PILGRIMS AND PILGRIMAGES

Early this coming Thursday morning, Father Luke and around 50 of our parishioners will get on a bus to begin the journey to Washington, D.C., for the national Dominican Rosary Pilgrimage. They go, representing our entire parish, to join with other pilgrims from all over the country in imploring our Blessed Mother's intercession upon

our nation, our parishes, and upon all of us.

Thinking about their upcoming trip, I found myself reflecting on the nature of pilgrimages. Why are they so much a part of our Christian (and especially Catholic) history? Why are they important? As I contemplated these questions, a few thoughts popped into my mind that I would like to share with everyone.

Pilgrimages break us out of our regular routine. It can be easy in our spiritual life to fall into a rut; a pilgrimage (much like a retreat) breaks us out of the usual pattern of daily life, which in turn can make it a lot easier to focus more intensely on spiritual things.

Pilgrimages have a destination and almost always that destination is a shrine, a cathedral, or some other sacred place. Often, these are locations associated with certain saints or places where miracles have occurred in the past. While we can (and ought to) pray to God wherever we happen to be, there is something special about prayers that are lifted up to God at these holy sites.

Pilgrimages are often very hard. They involve sacrifice. The difficulties of travel, meals on the road, sleeping in an unfamiliar bed, sometimes significant walking . . . all of these things take a toll on the pilgrim. Thus, every pilgrimage has an innately penitential aspect to it because of the sacrifices the pilgrimage demands.

When made in a group, pilgrimages are an opportunity to go through this difficult but spiritually rewarding journey with others. The sharing of graces and sufferings that happen on a group pilgrimage tend to knit the pilgrims together and form bonds that often last the rest of their lives.

Finally, every pilgrimage encapsulates in miniature the "great pilgrimage" that all of us are on: the pilgrimage through life to our final destination—heaven. Our destination is indeed a sacred place—the most blessed location of all! Our pilgrimage through life has both its graces and its sufferings and sacrifices. And in our pilgrimage of life, we do not walk the journey alone but with our fellow believers (and with the great "cloud of witnesses," the saints, who have successfully walked that journey before us).

In order to be in solidarity with our pilgrims in Washington, D.C., this coming Saturday (September 30), I invite all our parishioners who are *not* going on the pilgrimage to come join me in St. Gertrude Church at 3 p.m., where we will have a special rosary with preaching and reflections on the mysteries. This is the exact time in Washington, D.C., when our parishioners and all the other pilgrims will be gathering at the National Shrine of the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception to pray the rosary there.

In this way, we will be both spiritually and temporally uniting our prayers with those of the pilgrims in Washington, D.C.

May Our Blessed Mother receive the gift of the prayers we will raise up to her and shower upon us her motherly love and intercession.

GOSPEL REFLECTION— YOU ARE THE SUM OF THE FATHER'S LOVE FOR YOU

"Are you envious because I am generous?"

A few years ago, a friend of mine shared a story about ministry life. When

he and his ministry team were neck-deep in the final stages of a whole-parish project led by their own pastoral staff, one critical team member walked away. For good reasons—reasons that in the long term were the best possible outcome and not at all due to scandal, avoiding responsibilities, or anything other than the pursuit of a life lived with Jesus and his Church. And in the end, the project turned out even better than the team had hoped. But still, that person walked away and left the team scrambling.

That story bothers me.

I shared it with some friends, trying to work out what it is that bothers me so much about it, and one friend said, "Oh, my response

would be, 'Now I know who you really are. Now I know your true colors.'" That put a finger right on the pain point of that story for me: who you are to me is what you've done for me lately.

Let me say that part again: who you are to me is what you've done for me lately.

Ouch. When I write it down like that, that's pretty harsh. It reduces a person to simply the worth of his or her actions relative to a temporary goal. And that's a very worldly perspective. "You're worth what you can do for me," it says.

Now, contrast that with the parable from the Gospel this week (the parable of the landowner who pays the same wage for unequal work). As the workers who labored through the heat of the day grumble about their pay, the landowner says, "Are you envious because I am generous?"

