<u>CHANGE</u> AN INCREDIBLE OPPORTUNITY

It's that time of year again. Time for change. Of course, it's always that time of year, because change is a constant. But there is a particular lot of change going on right now at St. Gertrude Parish. As of this Thursday, summer vacation will officially be over for our

school families. There are a lot of new names and faces and new classes for children, parents, faculty, and staff alike to get used to. In the priory, we have seven new men beginning novitiate, and sadly (for us) the "old novices" and Father Michael Mary will be leaving on August 16. The novices will make their simple profession this Tuesday, August 15, which is a big and joyful change for them as they make a vowed commitment to the Dominican Order for the next few years of their lives. The profession will be in the context of a liturgy in which we celebrate an important change that took place in the life of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Solemnity of the Assumption (a holy day of obligation) celebrates Mary's passing from this world into heaven to dwell body and soul there with God. We hope you'll join us for that 11:30 a.m. profession Mass if you are able to—or offer a prayer for the novices if you're not.

The prospect of all this change has brought to mind again a thought from St. Francis de Sales, that pops into my head from time to time after I came across it last year: "Every moment comes to us pregnant with a command from God, only to pass on and plunge into eternity, there to remain forever what we have made of it."

Change is not something we always look forward to, at least I don't. But it is good to be reminded that those moments of change also hold potential and that we have a key part to play in bringing that potential to actuality. One of the key moments in the life of St. Dominic and of the Order of Preachers is a good example here. St. Dominic felt called by God to formalize his preaching companions into a religious order of preachers. As soon as the Order was approved, he immediately decided to disburse the 16 or so companions that he had to the chief university towns of Europe to found houses there. The others thought he was a little bit crazy to divide everyone up so suddenly and tried to talk him out of it. St. Dominic realized what God was asking, though, and the potential it held. So he followed through and sent his companions out. The Order flourished rapidly as a result of this decision.

The thought mentioned above also reminds us, though, that there comes a point when change will cease. A moment in which we ourselves will "plunge into eternity." There we remain forever whatever it is we have become in our lives. Though that sounds a bit intimidating, on some level we all have a desire for it—the eternal. Fortunately, before we take that plunge, we encounter the Eternal One—God—by faith. In the liturgy especially, we enter God's timeless and changeless presence and receive the help of his grace. May we approach with open hearts to receive his help and to make the most of the opportunities that lie before us in all the changes taking place in our lives during this time.

TEACHER SPOTLIGHT: EMILY JONCAS, KINDERGARTEN

Emily Joncas not only has been a St. Gertrude School teacher for 10 years (teaching third grade from 2002 to 2006, second grade from 2007 to 2008, and kindergarten from 2019 to today) but also attended

SGS! Here she shares about her journey to becoming a teacher, favorite SGS memories, and more.

St. Gertrude Bulletin: Hi, Emily! Would you please tell us a little about yourself?

Emily Joncas: I have lived in Cincinnati all my life, mostly living in the Montgomery area. I met my husband, Matt, at Xavier University in 1998, and we have been married for 20 years. Needless to say, I got a job teaching third grade that year and have been involved in the school as a teacher and/or parent ever since.

SGB: What do you enjoy most about teaching at St. Gertrude School?

Emily: Hands down, the relationships I have formed with my colleagues, students, and families. SGS has brought so many beautiful people into my life who have taught *me* so much. It is also a great gift to grow in faith alongside all of these people—a faith that is ingrained in literally everything we do each day.

SGB: What are some of your favorite memories as a student at St. Gertrude School?

Emily: There are so many wonderful memories! But most of all, when I think back to being a student at St. Gertrude School, I just remember always feeling I belonged and that I was loved—a feeling I pray I always give to my students.

SGB: Who is your biggest role model?

Emily: Cliché as it may be, my parents. They have taught me to have a grateful heart in every walk of life, to trust in the Lord and his loving plan for me, and to give thanks in all circumstances.

SGB: Who is your favorite saint?

