INSIGHT INTO BEACONS OF LIGHT

As you all know, we are in the midst of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's *Beacons of Light* multi-year planning initiative, an effort Archbishop Schnurr has called the most comprehensive and important undertaking in

the 200-year history of the archdiocese.

The purpose of *Beacons of Light* is to provide for us in the archdiocese a vision of life as the People of God in this particular place and time. As we approach the October public comment period on the suggested Family of Parishes groupings that have been developed over the past several months, I want to take the opportunity in this and next weekend's bulletin to provide you with as much insight into *Beacons of Light* as I can. Background

Over our archdiocese's 200-year history, we have established 306 parishes in the 19 counties of south and western Ohio that comprise the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. In 1971, the archdiocese had 417 active diocesean priests and 417 active religious priests assigned to various ministries. That was the archdiocese's high point. Today, only 210 parishes remain, and we are approaching only 125 active diocesan priests and far fewer religious priests who are available for ministry.

In 2016, the archdiocese surveyed and interviewed all of its pastors. What the archdiocese learned was the pastors' attitudes and opinions on how their lives were being affected by the dwindling numbers of priests available for parish ministry and their ever increasing workload.

In January of 2019, a group of priests came together to talk about the results of those interviews. Three of the many insights that came out of that meeting were:

- the realization that moving from "maintenance to mission" is the only way to build and enliven our Church that has suffered these past twenty-plus years,
- the need to move quickly to bring about a Church that is fully alive while at the same time set into place a Church that is manageable for our immediate future, and
- an understanding that there will be disappointment and grief in order to set ourselves up for a future of joy and expectation leading to growth.

After that January meeting of pastors, the archdiocese launched *Beacons* of *Light*.

It's important to remember that the Church in our part of the world suffers today for many reasons: lower birth rates; populations moving to other parts of the country and thus fewer numbers of the faithful to occupy our churches; and many of our people, especially younger adults, have left the practice of the faith. With that reality

comes a decline in stewardship of time and talent, as well as Sunday offerings, making it difficult to continue to be able to support the infrastructure and ministries of our multitude of parishes presently in place. With that, there is also the decline in the number of men who have been ordained priests over the last 50 years.

Next Step

The next step in the *Beacons of Light* process is to share the suggested Family of Parishes groups with the faithful. These groupings are based on data and are sized according to ministerial workload. A few parishes will continue to stand alone, but others will be grouped in twos or more, with each grouping or Family being roughly equal to each of the others in workload for the clergy called upon to minister to the faithful who reside in the Family.

In closing, I would like to ask you to do two things:

- 1. Pray for the success of this endeavor, for our priests and parishioners, for open minds and hearts, for people to be charitable to one another, and for the Church of Cincinnati.
- 2. Participate in the October 1-20 public comment period on the Family of Parishes groupings by attending one of the following comment sessions at St. Gertrude:
 - Monday, October 4, at 10:00 a.m.
 - Monday, October 4, at 7:00 p.m.
 - Wednesday, October 6, at 7:00 p.m.
 - Saturday, October 9, at 10:00 a.m.

(TRYING TO) LIVE THE MISSION: NO GRUMBLING

There's a line in the Gospels that haunts me. Jesus says, "Stop judging, that you may not be judged. For as you judge, so will you be judged, and the measure with which you measure will be measured out to you" (Mt 7:1-2).

I tend to be a perfectionist. I'm hypercritical of myself and of other people. In other words, I can tend to be a harsh judge—at least internally. This line from Our Lord, then, crushes me. It is horribly frightening.

Along with passing harsh judgment comes griping. Hypercritical people gripe a lot, it seems to me. My own examination of conscience tells me so. Last year, the Lord seemed to have let me know just how problematic this is, and his message came at the beginning of the COVID-19 lockdown. That experience was rather monastic, in some ways. Everyone was home, and the need to function well as a little community was evident. Meal times, prayer times, and bedtimes were more regular. In the midst of this, I picked up a book by J. Augustine Wetta, O.S.B, entitled *Humility Rules: Saint Benedict's 12-Step Guide to Genuine Self-Esteem.* Reading something about St. Benedict made sense at the time, so I dug in eagerly.

About halfway through, Wetta, the Benedictine priest, says:

"Sometimes, when I'm giving a tour of our monastery, I'll put this question to the guests: 'What do you think is the one thing Saint Benedict absolutely forbids his monks to do?' I usually hear answers like 'Kill somebody' or 'Steal from the church' or 'Run off with a

woman.' But those things don't frighten Benedict the way grumbling does."

In the *Rule*, Benedict says, "Above all, there should be no grumbling—not in word, not by gesture, not for any reason whatsoever. If anyone is caught grumbling, he should be severely disciplined." Why? Why is St. Benedict so adamantly opposed to griping up a storm?