I repeat: ouch.

Why did those workers get their wages? Because the owner of the land promised it to them. He said to them (in my own words), "This is what I will do for you." And they said yes. His promise wasn't made after the work was done. It wasn't dependent upon how long they had been in the field. It wasn't dependent upon the labor of others or their time in the field. It was only dependent on the landowner's promise and the laborers' willingness to say yes and work in his vineyard. What does the story reveal about the landowner's perspective of those laborers? Maybe something like this: you are not the sum of your weaknesses and failures. You are the sum of the Father's love for you and your real potential to be with him as he is (cf. Pope St. John Paul II's World Youth Day Address, 2002).

Generosity is not deserved; it's given because of the love the giver has for the receivers. We are not reducible to what we've done or haven't done, what people say or don't say, what we have or don't have. We are his, and he is ours.

So here's my invitation for you (and me) this week: Where do you feel like your relationships are simply contractual and not based on the dignity of each human person? How can you shift your role in that relationship to be a bit more like the landowner in today's Gospel—in the end, to be a bit more like Jesus?

ASK A PRIEST COLUMN— CONFESSING OUR SINS TO A PRIEST

FATHER JOHN LANGLOIS, O.P.

Q: "Why do we need to confess our sins to a priest rather than simply confessing directly to God?"

A: Being able to confess our sins directly to

God would be easier, wouldn't it? It's embarrassing to have to admit our wrongdoing to someone else. By confessing directly to God, we wouldn't have to suffer that humiliation and shame of revealing our sins to another person. But at the same time, we would never know for sure if we were truly forgiven, would we? That is the huge benefit of confessing to a priest—he lets us know that whatever we've confessed is absolved! But here's a fuller answer to the question . . .

First of all, Jesus himself instituted the sacrament of penance when he told his Apostles on more than one occasion, "whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (for example, see Matthew 18:18). This power to bind and loose refers to the power to forgive sins, and this will be specifically confirmed when Jesus appears to the Apostles after his resurrection, and says to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive, are forgiven them" (John 20:23). Now, God alone can forgive sin. But Jesus, before ascending to the Father, gave his Apostles the authority to forgive sins in his name, and they in turn passed on this power to the bishops and priests who succeeded them as leaders of the Church.

So Christ instituted the sacrament of penance as the normal way for us to receive the forgiveness of our sins, both our sins against God and our sins against one another. And he did this for a few reasons. To start, we need to realize that every sin we commit has a repercussion, not only for ourselves or for the specific individuals we have hurt, but also for the entire Church, which is the Body of Christ. You see, we're not independent individuals who are disconnected from a larger entity. No, we are members of the one Body of Christ. As members of that body, whatever we do affects not just us, but the entire body. When we have a wound or an infection in a part of our physical body, it doesn't just affect that part, does it? The pain or the sickness is somehow experienced in the whole of us. Similarly, because we are not isolated individuals but members of the Body of Christ, our sins have a damaging effect well beyond us personally. Our sins, in some way, negatively impact the rest of the Church itself. And so when we sin, we need to be reconciled to the Church through the sacrament of Reconciliation. In the sacrament, the priest represents not only Christ, but also the Church. So in confessing our sins to him, we are in effect acknowledging the damage our sins have done to the rest of the body. And when he forgives us through the power of Christ, he also brings about the healing of our relationship with the rest of the body. Through confession, we are reconciled both to God and to the

Church that we've offended by our sin.

The other important reason why Christ instituted the sacrament of penance was so that we could have the full assurance of forgiveness through the voice of the priest. This is the wonderful benefit of going to confession. As difficult as it is to confess to a priest, he is there to assure us with his voice that God forgives it all. When the priest says, "I absolve you from your sins," that is God speaking to us through him. And so we don't have to wonder, "Am I really forgiven?" We've heard it with our own ears. Our sins are wiped away. We have a clean slate, the gift of a fresh start. And God not only forgives us through absolution, but also gives us those graces that we need in our struggles with particular temptations and patterns of sin.

What a blessing we have then in the sacrament of Reconciliation!