Emily: My favorite saint is St. Teresa of Calcutta for her belief in making the world a better place through the joy of loving others and the value she placed on doing everything faithfully and with love.

What do you like to do for fun?

Emily: I love traveling with my family and discovering new places and things to do together where we can be away from all technology and distractions. I value my time with my family so much. Second to that, I love waking up early to a steaming cup of coffee, some quiet time with the Lord, and curling up with a good book.





ASK A THEOLOGIAN_____ OLD TESTAMENT GOD VS. NEW TESTAMENT GOD

SAM JOHNSON, ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF BIBLICAL STUDIES AT MOUNT ST. MARY'S SEMINARY & SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Q: I've been listening to Father Mike Schmitz's Bible in a Year podcast and have been struggling with the violence in the Old Testament. It almost feels like there's two Gods—the Old Testament God who gets angry with the Israelites and allows, or even instructs, violence (i.e. ordering someone to be stoned to death if they violate the Sabbath), and the New Testament God of love and mercy. How do you explain the violence and what appears to be an angry God in the Old Testament? I'm not sure how to explain the more violent stories (i.e. Jericho) to my young children.

A: Believe it or not, this exact set of questions was asked even more forcefully in the generation right after the last books of the New Testament were written! Early in the second century, Marcion of Sinope drew up a whole series of apparent scriptural contradictions between (as he saw it) the vengeful creator-God of the Old Testament and the God of Jesus Christ. For Marcion, the "good news" of the Gospel was really that Jesus came to save us *from* the God of the Old Testament.

Marcion's teaching soon drew condemnations from churches in every corner of the empire, and he was excommunicated in Rome around 144 AD. Marcionism became the post-apostolic Church's first heresy. However, knowing this doesn't provide an answer to the very real challenges—*scriptural* challenges—Marcion poses to us. We don't even need to know Marcion existed to have had very similar thoughts cross our minds!

Now, to do true justice to your question, we would need to read each difficult narrative very closely and carefully. In this, we could learn how many of these stories, even as they depict scenes of judgment, often look to subvert ancient paradigms of violence. We would also discuss whether these stories were intended to be read literally to begin with (Christian and Jewish tradition alike tend, primarily, to read them figurally or spiritually). But for now, we can at least say that within the Old Testament itself, there is certainly a growth and progression of thought, and there are retellings and reinterpretations of even the most troubling of these kinds of stories at every turn—and never in ways that are contrary to the Gospel.

A good example of this might be the book of Jonah: Nineveh appears as the prototypical pagan city destined for judgment (kind of like Jericho). In this story, though, it is not the wicked city—the capital of an empire known for its cruelty and savagery—that suffers judgment, but rather the prophet who refuses to intercede on its behalf. In fact, for St. Irenaeus (who lived in the generation just after Marcion and wrote a great deal in response to him), the story of Jonah can be seen as the story of all humanity. Irenaeus recalls how Jesus himself uses the "sign of Jonah" to describe his passion (Matthew 12:38-42). The whole "plan of salvation," Irenaeus says, is therefore revealed most clearly when we see that it is the eternal Word of God who enters into the depths of our humanity, consumed as it is by destruction and failure, and cries out with us: "In my affliction I called to the Lord, and He heard me . . ." (Jonah 2:2).

In other words, if I were trying to explain this story to my own kids, I might say something like: In all of the trials we see facing the people of Israel in the Old Testament, God does not simply stand on shore, far away from the wind and waves, flicking a wand in judgment here and mercy there. No, God is already with us in the belly of the whale! Even his words of judgment are spoken, finally, to call us to participate in his work of mercy.

The mystery of Christ's passion thus offers us a way to see, sort of in miniature, the mystery of a God who isn't above the grit of our own very troubled history, who isn't above entering into our own stories of oppression (both committed and suffered), but rather lowers himself into these very stories in order to help us learn to retell them and redeem them in light of his own long-suffering with us and for us, even "in the belly of Sheol" (Jonah 2:2). In this way, he reveals his power most clearly and most radiantly as a "power made perfect in weakness" (2 Corinthians 12:9).