Wetta explains, "Nothing will take the wind out of your sails like grumbling....If you think about it, an outright fight is easier on a community than ceaseless, cowardly, whining gossip that comes from a grumbler who 'spreads strife' and 'separates close friends." Wetta continues, "Unlike direct disobedience, grumbling makes everyone restless and angry—including the grumbler himself."

There you have it. Anyone who has legitimately tried to live in community knows this is 100 percent true. This is why, as Wetta puts it,

whining is St. Benedict's pet peeve, and why he mentions it eight times in that little book known as the *Rule*. Stopping complaining before it starts must be rather important to him.

In every community, there are dysfunctions and social pathologies. Where such maladies exist, griping follows. It's almost too natural.

So, is there any way out?

Well, in my house, I threatened to turn our big "NO GRUMBLING" sign into an obtrusive necklace that the grumbler would have to wear until I, the ultimate arbiter, decided to end the punishment. It seems to fit with what St. Benedict lays out in the *Rule*.

(I have yet to do this.)

Perhaps another solution can be mined from my own penitential experience following the sacrament of Reconciliation. The priest must have picked up on my grumbling habit, so he assigned a penance that involved sitting before the Blessed Sacrament for a brief time and meditating on original sin. That's one way to break down perfectionism. "Everyone is broken," he said. "If you can start to recognize this fact, maybe you won't expect perfection from everyone else by themselves, or yourself by yourself. Then you will learn to be merciful."

Only God is perfect, and only God loves perfectly. The key to mercy, the key to renouncing hypercritical harsh judgment and ceasing to constantly gripe, must involve becoming profoundly aware of our brokenness and amazed at the fact that God loves us anyway. Charity means receiving this love and offering it to others as a gift. The manner in which we do so will determine precisely how we will be judged (cf. Mt 25:31-46).



THE LITURGY: PRAYING, BELIEVING, LIVING

Part four in an 8-part series.

Of Icebergs and Beauty

By now, I hope you are beginning to understand how the liturgy is the greatest prayer that we are given, how the liturgy

shapes and forms our beliefs, and that from these sacred mysteries we are sent forth to live and proclaim what we have prayed. I also hope you are beginning to perceive how the ritual use of signs and symbols helps us to incarnate our prayer and our creed.

The Iceberg

When discussing the liturgy, I am sure it seems very puzzling, if not predictably New Age, to introduce the concept of an iceberg. If we give ourselves just a little time to sit with this metaphor, I hope we can begin to see how it clearly relates to the liturgy, and also how it will lead us to search and discover what is most beautiful in life.

When looking at an iceberg, we only see the very tip of what makes this simultaneously awesome and frightening structure the formation that it is. We are in awe, frightened by what we see, and unaware of what and how much danger lurks below the water and out of our sight. The simplest diagrams show that an iceberg has three levels: the one we see, and two levels each of increasing size and density beneath the water that we do not see. (More advanced diagrams say there may be as many as seven submerged levels of ice!) Think of the Titanic. Steering away from hitting the tip of the iceberg, the helmsman believed he had saved the unsinkable ocean liner from ruin, only to find that what was buried beneath the water would be the cause of never imagined destruction and death.

Okay, Father Jordan, what does this have to do with our liturgical prayer, what and why we believe what we believe, and, let alone, how we live it? Quite simply: EVERYTHING! Like the tip of a genuine iceberg, the tip of liturgical prayer—what we see and experience can be both enlightening and deceptive. How? What we see, hear, smell, and taste within the liturgy are the rituals we celebrate. (Remember, ritual is the patterning of symbols to express a common meaning.) But what shapes those rituals? Rituals are shaped by what a particular church, family, or organization believes, and by how those rituals are put into action in daily life. (Think of how we go to Communion here at St. Gertrude. Coming to the Communion rail to receive Communion, while a venerable tradition of the Church, is no longer a practice held throughout the Church. However, this ritual has particular meaning and significance for us: it helps to tell us and others the supreme importance of the Eucharist in our faith life.) Is there a problem, Father Jordan? Well, there can be. The problem exists when we no longer know or understand or are able to both articulate and appropriate to our daily lives what those hidden levels mean. Our motto becomes, we've always done it this way, and ritual is no longer

ritual, but simply drama—and bad drama at that. Everything could be perfect: all the right music, everybody moves in perfect choreography, the vestments are the best. And yet, we are left cold! All three levels need to be in contact with the other. We have to be able to understand and articulate each level, or that which expressed a common meaning and led us to the fullness of human flourishing can leave us lifeless and lacking joy, meaning, and purpose.

Beauty

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI writes about the via pulchritudinis (the way of beauty) in these words: "Art, music, vesture, are parables with an openness to the Universal: the Way of Beauty is a way capable of leading the mind and heart to the Lord, to elevate the soul and mind to the very heights of God!" The very heights of God . . . this is the ultimate beauty of the Christian life and the greatest desire of liturgical prayer.
