to everyone.

Meaningful Involvement & Leadership: The Family of Parishes seeks to meaningfully involve people as contributing members of the community; parishioners are encouraged to take leadership roles, as appropriate, and are offered formation to equip them as leaders. Beacons of Light provides a prime opportunity for a renewed focus and commitment to live stewardship as a way of life.



THE MOST IMPORTANT COLOR OF THE RAINBOW

Hello! My name is Jen Harris. I have been a parishioner at St. Gertrude Church most of my life. My husband and I were married at St. Gertrude in 2008 and have four beautiful children. We both work full-time and, while I make sure our kids get to all of their extracurricular commitments, my husband works on finishing his doctorate in nurse education. Like you, we are busy. We have a very large, color-coded calendar that hangs by our door to keep track of everyone's comings and goings. The calendar is full of pink commitments for our 7-year-old daughter; orange commitments for our 9-year-old son; green commitments for our 11-year-old son; blue commitments for our 13-year-old son; yellow commitments for my husband; and red commitments for me so that I don't lose track of them in our "rainbow" of activity. Much of the time, competing colors occur at the same time or are back-to-back and, more often than not, happen at different locations. It seems like we're always rushing this way and that, from one activity to another, with just enough time in between to say a quick hello as we pass each other on our ways out the door.

It is crazy. But, if you look closer at that rainbow of color on our wall, a couple of times a month you'll see my favorite commitments. The commitments written in purple. These are the very rare times we do something as a family each month. And, if you look even closer at the purple commitments on the first and third Sundays of the month, you'll be able to read the two words that have come to mean so much to our family over the past two years: Family Faith.

"Family Faith? What is that?" you might ask. In its most basic form, and as the name implies, it's a time for a family to come

together and learn about their Catholic faith. It follows a structured format that usually involves a themebased ice-breaker or team-building type game where each family or a group of families engages in friendly competition with the other families or group of families that are present. My family will never forget our first Family Faith session when we were "challenged" to build a structure using toothpicks and mini marshmallows. Much to our surprise, we succeeded in building the tallest and most stable structure; thereby, securing a very much desired gift card to Graeters! (That gift card facilitated yet another purple entry on our calendar!) The opening activity is followed by a more formal presentation of information or a deep dive into parts of the Bible via family discussion questions. The sessions then wrap up with a review or summary activity that pulls together everything done and discussed during the session, and you're provided ideas for extending the "lesson" at home.

On a deeper level, Family Faith is so much more! It's interactive and hands-on. It's experiential and family-centered. "What does that even mean?" you might ask. Well, as I see it, for each family, Family Faith means and is something different. It ends up being exactly what your family needs it to be, and that's what makes it amazing. For our family, it is a time to put aside the chaos that seems to rule our lives throughout the rest of the month. It's a time to take a deep breath. A time to quiet the noise and activity of our day-to-day lives. A time to learn about our faith . . . to learn about God . . . and Jesus . . . the Bible . . . and the Catholic Church. It is a time to learn about our relationships with each of these wonderful, awe-inspiring things and deepen our understanding of them. As parents, we find Family Faith is not only a time to teach our children about these things, but also a time to share with them our personal experiences with these things to deepen their connection to them. But, as my husband and I have come to realize, it is also a time for us to learn from our children. We get to hear their thoughts, feelings, and personal experiences with each of these things. We entered into Family Faith thinking how great of an experience it would be for our kids not realizing what a great experience it would be for us, too.

Best of all, Family Faith is fun. Our family has come to cherish these particular purple times in our activity rainbow. Everyone in our family knows these are the most important commitments on our calendar—not only because of what we're learning and doing during these times, but also because of who we're doing it with. My understanding of and connection with God, Jesus, the Bible, and my Catholic faith primarily came through time engaged in the many beautiful traditions of the Catholic faith and from time spent at Mass with my family growing up. Thankfully, my own family has Family Faith as another meaningful connector.



ASK A PRIEST—SCHOLA CANTORUM FOR OUR CHILDREN AND PARISH

FATHER JOHN MARK SOLITARIO, O.P. Q: Why are we bolstering our music program with a Schola Cantorum for children? A: The Dominican friars and

sisters are very happy about

this opportunity for children at St. Gertrude Parish! A Schola Cantorum for children means good things for the future of our parish and the entire Church. The Second Vatican Council emphasized the teaching of sacred music in not only novitiates and seminaries but also all Catholic schools. Children have a special claim on musical formation and liturgical training since sacred music is the greatest "handmaid" of Catholic worship, and our children are our future.

Christopher Holman, our parish Director of Music, has already begun to form a Schola Cantorum, or "school of singing," that will offer theoretical, technical, and liturgical/spiritual involvement more than your typical children's choir. Christopher had

this to say regarding the Church's encouragement that children learn to sing the Mass:

"Children are the next generation, and the ancient traditions of the Church can only remain alive if young people are actively learning about and embracing them. Singing the Mass is one of the Church's greatest artistic treasures; the melodies we sing at St. Gertrude on a weekly basis in countless ways reflect how people have praised and continue to praise God in their own times and cultures. Moreover, everyone is called, regardless of their age, to offer whatever gifts they are given to God. If our children are learning what it is to truly sing the Mass—intellectually as well as spiritually—they are joining and



helping perpetuate the tradition which Christ himself established."

St. Paul instructs the Christian community in Ephesus: "Be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart..." (Eph 5:18b-19b). Speaking for myself, joining a



choir in seventh grade (it was a mandatory part of the curriculum!) changed my experience of worship and life as a Catholic. The beauty of chant and sacred polyphony "cued me in" further to the beauty of Jesus Christ, who is ever ancient and ever new, and to what he has done for his Church.

Next week, we'll discuss how our choirs are meant to help us actively participate in the holy Mass.
